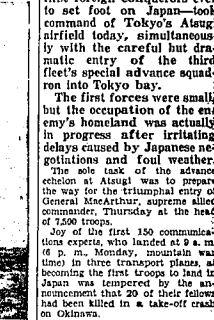

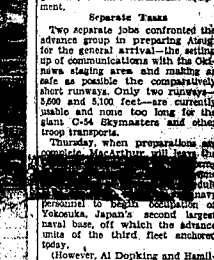

View of Tokyo from the air, showing the layout of the airfield and surrounding urban area.



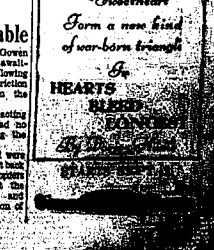

Two Bruised When Car Strikes Post

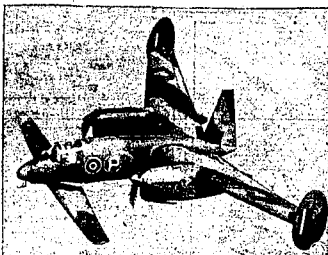

"In the future the farmer will deal with only one administrative office in these matters," he said.

"The AAA will incorporate the commodity credit corporation, the federal crop insurance corporation and several other offices dealing with production, planning, price and purchasing programs."

Janzen said that "until the local office receives official word from Washington, D. C., we shall continue to operate as the AAA."

Janzen also said large seed stocks should be built up, especially alfalfa and red clover, for the rehabilitation of Europe.

"Congress has appropriated funds to stimulate seed production," he said. "This will mean an extra income for farmers who harvest certain seed in 1945."

Janzen pointed out that the world's war-torn soils need rebuilding. "Hay and pasture are immediately needed," he said. "Alfalfa, red clover and shrike clover are in special demand."

Struss, chief of civilian personnel. The slash will eliminate approximately 45 per cent of the jobs now available, Major Struss said. A 70 per cent slash will be made in supply and headquarters divisions. No appreciable decreases will be made in base services and personnel divisions.

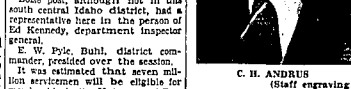

THROUGH JAPANESE EYES

BY OTTO D. TOLBACH

IX

If diplomacy is the art of deceit, as the Machiavellians teach, then the Japanese have indeed proved themselves to be master diplomats. There was the kind of diplomacy which Hitler used with such startling success before and after the outbreak of the war. Its principles are simple. They can be summarized as follows:

1. State your aims frankly and honestly in terms of a world embracing ideology which other nations will deem as fascinating and profitable.

2. Divide your possible opponents by plotting the spoils of an empire.

3. Strike hard and fast when the moment seems ripe, and let your aims justify your means.

4. Switch to a military system which distinguishes the Hitler and the Japanese war lords from ordinary fighting men.

5. The ruling ideology of Germany under Hitler was National Socialism, which acted upon the two most vital forces of the age—nationalism and socialism, and by converting the nationalistic movement into a second line a man-eating attack, produced an explosive energy that found its outlet in the German "master race." The ruling ideology of Japan for ages eternal has been Shinto, which unifies family and state-ism into the equally explosive concept of the divine family state of a superior race of god ruled by a supreme God-Emperor who has a divine command to be the Emperor of the world.

Foreign Editor, *Griffin*, writes: "Yet, though the real nature of National Socialism was fairly well understood long before the war, Hitler had little difficulty in fooling the statement of the world by maintaining a front of 'gentleness' in his Foreign Office and his diplomatic circles who gave an air of respectability to his own fair promises. The Japanese had an even easier task of it, for Shinto is still primarily a subject of study by world-renowned experts in comparative religion rather than the concern of statesmen. Japanese 'gentleness' can be more terrifying than the Germans. But the Japanese Foreign Office never more than a plain man, whose function was to give a son and dance to keep other nations occupied, amused and divided, while the military got ready for the big strike. The Japanese 'gentlemen' played their part well, until the bombs began to fall on Pearl Harbor."

The divine mission of Japan puts her now truly breaking because what would be wrong in the rest of the world is right in Japan. For Japan, any means justify the end.—*Major Gen. Tada*, quoted in "War and Diplomacy in East Asia" by Claude Biss, New York, 1941.

Japan has now to do is to keep perfectly quiet, to lull the suspicions that have risen against her, and to wait, meanwhile strengthening the foundations of her national power, while watching waiting for the opportunity which must one day surely come in the Orient.—*Tokuza Hayashi*, author of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, 1895.

"The Imperial Government of Japan, desiring to protect the independence and territorial integrity of the Korean Empire, in agreement with Korea in 1904. (In 1910, Korea was annexed to the Japanese Empire along with the Korean people.)"

"The Contracting Powers, other than China, agree to respect the sovereignty, the independence and the territorial and administrative integrity of China.—The Nine-Power Treaty, signed by Japan and the United States in 1922. (In 1931 Japan conquered Manchuria and set up a puppet regime. In 1937 Japan attacked China and set up a puppet regime in Nanking.)"

Until all preparations have been made and the right opportunity for striking has arrived, the Japanese ultraright diplomat and visitors, make fair promises all around sign any diplomatic diploma suspects, proclaim yourself the champion of peace, progress and prosperity.

No military or naval base shall be established or fortifications erected in the territory.—Japan's pledge on securing the mandate for the former German Pacific Islands, 1920. (The islands were immediately turned into strategic fortified military and naval bases, as revealed by the Orientals.)

The Oriental Ideal of love, benevolence and mutual help condemns the selfishness of administrative management—always a divine sword that slays not—dedicated to the peace of the world; it is employed only against the forces inimical to international justice and to the common interests of East Asia. Japan's advance, inspired by humanity, should be contrasted with aggression for gain at the expense of other nations.

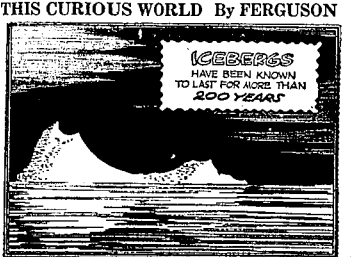

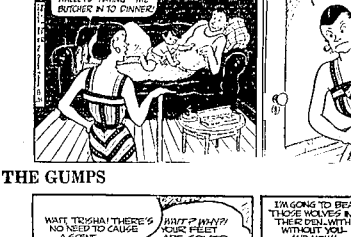

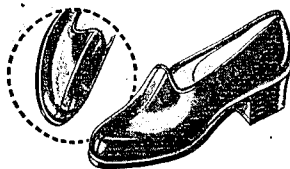
