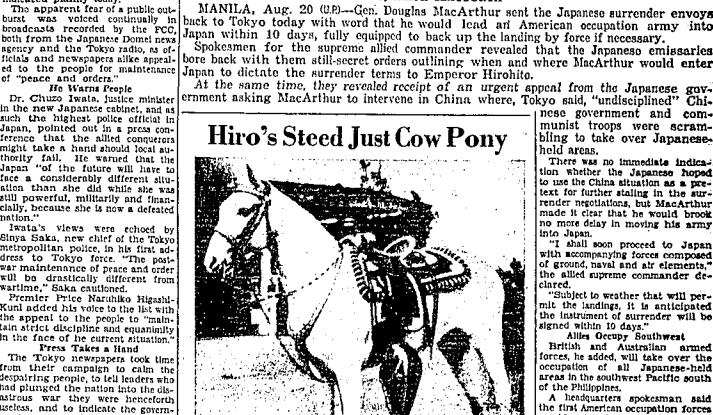

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Rescued Wainwright, Hero of Corregidor, May See Surrender

CHUNGKING, Aug. 20 (AP)—Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright, the last hero in Corregidor who was rescued from a Japanese prison camp by a humanitarian team of American parachutists, is expected to see the surrender of the forces which held him more than three years.

Among the hundreds of allied prisoners released by the sudden arrival of airborne teams carrying relief supplies were Maj. Gen. George M. Parker, Jr., of Ford, Okla., who served under Wainwright in the final days of the battle of the Philippines, and A. W. Jarda, Van Nuys, California, who was general of the Netherlands East Indies.

Also with Wainwright in Manchuria, it was learned on high authority.

"Wonderful"

SKANATELES, N. Y., Aug. 27 (AP)—A 70-year-old man of anxious waiting had ended today for Mrs. Jonathan Wainwright, the wife of the captured general who was featured as the fall of Corregidor.

In an interview later, she said: "I think it just marvelous. I never dreamed that I would see him again."

Lieut. Gen. Jonathan Mayhew Wainwright, the man who took up the Bataan-Corregidor fight where MacArthur left off, has been freed in Manchuria by American airborne rescuers. He has been held since Corregidor surrendered May 6, 1942, but reportedly is in fair physical condition. Many other high officers also were freed. Their release by the rescue parties brought a protest from Japan today, claiming such actions might endanger "amoral" surrender procedure.

MANILA, Aug. 20 (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur sent the Japanese surrender envoys back to Tokyo today with word that he would lead an American occupation army into Japan within 10 days, fully equipped to back up the landing force if necessary.

Spokesmen for the supreme allied commander revealed that the Japanese emissaries were to take orders outlining when and where MacArthur would enter Japan to dictate the surrender terms to Emperor Hirohito.

At the same time, they revealed receipt of an urgent appeal from the Japanese government asking MacArthur to intervene in China where, Tokyo said, "undisciplined" Chinese government and communist troops were scrambling to take over Japanese-held areas.

There was no immediate indication whether the Japanese hoped to use the Chinese situation as a pretext for further stalling in the surrender negotiations, but MacArthur made it clear that he would brook no more delay in moving his army into Japan.

"I shall soon proceed to Japan with accompanying forces composed of ground, naval and air elements, the allied supreme commander declared.

"Subject to weather that will permit the landings, it is anticipated that the first American occupation forces will be ashore within 10 days."

A headquarters spokesman said the Japanese were asked "prepared for the arrival of American troops and the available weapons."

This presumably would include the first American occupation forces.

Sixteen ground and allied Japanese envoys boarded a transport plane at Manila Nichols field this afternoon to bring MacArthur's message back to Hirohito.

The bulk of the Japanese airfields on which allied planes would be based is believed to have been left in the hands of disarmed troops.

When the Japanese delegation returned to Tokyo, they were met by a Japanese official who said that the Japanese were told exactly what to expect.

But they were saying the same thing about the bomber airplane only seven years ago. They probably made the same prediction when gunpowder was first used in battle.

The fact remains that no weapon, however terrible, has ever curbed war-making. And since the most heinous war through the centuries have devoted much of their talent and energy to creating more elaborate and efficient methods of bringing quick and widespread death to their brothers.

Even the scientists of today, in a fantastic race with the scientists of their enemies, have perfected the most horrifying agent of death the world has ever known. It is more important that the world keep the peace through sincere desire and friendly effort than through fear of another war's destruction. For the effort, though never yet honorably given up, has not been made, and the fear has never prevented war, and never will.

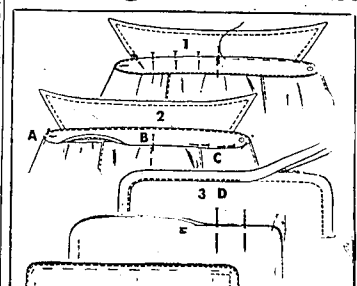

Hail Barrage Damage High In Salt Lake

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 20 (AP)—Flooded waters throughout this city today left it deep in gloom—the aftermath of two severe electrical storms which lashed the city yesterday, damaging property, uprooting trees and flooding cellars. Hundreds of cars were stranded in water which measured waist deep on the main thoroughfares. Others were stuck hub-deep in mud, much of which was carried into the streets by the rushing canyon and mountainous.

Two of the most devastating storms burst in fury during a brief interval after 10:30 p. m. when bright lightning illuminated the western sky while hailstones were whipped through the area by an 80-mph an easterly wind.

Wings were ripped from planes at the municipal airport and the broken bodies of the ships gave evidence of the size of the hail storm. Windows in the city hall and the administration building and those of all managers were smashed.

Throughout the city windows were broken. Lamps were shattered and signs were blown down. The debris carried by the second storm were countless feet during the record-breaking deluge which poured down for one hour in the morning.

Shortly after the second storm quit, accumulated water poured down canyons and streets through man-made streets with force enough to sweep cars along in the flow. One auto was deposited on the lawn of a residence.

Two residents who frequent a motorists have stalled in two more feet of water. In one case a woman was stranded for some time before water rose around the house.

ANOTHER MASTER RACE

 The apocalyptic impact of the German religion and the Nazi war cries that it is a time for us have produced the general impression that the Germans are the only people suffering from the delusion that they are a master race—predestined by God and history and their innate superiority to conquer the whole of the world. That impression is untrue. The same megalomaniacal projection of the nation's ego is even more pronounced among the Japanese, and has produced the same results.

This Japanese aberration has its roots in centuries of indoctrination with a strange and primordial religion known as Shinto. Or "The Way of the Gods." More than any other factor it is responsible for the war in the Pacific and for the treacherous and savage manner in which the Japanese are waging it. And since this "first beginnings of that war in Manchuria" are responsible for the course for developments in Europe, it is directly responsible for the whole world war.

There are three reasons for this. The first is the Shinto, which is a very primitive nature worship without a theology, without a doctrine, and without an ethical code, has prevailed in the Japanese all the way back to the beginning of the Japanese race. The second is that it has made the Japanese very superstitious and has thus made them very susceptible to the ideas that they are a superior race and has thus kindled in them all the ambition that flows from such a concept and the third is that it has put behind these ambitions all the driving forces of religious fanaticism, surpassing any the Nazis have been able to access.

Fact and Fiction
 As a race, the Japanese are still something of a mystery. But it is now generally accepted that they are a blend of Mongolian and Poly-nesian-Malayian invaders, possibly even with white-skinned tribes from northwestern Asia, who intermingled with the aboriginal inhabitants of the Japanese islands to form a new race which betrays the mixed origin by its widely differing physical characteristics. This undeniable fact is generally accepted by educated Japanese, but it has in no way interfered with the continued acceptance of Shinto concepts of how the bulk of the Japanese people originated.

Reduced to their elemental form, these Shinto concepts hold that the Japanese islands and the Japanese people have been born of the gods and are therefore divine. The Japanese gods are thus conceived to be the ancestors of the Japanese, which makes the Japanese themselves gods by descent, and their land "the land of the gods." Since there are no other gods that the Japanese acknowledge or that they simply consider them to be other forms of their own "eight hundred myriad" gods, these gods are the highest beings in the Japanese cosmos. And since, naturally, a father is greater than his children, it makes their direct descendants the highest beings on earth—the master race entitled to rule the world.

In other words, the Japanese consider themselves to be a sort of divine family having its origin in Heaven. As a principle of state, this concept has such great utility that it has been assumed and utilized by the Japanese government, until it found its culmination in the Japanese Empire.

The sense of common divine descent and blood relationship has made the Japanese clanistic and exclusive, but it has also given them a national cohesion surpassing that of any other nation. It is the basis of that "peerless polity" they boast of, and it is

by far the strongest asset in this war.

Whereas other religions concern themselves with the supernatural, with the individual, with the salvation of his soul, with ethics and morals, and with the world hereafter, Shinto has only one concern—promote the fortunes and the prosperity of the Japanese family state in this world by any and all means that will serve the purpose.

This is how the world looks through Shinto eyes.

"Shinto is an extension of the ideal state in Heaven. So believed our ancestors, so do we still believe; and this faith is the foundation stone of our racial unity."—Sinnichiro Niijima, a Year Book with Official Information, by Niijima Denjo Nemura Agency, Tokyo, 1934.

"In Japan the worshipping of deceased ancestors will obtain, and still exercises a powerful influence over the laws and customs of the people."—Anno's Year-Book and Japanese Law, by Baron Nomutige Hogen, Tokyo, 1929.

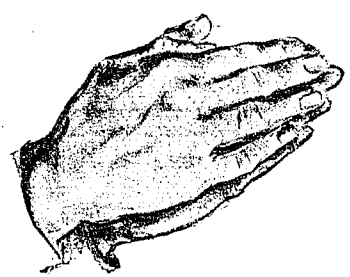
