Washington's decision to abolish Shinto as a state religion in Japan may prove to be the key to that impugned country's reformation, for much of the hold which the military has had on the people was attributable to the fact that the government spoke through the mouth of sacred Shinto.

Let there be some who fear this is a blow at freedom of worship. It should be stated that it is not. The plan merely disassociates the religion from the very obvious acts of government control, but leaves the individual Japanese the right to worship as he chooses. If he clings to the ancestor and hero worship, which is the basis of Shinto (the way of the gods), then it is his prerogative to do so.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—The aircraft industry is in a dither over en masse lump sum payments.

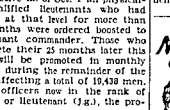
