Reporters to Get Break in Polish News

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP) — The big three look "note" that the Polish provisional government has agreed to full reporting by allied newsmen, and said they had "no doubts" that similar freedom would assist in former axis satellite countries.

At two points in the Potsdam communiqué special reference was made to the freedom of reporters to let the world what is going on in Poland, Bulgaria, Romania, Hungary and Finland.

The matter of getting out their ship work without undue censorship had been expected, however, that President Truman would make sure the problem of getting observers on the spot. There has been considerable difficulty in getting Russian permission for American newsmen to enter these countries.

Freedom of the press was promised in Germany, subject to military security.

Peace Terms More Drastic Than in 1919

By Louis F. Lochner
DETTMOLD, Aug. 3 (AP)— President Truman, Premier Stalin and Prime Minister Attlee still are pondering the world report on their terms last night over a period of 17 days submitted to the world by the German government in a document which was made public today.
 The conditions imposed on defeated Germany make the Versailles treaty look like child's play.
 2. The big three intend firmly to hold the world's fate in their hands as final arbiters.
 3. Soviet Russia emerges as the dominant power in Europe.
 4. Soviet Russia, in control of Koenigsberg and former German Baltic regions east of that city, has enormously improved her position as a maritime power.
 Pacific War Endorsed
 5. The western allies' war in the Pacific received the endorsement of Premier Stalin, in that the Russian leader agreed that Italy should be restored by an early peace treaty for joining the war against Japan.
 6. Italy, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Finland will be back on a peace basis long before Germany can hope for such a thing.
 Germany will pay for her folly in unleashing the second world war.
 The end of the first war left Germany industry and shipping—two of her greatest economic assets—virtually intact. The Versailles treaty also permitted the development of her civil aviation on a scale.
 The Potsdam conference agreement breaks up German cartels and trusts, puts an end to all German industry potentially servicable to or controllable in any way whatsoever in countries such world competitors in shipping as the Hamburg lines and prohibits all German activities of any kind.
 Shattered as Export Nations
 Potsdam finally tells the Germans to concentrate on agriculture and production, domestic industries, thus shattering any hopes they may have that Germany again will become a great exporting nation with interests throughout the world.
 Territorially, Germany loses not only all she gained by the Brown-heating negotiation of Adolf Hitler—such as Austria and the Sudetenland—by conquest—such as Alsace-Lorraine and Poland—but she must give up some of her most valuable regions of Germany proper—such as Austria and the Sudetenland sections of Germany.
 The age-long dream of German colonies must be buried forever.
 By the wording of the Potsdam agreement the United States and Britain visibly acknowledged their interest in Bulgaria, Finland, Hungary and Romania except that these areas represent areas which assured full freedom of movement to report in these countries.

Feeders Can Get Federal Payment

JEROME, Aug. 3.—According to an announcement today by County Chairman L. E. Pool of the ACA of Feeds, Jerome county cattle feeders can apply for back cattle production payment of 10 cents per hundredweight on good and choice grades of cattle weighing 800 pounds or more, and sold to a licensed slaughterer for at least the minimum stabilization price. In 1945 this is \$14.70 per hundred. These payments are made on a basis similar to that used for dairy production payments.
 This is the first meat production payment made directly to livestock feeders who are encouraged to feed more cattle, including both those purchased and those raised, to good choice grades. The program is designed to help hold the live animal inflation by preventing sharp increases in retail prices which might lead to uncontrolled increases in wages and other economic factors, Mr. Pool said.
 To be eligible for payment, a feeder must certify on his application that he owned the cattle at least 30 days before their sale, that the cattle weighed at least 600 pounds when sold; that the cattle brought not less than the minimum price for the good grade; and that the cattle were sold to a slaughterer at an authorized slaughterer.
 These payments will be made from funds of the commodity credit corporation of which \$60 million has been authorized. Further details of this program will be furnished farmers by their local AAA committees.

Farm Program Submitted by S. D. Editor

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—W. H. Bond, editor of the Mitchell, S. D. Daily Republic, has submitted to the agriculture department's reorganization committee a well-financed "peacetime farm program" which would add \$10,000,000 to \$25,000,000 to the nation's annual income.
 Secretary of Agriculture Clinton J. Anderson invited Bond to join the committee as a consultant. The group is composed of well-known agricultural experts, headed by Milton Eisenhower, president of Kansas State college, and has been charged with streamlining the department's many agencies. Bond said that half of the department could be abolished ultimately if basic policy changes were made along the lines of his program.
Average Payment Probed
 Bond's plan calls for an average allotment program, conserving commodity loans at full parity and a two-price system for farm products sold into foreign trade.
 Any sound farm program must assure that the farmer gets return on his agricultural program, Bond said.
 Under his plan, the agricultural adjustment agency would be replaced by a national conservation association, the association would be entirely farmer-administered and would pay all its own administrative costs through member assessments. Bond pointed out that any farm program is essentially a conservation program. Membership in the association would be compulsory after its establishment had been approved by 70 or 80 per cent of the farmers.
Would Open "Back Door"
 Bond said his plan also would open the "back door of the farmer's market"—foreign trade. He pointed out that this nation has lost a sizable part of its export trade because domestic prices are higher than world prices.
 He proposed that farmers get a "blended" price on exportable commodities. Each farmer would buy "export debentures" on the percentage of the crop normally exported and pay for them the difference between the domestic and world price. The debentures would be released to the exporters and would enable them to just meet the world price but not undercut it and so would not be dumping, Bond said.
