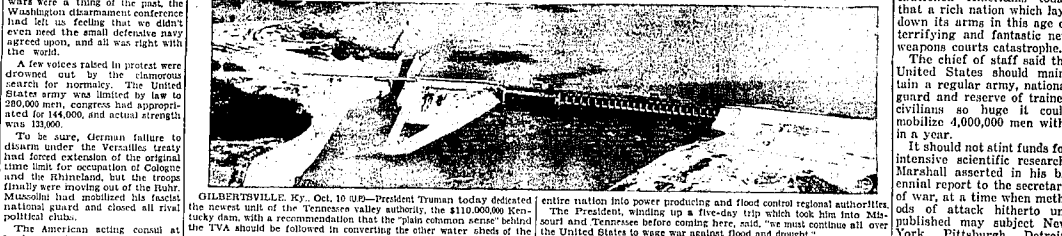

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHORLIGIG

ADVANTAGE—American Legion leaders at Washington, D. C., last week, are convinced that National Commander Edward N. Scheerling will uphold John Thomas Taylor, the organization's legislative agent at the Capitol in his claim that the late Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley, who served as military administrator less than two years ago, was not permitted to sell the rights to the name of the organization to a syndicate of businessmen, real estate experts and bankers at the State hotel here, here without approval of the legion.

Mr. Taylor was seeking the exclusive information of the inadvisable advantage of the GI bill of rights. Up to now it has not worked effectively.

He asked during the course of the symposium to be given by the American Legion to transfer supervision of the building and the handling of the veterans administration to the federal housing administration. He requested to know whether agriculture should have applications for federal certification of farm purchases, and whether the committee should have authority to select and award medals to veterans who want to set themselves up in business.

He was simply getting the advice of the legislators before recommending it to the White House and to the congress, provided the proposed legislation is not recommended.

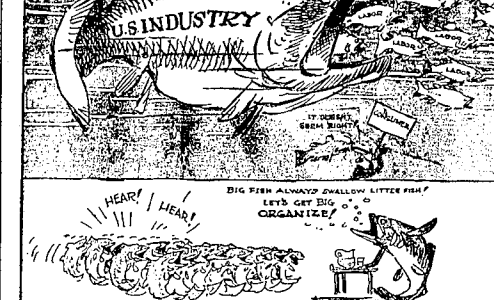

Care of Your Children

"Worry not, you'll get the quilt!" "For and the coming of winter" may be funny to adult but the children who heard that say, "I don't remember that" may not be laughing at their teachers.

The short-cut, easy-way method, which acquired the name "progressive" because their ways were new in the trial schools, overlooked these laws of learning and teaching. The result was to give traditional schools a bad name and to give their way, thoroughness, and concentration. It is essential to both teaching and learning.

Make sure each child gets the learning. Teach those who do not learn and make the others to use their own. Let the child who is like the dropped ball which weakens the whole fabric.
