

House Group Votes to Cut 12,000,000 Off Tax Cuts... 5 Billion Reduction Indicated... Super Sports Palace for City Advocated by Swim

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—The house ways and means committee voted today to remove 12,000,000 low-income persons from the income tax rates in 1948 and to cut the total individual income tax burden almost half a billion dollars deeper than the administration recommended.

Fred A. Vinson, secretary of the treasury, had asked a \$2,085,000,000 cut in the individual taxes. The committee voted an estimated \$2,600,000,000. It is yet to act on his recommendations for corporation and other reductions, if it approves them without change.

Broadly visualizing the future growth of Magic Valley in terms of equal "today's thinking and acting," H. The chairmanship of the local committee for the United National Clothing Collection, John T. Brown, 12, has been accepted by Claude Brown, he announced yesterday.

Brown received a letter from Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman in New York, asking him to assume the post which he held during last year's clothing drive. Kaiser had enclosed a copy of a letter from President Truman calling upon the national chairman to gather garments for needy persons in war-ravaged lands.

Plan Wide Appeal

Brown said he was going to form a committee and would ask the churches, civic clubs, schools, other groups and the community to make the drive successful.

"This project is very important," he said. "We will be adding more nations than we did during the war. For we will give clothing to Germany and Hungary and even to Japan. I believe it will be four years until these destitute nations will be on their feet again."

"During last spring's collection, the city and the national committee county contributed 38 tons of clothing. Huhl and Piler had a drive of their own."

The national goal is 100,000,000 garments. Kaiser in his letter, "The drive is known also as the Victory clothing collection."

Inclusive Letter

"Each contributor will be invited to enclose in the garments a good-will letter to the unknown recipient overseas," Kaiser said.

"In the Victory clothing collection, the American people will have the opportunity to write 100,000,000 letters to their allies," Kaiser added. "I am tremendously interested, and I think you will be, in the contributions which express our interest in national friendship can bring to the peace of the world."

His Ship Saved 1,800 From U. S. Major Carriers

SPRINGDALE, Oct. 3—MM 1/6 Ralph K. West received an honorable discharge Sept. 13 from the Farmanut training center after spending three years and eight months in the service. He spent three years and 19 days overseas, most of the time spent aboard the destroyer USS Morris.

West states that his ship was credited with rescuing 1,800 survivors from five major carriers that were sunk. It also participated in almost all major sea engagements on the Pacific, and in 17 major landings and invasions. His crew and ship were credited with shooting down 12 enemy planes.

He stated that they were "very fortunate" and had few casualties until the battle of Okinawa. Then she was hit by a Jap suicide plane off Okinawa and was severely damaged. Fifty-two days were spent repairing the ship so it could be brought back to the States. The USS Morris was being repaired when peace was declared.

West was transferred soon after V-J to Treasure Island and later to Farmanut where he received his discharge.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph West, and has a brother, Floyd West, overseas.

Ceiling Price Set On Washing Units

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Retail selling prices on washing machines and ironers will range from \$93.80 to \$109.95, the OPA announced today.

Manufacturers are being given a 7 per cent increase over 1944 selling, but wholesalers and retailers will be required to absorb it. This means their profit margins will be narrowed.

Retail prices are divided into three geographical groups, reflecting seasonal differences in transportation costs. Manufacturers are required in each case to attach a tag showing the applicable ceiling.

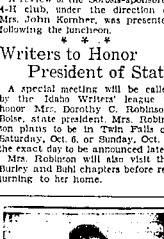
