AIR RAID CELLAR AT WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Surprise! Surprise!—The White House has an air raid cellar. It was built 20 feet under the east lawn right after Pearl Harbor and now sits the hitherto-unknown thousands of sidewalk superintendents who watched its excavation and tell you all about it.

In those days the threat of air raids was very real, and the sidewalk superintendents were entrusted with a word about what was being done for the protection of the President, Roosevelt—except to his relatives and neighbors, of course, and to casual acquaintances. It was a fully guarded military secret until the commencing of restrictions were relaxed yesterday.

The shelter was built in zig-zag fashion. It has a "bombproof" ceiling about nine feet thick, made of concrete and reinforced steel.

It is reached by steps from the east wing of the White House and, as said before, it is 20 feet underground, which is pretty deep.

It connects with a big vault under the treasury across the area which once was used for storing huge stacks of spending money.

As an additional answer to German goons, the White House installed machine guns on the roof.

"The economic salvation of our own nation and other nations depends upon what we do with our leisure time."

Ferdinand A. Bahr, field representative of the federal security agency, office of community work, commented on the city recreational leaders at the Idaho Power auditorium Friday night.

Bahr explained that children get tired of playing football and said, "We are gradually getting everybody is not interested in the same thing."

He said that some persons are interested in music, others in dramatic life and some in outdoor life.

"In this intermountain country," Bahr declared, "we must educate our children to be able to enjoy leisure time."

BELGIAN "RULER" IN A TOUGH SPOT

By DEWITT MACKENZIE
 The leftist the sweeping success Europe seems reaching dangerous heights on the front of Belgium King Leopold, released recently by American troops near Salzburg, Austria, where he had been held prisoner by the Germans, reportedly has made it known that he wants to return to his capital for some time because of his "state of health." Actually, however, he was courted of his throne May 30, 1940, by an order approved by the Belgian cabinet in exile in Paris.

Leftist groups in Brussels shrug away the "state of health" explanation, saying that it's for parliament to decide whether Leopold is in position to fulfill the duties of king. He's on a tough spot, but of the great importance there is no one else to take of the monarchy. The extreme left has no use for royalty. It was shown in his private life three days after he surrendered Belgium to the Germans, thereby exposing the left flank of the British forces during the Battle of Belgium. His supporters declared that he had no other course than to capitulate to the invading army. He is especially since countless Belgian civilians had mingled with the invaders and were being killed in the swirling battle. Shouts of "treason" and "murder" were heard in the streets of Paris.

HITLER PLANNED TO KILL CAPTIVES

BERN, Switzerland, May 19 (AP)—Hitler wanted all American and British prisoners in the closing days of the war against Germany, a top official today told Prof. Carl J. Burkhardt, president of the International Red Cross committee.

Burkhardt revealed this after a press conference in which he discussed the difficulties of siding prisoners and the impossibility of entering concentration camps in Germany.

He did not name the Nazi official, but perhaps it was Himmler's SS adjutant, Ernst Kaltenbrunner, with whom Burkhardt conferred early in March.

Hitler even then lacked the power to enforce such wishes, Burkhardt said, and the Himmler group did not want to take the responsibility of prisoners in concentration camps apparently were not so fortunate.

Burkhardt, in a statement designed to refute San Francisco criticism, said the committee had made every effort to aid victims in concentration camps but that the children came from Ogdin. VICTORS PREPARE TO RELEASE NAZIS

WITH THE U. S. NINTH ARMY, Germany, May 19 (AP)—German prisoners of war soon may be streaming back home by the thousands following a careful interrogation and intelligence security by American army interrogators.

An army officer said orders have been received to screen all prisoners immediately and release those found not to be security hazards, war criminals or ardent Nazis.

The prisoners released will not be out from under military surveillance, since some allied units will be occupying their home town areas.

Released former members of the German army also will be forced to assume the burden of their own support, which otherwise would remain the problem of the American army.

Any cases offering even the slightest reason for suspicion will be returned to prisoner of war camps, according to present plan.

Some badly wanted war criminals—such as the traitor of Carleton, who engineered the shooting of 1,100 political prisoners—are known to be hiding in prisoner camps, designated as surrendered German soldiers.

Hundreds of drugs, including the sulfa, synthetic quinine, and aspirin, are made from coal.

HITLER'S DOUBLE ONLY IMAGINARY

SOUTHERN GERMANY, May 19 (AP)—The much-discussed theory that Adolf Hitler had a double was discredited today by his private secretary of the last two years.

Those were the last stories he never had a double and never used one," said Gerhardt Herrgessell, who was perhaps as close to the fuchser as any man.

Herrgessell said also Hitler hoped desperately to die in the very act that there would be a split in the allies over Russia.

Even after Hitler abandoned that hope only a few days before German capitulation, Herrgessell said, Joseph von Goebbels and Joseph Paul Goebbels clung to the delusion.

Even after Goebbels and Col. Gen. Gustaf Jodl, among others, spent long hours in the eagle's nest, without a word before German capitulation, Herrgessell said, the struggle with Britain and the United States was still against Russia.

One of Hitler's last orders to Goering and Goebbels was to plant a story with British intelligence agents that the assistance had been 500,000 Germans to use in a war against England, Herrgessell said.

Hitler apparently believed he could convince the English of a Bolshevik danger and thus bring the thumping themes—up until April.

YUGOSLAV FORCE IN ITALY FEARED

ROME, May 19 (AP)—Field Marshal Harold Alexander declared today that Marshal Tito apparently intended to resort to force in backing Yugoslavia's claims to northeastern Italy and southern Austria, a course of action "all too reminiscent of Hitler."

Belgrade radio broadcast Tito's reply that the Yugoslav army, the same as other allied armies, has the right to remain in territory it liberated and the presence of his troops in the disputed zone would not "prejudice decisions of the peace conference as to whom these territories belong."

Asserting that "we cannot throw away the United States and British," Alexander told his land, sea and air forces in the Mediterranean theater that all his efforts to "come to a friendly agreement" with the Yugoslav leader had failed.

"The question has been checked by the United States and British," he said, and they now have "taken up the matter directly with us."

"We are now waiting to hear whether Tito is prepared to cooperate in accepting a peaceful settlement of his territorial claims to establish by force," he said.

Alexander said the Soviet government had been kept fully informed, but there was no official indication whether Russia actively participated or what her stand might be.

JEROME, May 19—Lieut.-Col. Dett E. Smith, commanding officer at the Rupert prisoner of war camp, was guest speaker here at the meeting of the Rotary club, and told how the labor program is being handled through "camps" in Idaho, Oregon and Montana.

There have been 700 prisoners allocated to the three counties of Jerome, Cassia and Blaine, all of whom will be worked out of camp from Paul.

Colonel Smith stated that it is the policy of the camp to work out crews of approximately 20 prisoners each, under armed guard. These laborers are transported to an end from the camp to their work under assignments effected by various farm labor contracting groups.

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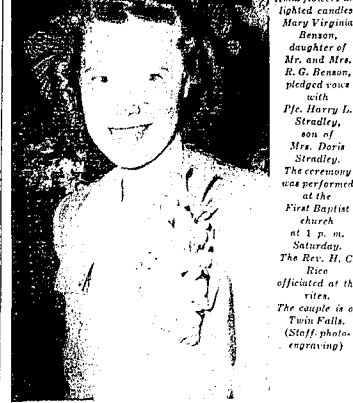

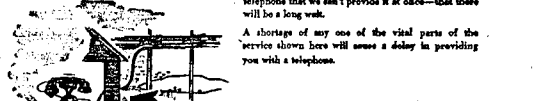

"Stretch anything yet?" we called to those ahead.

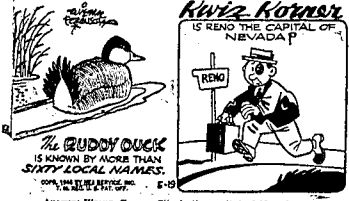
