13 Killed When Big Army Bomber Punctures Empire State Building

NEW YORK, July 28 (AP)—An army bomber, flying low through heavy fog, punctured the 102-story Empire State building today and killed at least 13 persons in one of New York's most bizarre disasters.

Police said the death toll might exceed 15. Rescue workers continued tonight to search the burned and twisted wreckage of the 79th floor, through which the B-25 "Billy Mitchell" bomber plummeted at 9:49 a. m.

Smoke and flames enveloped upper floors of the 1,245-foot tower—world's tallest building—and three explosions jarred midtown Manhattan, strewn broken glass and debris five blocks around.

Three of the dead were aboard the bomber, the 1st Bedford Mass. The crew had talked with La Guardia field here and radio, and was on its way to land at Newark, N. J.

Other bodies were burned beyond recognition. Of the hundreds who fled to safety, some in panic, at least 20 were injured by blazing gasolene.

89 Senators Favor Pact; 2 Opposed

WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP)—The senate thundered, 89 to 2, approval today of the United Nations charter, setting in motion the machinery for a world organization armed with force to keep future peace.

In a history making roll call before jam-packed galleries, 89 senators voted loudly and clearly for American participation in a 60-nation league founded primarily on the principle of equal action by the United States, Great Britain, Russia, France and China.

Only two, Senators Langer, R., of Pa. and Shpatz, R., Minn., said "no" to a ratification action reversing the policy the senate established 26 years ago when it rejected Woodrow Wilson's league of nations.

Sen. Hiram Johnson, R., Calif., asked ailing members to oppose the league then and voted against this charter in committee, was absent. It is in favor of Johnson.

**Nazi Plan to Rule England Made Public**

**HAMBURG, July 28 (AP)**—The German high command's secret plan for administration of England, which called for deportation to the continent of the male population between the ages of 17 and 45, now is in British hands.

The manuscript discloses that Hitler planned to complete occupation of England before Sept. 9, 1940, and transformation of the country and its resources into German hands was to be completed within six months.

The plan was to turn over to the only one obvious objective, the battle of Britain. The blueprint for England in defeat was mapped out a year before the Nazis invaded Russia by a staff of German administrators.

England, experts working under guidance of Marshal von Brauchitsch, former commander in chief of the German army.

Designed to prevent sabotage, the deportation plan would be carried out in all radio transmitting apparatus and spare parts. A contest of suitable ciphers, strict radio regulations and a firm minimum radio transmitting system were to be enforced.

"Keep your eyes open for developments on this Columbia Valley agricultural project," warned Colonel Hopkins. "In my opinion, it is a dangerous thing if not handled rightly. If it is assumed with the advice of the western pioneer, who knows we might be protected, but if not handled properly, we are in danger of losing our water, and that means moving time for Magic Valley."

**WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP)**—The war labor board for the first time today ordered a guaranteed full employment plan inserted in a labor-management contract.

The industry member dissenting, it upheld the New York regional board in directing that such a plan be inserted in the first contract being negotiated for 350 restaurant employees by the Times-Mexican shoe stores in the New York Metropolitan area.

The United Retail Wholesale and Department Stores Employees' Union (CIO) represents the men. The plan provides for a guarantee of 44 hours a week for 83 consecutive weeks per year for regular full-time employees and five nights and a Saturday weekly for 85 weeks for regular part-time workers.

**'No Coddling' Wanted,' Says Returned Vet**

The "experts" who tell the public how to adjust returning servicemen should consult a few more men in uniform, says a returned veteran.

That is the opinion voiced Saturday by First Lieut. Albert T. Becher, here on 28-day furlough after serving 40 months in the south Pacific.

"We don't want to be coddled and bribed. We want our families and friends to treat us like they've glad to see us. We don't want to be coddled as if we'd been away for six weeks, and that it was only yesterday we'd walked together," he said.

He refuted the idea that civilians should talk to the men about everything BUT the war and their experiences.

"If you ask a serviceman a few questions and he opens up, fine. If he indicates that he'd rather talk about something else, that's okay. Some of us like to talk about others like to keep shut."

"A lot of it depends on our family backgrounds. That is, like the individuals we are—not people 'going' to overseas."

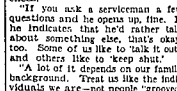
Lieutenant Becher is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Becher, 1220 Fourth.

**Cannibalism Among Japs Discovered**

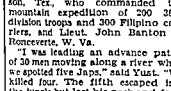
WITH 35TH DIVISION, Luzon, and 35th Division, Luzon, July 28 (AP)—Strong evidence of cannibalism among isolated Japs in the stragglers, although possibly on a small scale, was reported today by a member of an American patrol returned from the heart of the Sierra Madre mountains.

Others told of finding one Japanese soldier's body mutilated after leaving it unwatched for an hour.

They said one of two prisoners taken on their six-day mountain trek was members of the auxiliary and camp present and also the Rev. Jackson of the Nazarene church in Buh.

The revolting evidence was reported by Capt. Charles Vist of Buh, who commanded the mountain expedition of 200 35th division troops and 300 Filipino carriers, and Lieut. John Banton of Buh, Va.

It was leading an advance patrol of 20 men moving along a river, where they spotted five Japs," said Vist. "We killed four. The fifth escaped into the jungle but lost his pack and food. When we returned to the four bodies about an hour later, we found that the skin had been peeled from the thigh of one of the dead Japs—a large piece peeled downward from the thigh."

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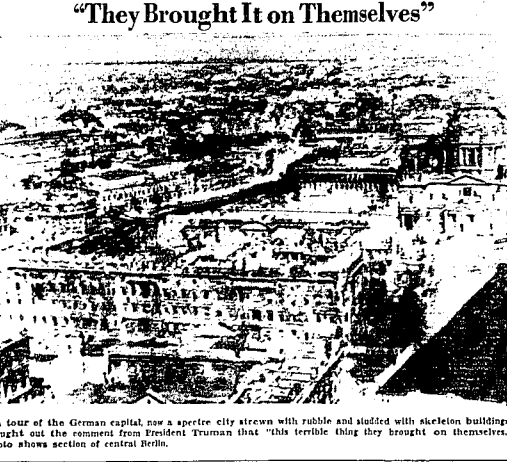

PARIS, July 28 (AP)—A redeployment program for United States nurses was announced today by the army chief surgeon who said that more than 40 per cent of the 11,948 now in the European theater had volunteered for further overseas service.

The program, designed to shift nurses and to discharge them, will be carried out in three phases. The first phase is to shift nurses to the Pacific theater...

Preference for return to the United States, in addition to the point score, will be based on whether the nurse was married and had husbands in the United States, and on physical condition.

Unmarried nurses with scores of between 45 and 60 will be placed in army of occupation hospitals, or redployed to the Pacific theater...

Unmarried nurses with scores of less than 45 will be sent directly to the Pacific or placed in occupation army hospitals in Europe.

## Tea Good Basis For Majority of Summer Drinks

By GAYNER MADDOX, NEA Staff Writer

According to a recent survey, iced tea, lemonade and cola drinks are leading summer beverages in the United States.

Careful preparation is important. You can't just throw a drink together and expect it to be good. In making iced tea the rules for making hot tea are followed, except that the amount of tea is divided to take care of dilution caused by the ice.

Tea is often used as a base for a summer punch. Here are directions for making one:

One quart hot freshly brewed tea, 12 mint sprigs, 8 teaspoons powdered sugar, 6 whole cloves, 4 limes, 1 cup lemon juice, 1 bottle carbonated water.

Four cups boiling water, 3 tablespoons tea, 15 mint leaves, 2 cups orange juice, 6 teaspoons lemon juice, 1/4 cup honey.

Four cups boiling water over the tea in a porcelain glass or earthenware pot and steep for five minutes. Combine the orange and lemon peels and mint leaves and pour the hot strained tea over these.

To make lemonade, allow for each person served: 1 lemon, 1 to 3 tablespoons sugar or honey, 1 cup cold water, ice.

Extract lemon juice. Add sugar to taste. Strain to remove seeds. Add ice. Serve over ice in large glasses. Garnish with lemons.

Here is a recipe which uses honey instead of sugar:

Four cups boiling water, 3 tablespoons tea, 15 mint leaves, 2 cups orange juice, 6 teaspoons lemon juice, 1/4 cup honey.

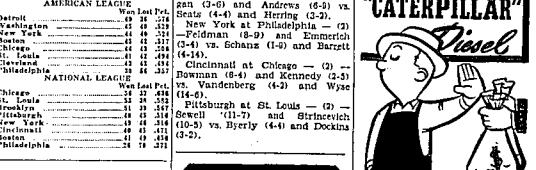

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### Japs Reach Shell Shock Spot in War

There's an old oriental proverb, "There's no old oriental proverb," that says it's difficult to dream up a way—short of unconditional surrender—to denigrate itself from the war which it precipitated, and there are many signs that nerves are badly frayed.

We can say without fear of exaggeration that Japan already is suffering from shell shock. Taking advantage of this, the allies are pouring both material and psychological warfare into the enemy.

The Potsdam ultimatum, demanding unconditional surrender with the alternative of "prompt and utter destruction," has been followed by an unprecedented warning that certain specified cities are to be destroyed by incendiary bombs. In short, we are calling our shots. We learn, too, that the allies have stepped up their military time table for the defeat of Japan.

Now the strength of this psychological warfare is being tested. We can and will implement it. The psychological will be transmitted into the material in short order—and the Japs know it. They know there's exact truth in that—Gen. James H. Doolittle's forecast that American bombers will level Japanese cities and transform the country into a nation of nomads.

To be sure, the Japanese news agency, Domei, says nippon will choose "utter destruction" to unconditional surrender. But that lacks supreme authority and is contradicted by tacit admissions that Japan is best by superior force. The Tokyo government still pursues its treasure hunt, looking for some opening that will soften that "unconditional surrender."

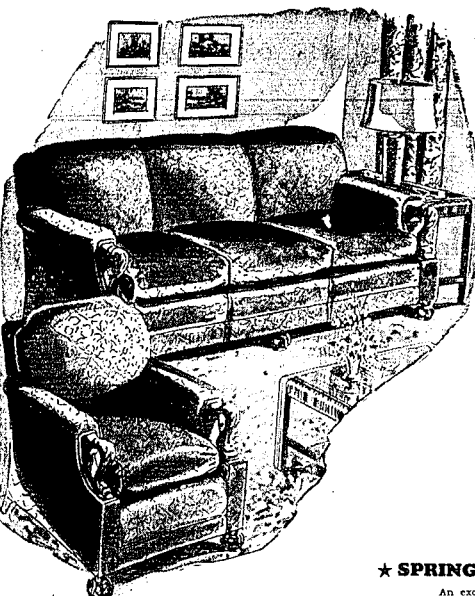

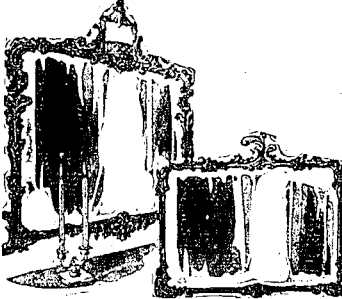

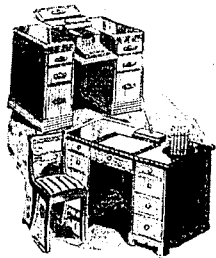
