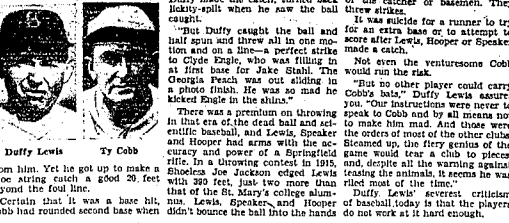

GERMAN PRISON EXPERIENCE TOLD

Experiences in German prison camps were detailed here Wednesday by Lt. Robert Conwell, Kimberly of the U. S. Infantry, who was prisoner for 23 months. He was principal speaker at the session of the Twin Falls Lions club at the Hotel Conwell, when also addressed by members of the club, and that in his opinion the Germans made no pretense of living up to the Geneva convention terms regarding prisoners of war.

Lost Weight. Prisoners, he said, lost anywhere from 10 to 20 pounds in weight, depending on the time they were held prisoner and the type of camp to which they were assigned. Poor conditions, he said, were general.

The Germans did, however, let American Red Cross gifts come through, but if the prisoners were found to be hoarding the food which the boxes contained, the food was confiscated and turned over to use of the members of the German camp.

Russians O. K. The officers spoke highly of the Russians, saying he had "a lot of contact" with them. The Russians, he said, treated German civilian prisoners much better than the Germans treated the Russian civilian prisoners captured.

During his talk, he said that American officers' duties have to do with work in the German camp and that the American and British soldiers were formed into labor battalions and were paid off in a form of German scrip, to be used in the prison canteens.

Liberated by Russians. The Kimberly officer was liberated by the Russians and was finally returned to the American forces after which he was sent home on leave.

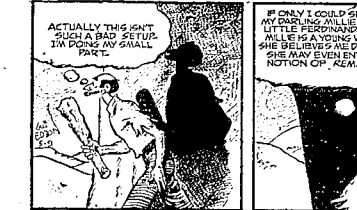

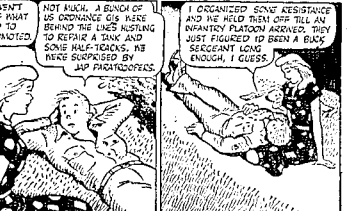

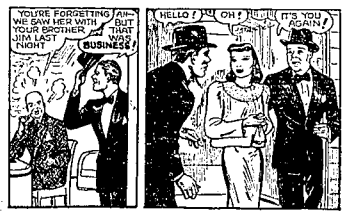

# ONE LONE WOMAN SEES SURRENDER

 Seventeen press and radio correspondents, including one woman, crowded into the school room at Reims and watched almost incredulously as the Germans silently signed the documents of unconditional surrender early Monday.  
 Margaret Ecker of Vancouver, was correspondent for the Canadian Press, the only woman in the party from Paris to witness the ceremony, said in a broadcast from Paris Tuesday that Gen. Eisenhower's first words after he dismissed the meal caterers were:  
 "I'm certainly glad to get rid of those damn Germans."  
 Mrs. Ecker added, in a classic understatement, that the signing was "probably the most impressive thing I have ever seen, or perhaps ever will see."  
 "We found it awfully hard to believe that those ordinary sheets of paper passing from hand to hand were really the surrender and the end of the war which has devastated the lives of our generation," she said.  
 W. W. Chappin, describing the historic scene in an NBC broadcast from Paris, said:  
 "Gen. Jodi signed the papers of surrender with a quivering hand. Then I heard him make one of the strangest little speeches in history, describing our achievement toward Germany because, he said, Germany has suffered too."  
 "I was so close that I could see a drop of perspiration running slowly down his face, and I noticed his quivering chin; his signature writing fish to the nightmarish history of nations."
