Shift to Peace Output Waiting Only for Signal

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—With the end of the war in sight, President Truman canvassed postwar labor and wage stabilization problems today with six top advisers.

Meeting with Mr. Truman were Secretary of Labor Schweitzer, War Mobilization John W. Snyder, Economic Stabilizer William H. Davis, Price Administrator Chester Bowles, War Labor Board Chairman George W. Taylor and John R. Steelman, former director of the U. S. conciliation service and now an adviser to Schweitzer.

A White House statement said the six men submitted reports to the president on labor disputes and wage stabilization in the postwar period and that the chief executive "has them under study."

These emergency plans ready, government agencies awaited the White House signal to start the American economy on a new era of unprecedented civilian production.

The signal, due when Japan quits, also will serve to revive programs for putting millions of released war workers in peacetime jobs as rapidly as possible and for gradual lifting of rationing and other wartime restrictions.

Expected quickly, too, are plans that may provide for easing of wartime wage controls and putting the scope of price controls in the immediate postwar period.

Elimination of gasoline, fuel oil and tire programs within 90 days to enable V-3 day; gasoline may be released within two to three months.

Consumer goods—Volume production before the end of this year, peacetime production by late October, loans, bonds and other home appliances, at least 500,000 passenger cars, double the number announced, already is expected.

Fleet Renews Blasts, Alert for Banzai Try

GUAN, Aug. 13 (AP)—Adm. William F. Halsey's third fleet blasted the Yokohama docks and submarine pens in a resumption of the assault on Japan today and stood alert for one last, desperate aerial banzai charge which the Tokyo radio implied already begun.

Domestically declared Japanese planes had hunched an attack on the great naval force, which had planned to hunt its air power at Tokyo targets but was balked by heavy weather.

There was no confirmation of this report, but Associated Press Correspondent Richard K. O'Malley with the fleet said such a blow was expected and that six enemy planes already had been shot down.

A Tokyo broadcast, recorded by the FCC, admitted "some damage" was caused by 80 carrier-based planes attacking the Kanto district of eastern Honshu. The attack and the planes were shot down.

It also stated that heavy weather at Tokyo the carrier planes picked large targets of opportunity. The Yokohama docks and submarine pens were hit.

Airied Offer Didn't Reach Japan Until Today, Tokyo Declares; Bombers Strike

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—American bombers hammered at Tokyo's front door today while the Japanese dithered over a decision whether to surrender now on allied terms or continue a suicidal war.

The White House announced that no reply had been received at 8:45 a. m., mountain war time, today to Saturday's four-power dictate that Japan could keep an emperor who would take his orders from the victors' supreme commander.

Presidential Secretary Charles G. Ross told a news conference "it is safe to say the war is going on" while negotiations continue.

More than four hours later there had been no further word from the White House on the subject.

No time limit was set by the Japanese response, Ross said. Nor did he know, he asserted, whether there might be another ultimatum.

A Tokyo radio broadcast said that the formal allied reply to the Japanese offer of Friday was not received until today.

Still another broadcast indicated the Japanese were suffering from a typhoid epidemic, and Japanese agencies quoted military officials as saying that the Japanese plane attacks were "not a possibility."

OPA Holding Back on Book Five Printing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—The OPA has halted printing of 167,000 new ration books for food, shoes and gasoline, it was learned today.

The stop order covers war ration books for meat, fat, dairy products, canned foods and sugar, and a new "A" gasoline book. Both had been scheduled for distribution in December.

The order halts work on the books pending outcome of post-rationing studies. If Japan quits the stop order will be lifted.

The action was taken, it was explained, because there are sufficient ration books now being carried through to about the first of the year. In the case of gasoline, rationing is expected to end within a week or two after V-J day.

Actual printing of 37,000,000 gasoline books has not begun, but designs and engravings have been completed.

Further shipment of war ration books is expected to continue longer.

An OPA spokesman said that of 150,000 ration books now in the hands of the public, 100,000 are "A" books.

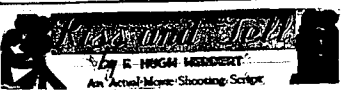
