4 in Fire Trap Get To Safety

SHOSHONE, July 25—Four Mexicans, missing in the 200,000-acre range fire between Minidoka and Dietrich, which has raged since Saturday, were reported safe today.

Three, from the Steamboat Power company labor camp, were located last night and this morning in the vicinity of Black Ridge by members of the fire-fighting team.

The fire is well under control from Steamboat Lake and only one fire is still burning near Steamboat. A consolidated crew of approximately 50 men is working that area, and we expect to have this completely out by Thursday morning.

The Mexicans, who have fought the fire, along with other fire fighters from the area, were taken from the power company camp near Black Ridge and Steamboat.

The fire was burning through an area between Wild Horse and Black Ridge at noon. Fire-fighters will continue to battle the scattered flames around the clock.

Portland, July 25 (UP)—Two men who directed the strategic bombing of Germany will share supervision over the Superfortresses that are fastening the Japanese empire.

That became known in an army air force announcement that Lt. Gen. Nathan P. Twining will command the 20th air force, and Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle will command the 8th air force.

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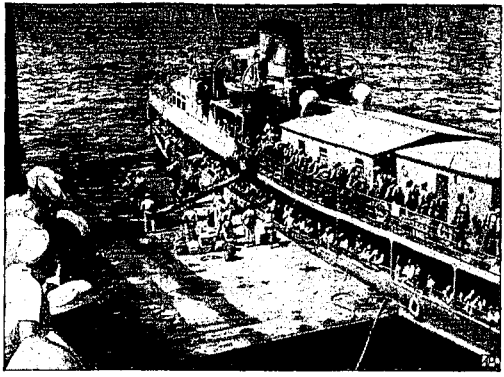

2 Smashers Selected to Crush Japan

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Convicts Free to Kill, Prison Probe Charge

LANSING, Mich., July 25 (UP)—Two additional reports were awaited today on an investigation of Jackson state prison by Attorney General Detmehrs who said it was possible convicts gained furloughs from the prison to commit murder.

Detmehrs said in his first reports that Mike Selik and Harry Fleisher, on trial in Detroit with two others on charges of conspiring to kill Sen. Warren G. Hoover, were able to visit convicted murderers at the prison.

Detmehrs said Selik conferred privately with imprisoned members of the notorious Detroit Purple gang before Hoover's death.

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Third Fleet Sends Great Waves of Planes Boring In Fog to Pound Enemy

GUAM, July 25 (AP)—The Japanese home island shuddered under tons of steel today as the tenacious third fleet sent great waves of carrier planes boring in through billowing fog and the flaming guns of warships pounded coastal invasion defenses.

Carrier planes smashed for the second consecutive day at smoking remnants of Japan's dazed navy in the huge Kure naval base after heavily damaging seven warships yesterday.

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz did not reveal the strength of today's assault but it was presumed equal to yesterday's 1,200 plane strike.

Admiral and other military installations on the main home island of Honshu also were hit. Returning pilots reported destruction of Japanese planes on the ground. Associated Press Correspondent Richard O'Malley, aboard the carrier flagship, said a thick blanket of fog closed in late in the day.

Often cruisers and destroyers moved boldly inshore and shelled another Japanese fighting line—the southern base and airfield at Kushimoto.

Tokyo radio heard in London reported that anti-air warships bombarded Kanagawa prefecture on Honshu, just south of Tokyo bay. Kanagawa is across the mouth of the bay from Osaka, which was shelled by warships July 14.

Japan yesterday hit 20 American carrier-borne planes ranged north and were striking airfields and transportation facilities on Hokkaido island, north of Honshu, was mentioned. The New American Broadcasting company.

More Tokyo and warship went into action today. The fleet's main force of 10 carriers and 100 other ships and 1,200 planes accounted for one of the heaviest attacks in the Pacific.

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OREGON FIRE RAGES

PORTLAND, July 25 (UP)—The heaviest today held the sole hope of thousands of firefighters to halt a 500-acre western Oregon forest fire raging east and west at the will of changing winds.

Oregon State Forester Nels B. Rogers declared that the firefighters were battling on a powerful log of incandescent dimensions.

Heavy rain, he said, was all that could check a fire advancing toward the menacing for the second time in the last 24 hours.

Fire-fighters were working in the vicinity of Cocharan and Glenwood, Oregon.

Twelve planes were flying over the fire to gather data for use in attacking new fires sweeping through rugged mountain terrain. Just dense smoke clouds had not all obliterated the fire from the mountain peaks.

Primary officials said they were working on a number of fires on the west side of the Tillamook fire. The fire is now about 100 acres.

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Idaho Crops Perk up in Hot Weather

BOISE, July 25 (UP)—Continued hot weather proved generally beneficial to Idaho's farm crops during the week ended July 21, although it advanced the harvest of north Idaho's grain and dry pea crop approximately one week, and reduced correspondingly the anticipated yield of the Eastern Idaho extension service reported here today.

The growth of grain and dry peas began on the available farm labor supply during the week. In other parts of the state, the harvest is about Aug. 1, with the peak expected from Aug. 10 to 15.

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Pilot Saves Another Who Is Blinded

ADM. McCAIN'S FLAGSHIP, off Japan, July 25 (AP)—A pilot blinded by fluid from a shattered hydraulic system was gotten to safety by another pilot as his "seize-eye" returned from the bombing of the big Japanese naval base at Kure.

A flak hit had burst the hydraulic system in the plane of Lt. Rexford Jones. The generator was shot, the propeller windmill and the bomb bay doors stuck open.

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Sleep Shift Troops Like New Scheme

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., July 25 (AP)—Appearing less fatigued and grayer than many previous troop shifts at Camp Hood, members of the 4th and second divisions arriving at Fort Sam Houston today about their "sleep shift" plan.

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Japan Suicide Attacks on U.S. Next?

MOSCOW, July 25 (AP)—The Japanese news agency Domei was quoted in the Red Star today as saying that Japan would direct direct operations to bomb the United States.

Domei said these devices, flying at a height of more than 50,000 feet, would reach the United States in a little more than 10 hours.

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Yanks Keen To Get Hold Of Cameras

SOUTHERN OBERMAYR, July 23 (AP)—Apart from ticks to the United States, the things most demanded by American soldiers in these parts are cameras.

The particular craze, spreading like wildfire, is for the latest models and the demand is almost as great for the job.

Anybody who has one and is willing to part with it can just about guarantee a crowd of soldiers. There are unconfirmed reports that in Paris they will bring as much as a thousand dollars—three or four times the normal price. But that isn't too astonishing. Paris prices bring what they are. Women's high quality air pianos, for example, are priced there at \$60.

Wherever you see a group of American soldiers you see at least a few small cameras peering around their necks and more than likely their eyes are fixed each other where they got film.

Germany who managed to conceal their better cameras for any at all—from the first waves of advancing soldiers now bring them out of hiding only when they want something in a bad way, such as cigarettes or food. It's generally conceded that when things get really tough the cameras are more valuable than the soldiers and attachments will be dug up and sacrificed for food. Barter markets are rising and the longer they wait the more they'll get.

Among Americans who are going to Paris, trouble and expense to get hold of the best cameras currently available here is the only thing that counts. That when they get home they'll find that American manufacturers will have broken just about everything that will make the best German models look sick.

Title to Metals Formula Sought

JAMES E. COX, naming S. T. Hamilton and Jack Perantatos, statutory title to the new formula for Magic Valley Metals, Inc., as defendants, filed yesterday in district court to retrieve clear title to a process and formula to extract metals from minerals and ores.

The plaintiff states in his complaint that he granted the defendants the exclusive right to use within the state of Idaho, between August 25, 1941 and August 1, 1951, the right to use the formula and to receive 25 per cent of all metals extracted from minerals and ores.

Because the plaintiff "cannot assert title to the formula and another unit said contract is determined null, the plaintiff seeks court order compelling the defendants to execute a new contract.

Filed by Stephan, Twin Falls, is attorney for the plaintiff.

The bride graduated from Twin Falls high school and attended the College of Idaho at Caldwell.

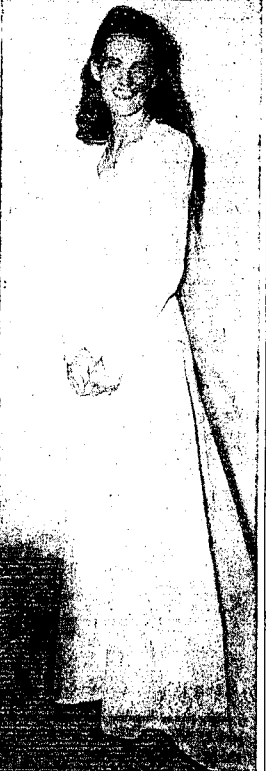
The bridegroom graduated from Twin Falls high school. He has been in the Pacific theater for two to the past 40 months and is home on a 45-day leave.
