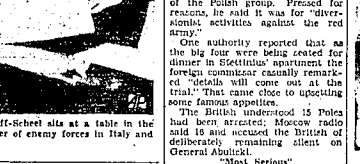

400,000 Germans Captured; Hitler's Corpse Not Found

By The Associated Press. The Germans, who once held virtually all of Europe in their power, today are reduced to a slipping clutch on an estimated 175,000 square miles of territory. Exact delineation of the German holdings was impossible due to the shifting lines of battle in Czechoslovakia, Austria and Yugoslavia where American and Russian armies were pushing hard for a cleanup. Germany's biggest holding is Norway, approximately 125,000 square miles of rugged terrain and difficult coast line.

LONDON, Sunday, May 6 (AP)—The mystery of Adolf Hitler's fate remains unsolved by Russian soldiers in Berlin who still have not found his body.

But Dr. Hans Fritzsche, Propaganda Minister Goebbels' nemesis, was freed by the free German state in Moscow today as saying that Hitler's body "has been hidden in a place which it will be impossible to find."

It was Fritzsche who told the Russians that Hitler and Goebbels had committed suicide in the Reich Chancellery in Berlin on May 30, 1945, according to a statement from the Soviet military...

**MUCH REMAINING BEYOND V-E DAY**

V-E day, despite the fact that it is arriving at an end-climax, still represents one of the most important moments in the lives of millions of folk.

It means the end of casualties which have continued even in the closing stages of hostilities. It brings countless thousands of homes closer to the glad time when their boys will not die but return home.

V-E day indeed means great thanksgiving and rejoicing—and who would try to dampen that? The consensus of America seems to be that the occasion should be one of unreserved celebration, because of the unfinished tasks before us.

It's well that we recognize our boy's war but there seems to be a tendency to underestimate its extent. To many people, the sole remaining job is that of completing the defeat of Japan — already so hastily begun — and that's the mistaken idea which should be put right.

V-E day in the last war—Armistice day—did indeed signal the end of the world conflict. But this second V-E day is a celebration of an entirely different nature. The end of the fighting in Europe and the ending in due course of the Pacific war, have ceased to mean finalities but will present merely completed incidents in the general upheaval which is ushering in a new era for mankind.

Europe is torn by an unprecedented destruction of human life and property. Its economic structure has been shattered. Much of it is suffering real hunger.

The whole setup of balance of power as we know it has been knocked into a cocked hat. Germany and Italy have disappeared as great powers. France is just beginning to recover. Russia is emerging as the dominant power of the eastern hemisphere. Britain has ceased to be the policeman of Europe.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—President Truman is finding it hard to maintain the honeymoon relationship he has enjoyed thus far with congress.

In the crisis of President Roosevelt's death, warmth and sincerities of cooperation flowed freely. But now Truman is coming up against those elements every chief executive must make, which please some and irritate others.

Chiefly they are decisions in which government departments urge him to take stands at odds with views of important figures or elements in congress.

It was his veto, at the demand of the war and navy departments, of the Shufeldt farm draft deferment measure which had strong support at the capitol, though not strong enough to overturn his veto.

Senator McFarland, D., Tenn., presiding officer of the senate was hurt by the President's reappointment of TVA Director David Lilienthal over the TVA's protests. Failure to reappoint Lilienthal would have rattled with new deal democrats.

Senator Trivette, R., Ohio, chairman of the GOP steering committee, was upset by the President's praise of OPA. Truman's talk of "irrepressible conflict" at a meeting in mid-June made him intend to take off the wraps and blast OPA.

These things tend to give a surly, exclusive in effect of rubbing thinner the cordial feelings former congressional colleagues had for Truman.

### CANNING SUGAR FORMS ON HAND

Application blanks for 1940 home canning sugar—limit, 15 pounds per person; maximum, 120 pounds to a family unit regardless of size or other departmental date Monday.

Application blanks should be read carefully, filled in accurately and mailed to the local war price and ration board, Carl N. Anderson, chief clerk, announced Saturday. Do not deliver them in person, he warned.

"Be sure to sign your name on the application where it says, 'Sign here.' Give your full mailing address. If you are getting your mail in care of anyone else, include that as part of the address. If the mail address is not absolutely accurate, the postoffice will return it," Anderson cautioned.

He also pointed out that if an application blank is not in absolute order, it will be returned to the applicant, and the proceeding of that application delayed.

"In no case may the rationing board issue more than 20 pounds of sugar per person for more than 100 pounds per family unit," but these blanks were printed before the OPA rule on the 16-pound limit. The 15- and 120-pound maximum per family unit, Anderson reminded consumers.

The local board will decide the number of pounds of canning sugar to allow each family. After determining how much canning sugar your family will be allowed, the board will mail these coupons to your mail address.

"When you get your home canning coupons, you must sign your name on each coupon. On each coupon you must also write the serial number of your war ration book four with you. The number in this book must be the same as the number you have written on each of your sugar coupons," Anderson said.

Oct. 31 Limit

Time limit for securing home canning sugar is Oct. 31.

The tardiness with which home canning sugar applications are processed, will depend entirely on the number of volunteers who help in the program.
