10,000 Acre Area Charred, Winter Deer Feed Gone

KIMBERLY, Sept. 1.—When fire was finally written to the Indian Johnny canyon fire late today, the final score stood at 10,000 acres of grazing land charred; 200 to 300 acres of heavy bitter root brush in the Minidoka national forest destroyed, and the best winter deer range in Idaho obliterated.

According to John T. Mathews, forest supervisor, who directed the work of firefighters throughout the blaze, "this fire marks the first time since 1940 that any timber in this part of the state was destroyed by fire."

Members of the Southern Idaho fish and game association and volunteer members into the fire area to protect the deer range. According to Mathews, the fire was rocky and steep, a hard place to fight a blaze, but the members of the association saved the day by stopping the fire from eating into the Minidoka forest proper.

Hot Oratory Expected As Solons Meet

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—An official can't wait until the next morning for the convening of Wednesday of a congress already storing up plenty of hot oratory and trouble for the administration.

The big job, of course, will be to remodel old laws and enact new ones to help ease the country into a peacetime way of life.

Eventually congress may get around to lowering taxes, perhaps next year's incomes, which will be a popular procedure with both the legislators and the people.

But in the meantime, the congress is expected to pass such items as more unemployment compensation for idle war workers, assistance opportunities for jobs, cutting the draft, giving veterans back their old jobs and determining who gets first.

Also coming up are disposal of leftover war supplies, consolidation of abolishing social government agencies in the interests of economy and efficiency, merging the state and navy under one command.

President Truman plans action on many of these, and congress will hear from him again Wednesday or Thursday.

Senate Majority Leader Barkley of Kentucky, one of the leaders who will lobby members like "legislative expediency" requires that congress get back on the job next week, says Mr. Truman today. The presidential message, he said, will cover reconstruction, termination of lend-lease and a good many other things.

POWs Beaten Lid Clamped on Four Clubs; Ordered Closed

TOKYO BAY, Sunday, Aug. 2 (AP)—Liberated all prisoners of war today recited more instances of beatings, hunger and humiliation—including tigerish attacks by Japanese women on helpless fliers—but there was no indication of deliberate, German-scale mass exterminations.

The unrelenting "fortress" camp at Omori near Yokohama, Cmdr. Harold Stiles of Admiral Halsey's staff reported as he conferred with American Red Cross officials on evacuation plans.

There was as yet no report on how many had died in neglect or worse in the "hell hole" hospital for Allied camp prisoners.

Approximately 4,200 Americans, British and Dutch remain in camps in the Tokyo-Yokohama area, Cmdr. Harold Stiles of Admiral Halsey's staff reported as he conferred with American Red Cross officials on evacuation plans.

More than 1,400 have been brought aboard U. S. navy hospital ships and transported in Tokyo bay. Officials estimated that 26,000 prisoners, including 10,000 Americans, were in camps in Japan.

The Netherlands East Indies government, in a report broadcast by Australian radio Aug. 31, said 50,000 of the all prisoners in Japanese hands had died.

252,885 Yankees Killed in Combat
WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—European and Pacific combat casualties in World War II totaled 252,885 killed and 1,190,000 wounded, according to a report today.

There were 17,300 surgical amputations, 7,300 men were deafened to some degree, 1,190 were blinded in one or both eyes.

The war cost a total of \$27,180,000,000 compared with \$20,000,000,000 spent by Germany, \$12,120,000,000 by Japan and \$10,850,000,000 by Russia.

Nips Worked On Own Type Atom Bombs

TOKYO, Sept. 1 (AP)—Japanese newspaper men revealed today that the atomic bomb reported recently to have been dropped on Nagasaki a month before the first U. S. atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, was actually working on a similar project.

The reports of a Japanese atomic bomb were published in the Tokyo press in July.

The newspaper editors were in their atomic research.

The Japanese newspaper men also revealed that a Japanese picket boat, flushed a warning to Tokyo of the carrier force which brought the atomic bomb to Japan before it was attacked and sunk by U. S. cruisers.

The newspaper said some survivors of the picket boat were picked up and subsequently decorated by Emperor Hirohito.

Black Market Flourishes in Japan's Cities

TOKYO, Sept. 1 (AP)—Money has little value in Japan—either U. S. or Bank of Nippon currency—because this country is embroiled in the worst black market in its history. Dealer goods are far more valuable than cash.

The black market, operating since 1940, became really tough in 1942. It was then that the government, thousands of dollars at the start, but illegal sales snowballed quickly beyond control.

Japan, in fact, seems started toward financial ruin seven and a half pounds of sugar a unit weight, in Japan which cost two yen 50 sen before the war, now brings 1,500 yen in the black market. (The yen at present exchange was the equivalent of 23 cents, American.)

Japanese-made shoes cost 1,000 yen, compared with a pre-war price of 15 to 18. A man's shirt, formerly seven yen, now costs 120.

Imported Scotch whisky, once available for only seven yen (dead at \$1.65) now brings 1,000 yen. They also travel when they can to the country, seeking to avoid the blackmarketing middleman by buying direct from factories—bottle things, but far out of reach of the average Japanese.

The 35-pence unit, although, once worth only 150 sen, now brings 80 yen—exactly 170 times as much.

The Japanese raise what they can in home gardens, doing intensive backyard farming even in cities. They also travel when they can to the country, seeking to avoid the blackmarketing middleman by buying direct from factories—bottle things, but far out of reach of the average Japanese.

With black markets booming, invasion money rolling in, industry being kept from war production and 80,000,000 persons restricted to Japan's home islands rather than an expanding empire, they fear chaos is coming—and fast.

W. W. Staley, professor of mining

The fire began at 2:30 p.m. and the combine burned until 5 p.m. Adsett estimated that damage to the combine was between \$2,000 and \$3,000. He had no insurance on the machine.
