We in this country may not like this kind of regime at the helm of various nations of the world. But we know that a hungry kid is a hungry kid, no matter what government he lives under. We may resent the circumstances that keep some members of our family in the service long after victory. But we realize that wholesome recreation and a few extra comforts will make him happier while he is away.

And because we know these things we should be willing to dig down once more for a few dollars to invest in a little more health and happiness for our own soldiers and soldiers of other lands that bear the fresh and open scars of war.

The chairmanship of the local committee for the United National clothing collection, Nov. 7 through 12, has been accepted by Claude Brown, he announced yesterday.

Brown received a letter from Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman in New York, asking him to assume the post which he held during last spring's clothing drive. Kaiser had enclosed a copy of a letter from President Truman calling upon the national chairman to select from his assistants to gather garments for needy persons in war-ravaged lands.

Brown said he was going to form a committee and would ask the churches, civic clubs, schools, other groups and the community to make the drive successful.

"This project is very important," he said. "We will be adopting nations that we did during the war. For we will give clothing to Germany and Hungary and even to Japan. I believe it will be four years until these destitute nations will be on their feet again."

During last spring's collection, the city and eastern part of the county contributed 35 tons of clothing. Buhl and Flier had a drive of their own.

The national goal is 100,000,000 items, Kaiser said in his letter. The drive is known as the Victory clothing collection.

Includes letters

"Each contributor will be given to enclose in the garments a good letter to the unknown soldier overseas," Kaiser said.

In the Victory clothing collection, the American people will have the opportunity to write 100,000,000 letters to their allies, Kaiser added.

"I am tremendously interested, as I think you will be, in the contribution which this expression of international friendship can bring to the peace of the world."



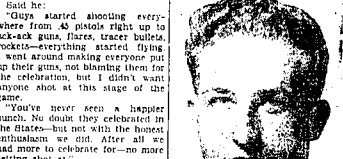

Did they celebrate at Pacific Island bases on V-J day? An hell broke loose, Capt. Don A. McDonald told his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. McDonald, Etien, in a letter from the Pacific.

Claps started shooting everywhere from 45 pistols right up to ack-ack guns, flares, tracer bullets, rockets—everything started flying up their guns, not blaming them for the celebration, but didn't want anyone shot at this stage of the game.

"You've never seen a happier bunch. No doubt they celebrated in the States—but not with the honest enthusiasm we did. After all we had more to celebrate for—no more getting shot at."



Describe Envoys

Then in a letter written from Is Shima Aug. 22, Captain McDonald describes the "Jolly Rogers" on their way to Manila—the envoys on their way to sign the peace treaty with MacArthur as follows:

"I heard when they were coming so rushed down to watch them. Seemed funny to see a Jap plane without running for a hole. The airplanes were painted white with green crosses just as they were told to. I got up as close to the runway as I could without being shot at. I could land without bombing. My goal didn't get a pretty fair job. Don't know if they played their two best pilots or their last two. They shot the Japs on a C-54 and took off for the Philippines."

"This is also the island where Ennio Pyle was killed. They have a small monument on the spot where he was shot. He is buried in the graveyard here."

"I'm sitting on the bed while writing this. We have no table—no desk—no chair—no mugs—no neck inside and out of this tent."

Not Much Flying Now

"I'm not doing much here, building an officers club inside, not doing much flying. Wanting to go home more than anything else—maybe in two or three months. I am wondering now what I'm going to do, as I have almost lost my job with the army."

Captain McDonald was assigned to the fifth air force in the Netherlands East Indies and was a pilot in the Jolly Rogers' bombing group in the Pacific.

One mission his ship became separated from the others in a storm. Orders were sent out to turn back but as no orders got to him his crew continued alone dropped it some on the target, hitting two enemy planes and a sea plane, and returned. For this they were called the "Jolly Rogers."

Captain McDonald has 40 missions to his credit and over 400 hours of combat.

They shot off every kind of gun to mark V-J in Pacific. The celebration was a joyous one, with claps and shooting. The pilots of the Jolly Rogers' were seen in the air, and the atmosphere was festive.

### His Ship Saved 1,800 From U.S. Major Carriers

SPRINGDALE, Oct. 2—MM 1/0c Ralph K. West received a honorable discharge Sept. 12 from the Farragut training center after spending three years and eight months in the service. He spent three years and 19 days overseas, most of the time aboard the destroyer USS Morris.

West stated that his ship was credited with receiving 1,800 survivors from five major carriers that were sunk. It also participated in almost all major sea engagements on the battle, and in 17 major landings and invasions. His crew and ship were credited with shooting down 11 enemy planes.

He stated that they were "very fortunate" and had few casualties until the battle of Okinawa. Then 40 were hit by a Jap suicide plane off Okinawa and was severely damaged. Fifty-two days were spent repairing the ship so it could be brought back to the States. The USS Morris was being repaired when peace was declared.

West was transferred soon after V-J to Treasure Island and later to Fremont where he received his discharge.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph West, and has a brother, Fred West, overseas.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Rational ceiling prices on new washing machines and ironers will range from \$22.95 to \$102.95, the OPA announced today.
