

Jap Ship Searched by Yanks

GUAM, July 6 (AP)—A United States destroyer twice intercepted a Japanese hospital ship, eventually sinking 1,000 men and sick members of the bypassed Japanese garrison at Wake Island and allowed the ship to proceed toward Japan.

The U. S. S. Murray sent men aboard the Takasago June 27 and again yesterday, to determine if she was on a legitimate errand of mercy or transmitting Japanese troops to the homeland under protection of the Red Cross.

First search was within 100 miles north of Wake Island, the second 100 miles east. The ship was picked up by the cargo of Japanese, believed to be the great bulk of the remaining Japanese troops in the war.

The boarding party yesterday found the ship was carrying 974 military patients suffering from malaria, typhoid and other diseases.

She was allowed to proceed toward the homeland. The Murray was exercising its right of visit and search provided for under international law.

She also stopped the hospital ship on the Wake Island. The ship was found to be carrying a crew of 157, including civilians, a band and a radio station.

Presence of the civilians was not explained in the headquarters and was not in the 1941 Geneva Convention.

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—The conservative press maintained today that yesterday's general elections had "almost certainly" resulted in a victory for Prime Minister Churchill's government but labor party organs held the conservative lead to be a "slight majority in parliament."

Results will not be known until July 26, after the absence of a soldier vote is counted. Observers estimated there was a near record turnout estimated at almost 70,000,000 voters—80 per cent of the eligible electorate of 300,000,000—lured by a general election and a hectic campaign battle over the Conservative program of free enterprise and the labor platform of nationalization of industry.

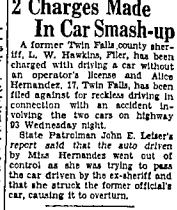
