Trial Battle for \$200,000 Estate Nearing End Here

It was indicated at noon Friday that the disputed estate trial of Maynard Wayne Johnson against his step-mother, Mrs. Gertrude Wilder Johnson, and her sister, Mrs. Jerry Wilder, now in its 11th day, would be concluded tonight or tomorrow morning.

Los Angeles, formerly of Twin Falls and Pocatello, claimed that she was the widow of Johnson, was unduly influenced by his second wife, so that an asserted agreement under which the father was to have held the property in trust was violated, and the property divided, and the court ordered her sister.

The estate was valued in excess of \$200,000. Johnson also demanded that an accounting of the father's business affairs, near his death in October, 1938, at Little Rock, Ark., be made.

District Judge Guy Stevens, Blackfoot, presiding at the trial, has indicated that he will hear separately the demand for accounting.

Rebuttal testimony completed by Johnson just before court recessed noon Friday. He was recalled to the stand by the father's attorney, and testified that the father had cross-examined by P. F. Parry of plaintiffs counsel.

Robert Meach, who testified that he had seen the father's previous testimony that his relations between himself and his father had been friendly, and that he had seen the father in the hospital during the early 1930s, he related how his father had been in a Chrysler sedan in the spring of 1932.

His father later that year visited at the Johnson home in Garden, en route to Little Rock to make his home, and shortly after leaving had a check for Mrs. Rose Lee Johnson. The letter was introduced in evidence.

It was part of the agreement between the first and second wives that Johnson be paid a monthly settlement for life.

When the agreement was made, Mrs. Wilder testified that she had entered into a contract with Johnson to purchase a house in Twin Falls and four houses in Little Rock, holdings of the father's estate, and that she had made a down payment of \$10,000 on the apartments. The arrangement was that she was to have the apartments, and the father's share was "carried on through" between Dr. Johnson and Mr. Johnson.

On cross-examination by Parry, who testified that she had been told that she had been built up in this apartment? Mrs. Wilder answered:

"There is \$120 in cash, a few dollars in bonds, and I have 12 bonds valued at \$187.50 each."

Parry then asked, "You have no other assets?"

Mrs. Wilder replied, "I asked my attorney to manage the apartments and I had no other assets."

Infant Farms Run by Nazis

BAD WEISER, Germany, June 29—The baby factories Hitler built for the SS are closing, but not for lack of business.

Thousands of babies conceived by the German aurochs will be born in the next seven months, many of them to starved mothers, instead of coming into the world in such idyllic surroundings as this Bavarian garden spot, they will be born at home or in city hospitals.

Under the Nazi regime dozens of recently homes were built, many about Bavaria and in quiet resort towns like Bad Weiser. Shattered babies were commended.

Maintaining them was the national socialist Volkswirtschaft, the state's welfare branch which looked after the babies intended to be Germany's future leaders.

The Nazi party is defunct and bombs have stopped falling in the cities. The young Nazis and their leaders are going home to have their babies.

Under the Nazi mass production program babies came cheap compared with costs in the United States. Those who could not afford to be charged three and a half to four marks a day before the birth of the baby, all marks a day for 30 days after the birth, and four and a half marks a day thereafter. All doctors and medical costs were included and those who could not afford it paid nothing. Value of a mark is 10 cents.

Decrease in Beet Plants Is Recorded

Is Recorded

Reporting a decrease of 17,000 acres in sugar beet plantings, a bulletin from the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the department of agriculture shows sugar beet acreage in Idaho in 1945 was 67,000 acres; 49,000 acres in 1943 and 50,000 acres in 1944.

Cropings harvested were 62,000 in 1933-1942, 42,000 in 1943 and 43,000 in 1944.

Idaho was shown as the second largest producer of sugar beets by short tons from the acre, with an average yield of 12.8 tons in 1933-42. California was first, with 14.5 short tons yield from the acre, with Colorado a close second with 12.7 short tons from the acre.

In 1945, Idaho was squeezed out of first place by Utah by the slight margin of one-tenth of one per cent of a short ton per acre. Idaho in 1943 yielded 13.5 short tons per acre, while Utah's short ton yield per acre was 14.5.

Third place in 1945 went to California, with 13.4 short tons per acre for sugar beets. Colorado trailed, ed into third place with 12.2 short tons per acre.

Record first place in 1944 with 16.9 short tons per acre, Idaho was second with 14.4 short tons per acre and Utah squeezed out Colorado with 12.8 short tons per acre. Colorado had 12.2 short tons per acre, sugar beet production in 1944.

Now, with 1245 districts in operation the task of writing an individual letter to each of you has become more difficult during these war times, and for that reason I am reluctantly relying on this report of your report. During the receipt of your report."

After that:

"I could expand this idea but I am sure that you share my belief that democracy is rooted in the soil—and well as in men's hearts—and that our way of life is secure only as long as the soil of the farm produces food for the nation. It is Bennett, chief of the soil conservation service of the United States department of agriculture, Washington."
