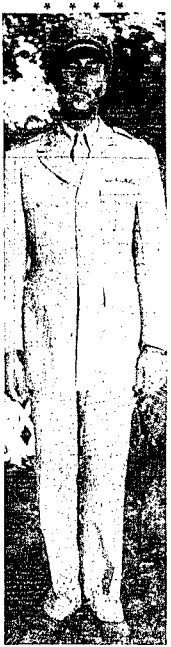

Col. Kempton Says Courage of Yanks, Nurses Unparalleled

BURLY, June 21—Col. M. A. (Alvin) Kempton, one of Major Valery's higher ranking officers now home from overseas on leave, believes the American soldier and the American nurse symbolize the greatest courage and devotion to duty ever known to civilization.

"The thing that impressed me most about the American soldier, he said, 'is his ingenuity, sense of humor and courage. His ability to live on the edge of his nerves, his action is not duplicated anywhere in the world, and it has saved countless lives. I have seen the American soldier in a tight spot, and the army nurses are deserving of the same amount of praise they could properly receive. They do marvelous work, and are right on the spot at all times, even in the thickest of spots and under actual fire. Their courage and devotion to duty is unparalleled.

"We were quartered in a hotel there, and were bombed two nights in a row. Much of the town was hit and damaged, but the hotel did not sustain a direct hit although all of the windows were blown out, and for 34 months, with flying glass."

Col. Kempton, who was overseas for 34 months, with flying glass, in the service since 1941. "It was with the group, stationed in England, which dropped the first bomb on Europe," he said. "Twining, it was in 1942, and the raid was on Le Havre, France."

Colonel Kempton wears five campaign stars for Africa, Algeria-Tunisia, Sicilian, south Italian and north Italian. He was born in Twin Falls, and was graduated from Twin Falls high school. He was awarded the service as a first lieutenant, having received a reserve commission from the University of Idaho in 1933. He is a graduate of the University of Utah, receiving his A. B. degree, and also holds the degree of master of science and education from the University of Idaho. He has started toward his PhD at the University of Southern California where he was decorated and has been called into service. He has taught in Burley high school, Castleford high school and Albion State Normal.

BUHL, June 21—More than 500 persons from this area, crowding the Buhl high school auditorium to capacity last night, heard Mrs. Margaret Hays read a statement to the Philippine Islands, relate experiences of her capture and internment by the Japanese.

Mrs. Zeala Bellini, Twin Falls pianist, also featured on the same program, played eight selections.

The meeting was a joint program sponsored by the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs of Buhl.

13 Years

Mrs. LaPorte laught in the Philippine Islands for 13 years before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

"We awoke on the morning of Dec. 7, 1941, to find that the Japs were in the house," Mrs. LaPorte said. "I was then teaching at LaGrass, in southern Luzon."

"We lived for five months without talking to the outside world," she said. "When we were finally captured, we were surrounded by machine guns and fired bayonets, and then taken to La Grap, placed aboard a Jap ship and taken to Manila."

"In August, 1944, we were all rounded up and taken to Los Baños camp. Here we were given 300 calories of food each day, and that is but half enough each day for a person living in this bed."

Perfect Rescue

Mrs. LaPorte said that their rescue at Los Baños "has been pronounced as the most perfect military action on record."

"We had only one death, that of an American soldier, we were all freed," Mrs. LaPorte said.

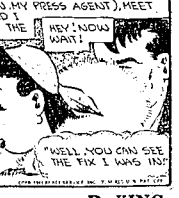

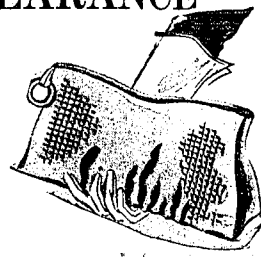
