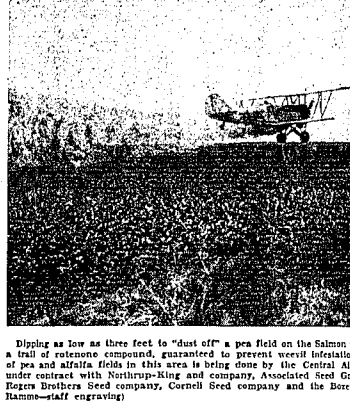

SALT LAKE CITY, June 23 (AP)—One thousand cheering wives, sweethearts and parents thronged outside Temple Square today to greet the returning soldiers of the Utah Veterans of the Black Hawk division. The men were to be processed before leaving for their homes and some of them will be discharged today.

Byre Morgan, fire aid for the granting service, stated that the boy became confused when he and two other men, Carl Alexander and Rollin McKelth, Glenna Ferry, were fighting a 100-acre fire in that vicinity. He was first missed at 11 p. m. Thursday, and his companions hunted all night. Wicher became separated from his companions and turned the wrong direction, heading into the woods.

30 Homeless Help

Morgan was in charge of fighting three other fires, all caused by electrical storms, and didn't reach home until Friday morning, but when he learned of the boy's disappearance, he collected 30 men who rode to the vicinity of the fire on horseback and continued their search until the boy was finally located Saturday morning.

Government planes from Mountain Home flew over the burned area Friday searching for the youth. A signal fire was kept all night, but although Wicher was only three miles distant, intervening hills obscured it.

Hungry and Thirsty

He had had no food since Thursday evening and his water bag had gone dry during the last Friday. Eshovers Friday evening provided some benefit, to him. He drank water that had collected on the rocks.

GOODING REFUSES TO ENDORSE ROAD

GOODING, June 23—The Gooding Chamber of Commerce has declined against a resolution favoring the completion of a 67-mile gap in the Salmon river road from Riggin to Salmon City. The organization had been asked by Sen. George Brunt, Idaho Falls, to pass the resolution and forward it to the U. S. bureau of public roads and to the Idaho congressional delegation.

I intended the man to chart the route and I was plenty tough on him. Apparently the reason he was passing the first sign of skill was that he couldn't understand it. Or if he could, there was no time to read it and fly the plane at the same time. In any event he was lost over the Himalayas for four hours on the crossing—and when he brought the B-17 in, Kunning, that afternoon, just I was able to start back with another cargo. He showed the first sign of skill and flying sense that he had shown all day. The plane was on its last few strokes of strength. One of the engines was dead and the other on the same side was coughing as he came in over the rim hills surrounding the field; but in spite of that he brought his ship down with no more than a violent jolt and a near ground loop.

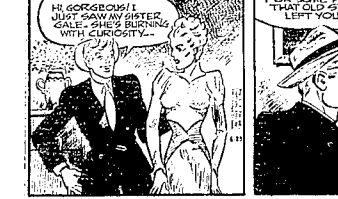

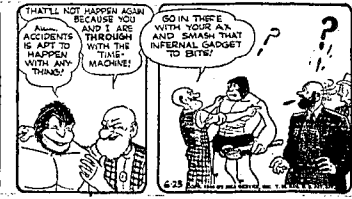
