Shelley 25, Thomas, Bingham county 25, Wilder 50, Franklin 50, Gooding 50, Jefferson county 24, Homeida 25, Poyette 25, Weiser 50, Nampa 50 and Hazelton 20.

D. L. Fourn, Idaho supervisor of emergency farm labor for the University of Idaho extension service, is the supervisor in charge of the group which arrived at Pocatello during May.

Prison courtyards of Nazi atrocity camps were torture arenas, rivaling those of the days of Nero, where dogs were turned in to rip the clothes from defenceless prisoners and naked men and women were

paraded together in the bitter cold, liberated inmates of this camp said today.

A group of women who had been held in Belsen camp today described Nazi tortures—the flogging of women's breasts, lashing of the soles of feet, forced prostitution, the use of human beings for vivisection experiments—which they declared were "enjoyed" by German men as well as Nazi men.

The things the prisoners endured, at Belsen and at the camps in which they were interned before they reached Belsen, said Veronica Miller, a beautiful Jewish girl, "the people of England and America will not believe."

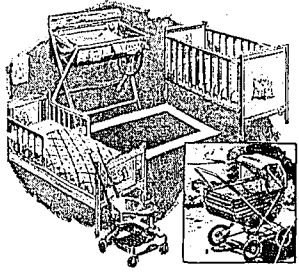
