GM-Labor Crisis Starts Wednesday With Strike Vote

By The Associated Press

One of the nation's major postwar labor disputes appeared headed for a showdown today as General Motors' biggest union and largest automotive corporation, on the eve of a strike vote involving more than 300,000 workers, squared on the wage-hour issue.

The fight between the United Automobile Workers union and General Motors corporation in Detroit highlighted labor troubles. Today's life because of labor disputes numbered around 230,000, one of the largest in several weeks and more than 200,000 under the figure of early in October.

Return of more than 200,000 soft coal miners to work after a month's walkout was a major step for the reduction. However, the labor picture in Detroit was dark.

The CIO Union after rejecting a General Motors corporate proposal for a 45-hour work week, charged the company with giving workers a former Lewis lieutenant.

Lewis had been mentioned as a possible appointee to the vacancy on the executive council, in session here on the single day, according to David Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers union, a former Lewis lieutenant.

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Delegates said the only thing that stood between a union between Lewis and the AFI was his securing of an executive council seat. A spokesman predicted a vacancy on the council by the time the midday meeting opens.

Valmore, editor of El Pais, organ of the Democratic national party of which he is leader, frequently has attacked U. S. oil interests in his newspaper. He gave assurances in an interview that he will respect the rights of foreign investors.

The new government, meanwhile, moved quickly to seek foreign recognition. Mexican President Carlos Morales announced that the diplomatic junta had advised the United States to recognize the new government.

Morales said his policy in the foreign ministry would be to meet all obligations of the previous government had made. The new junta government announced that all opposition to the revolution had collapsed and that throughout the country.

The junta issued a decree last week giving the functions of all public officials a certain level and forbidding the revolutionary authorities to exercise the seven members of the junta listed from becoming candidates in the presidential elections planned six months from now.

Defense Plan Includes Youths 17 to 20; Heated Debate Begins

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—President Truman's recommendation for a year's military training for young men found immediate support and opposition in congress today.

There was disagreement with his statement that the proposed universal training program he proposed "is not conscription."

House Democratic leaders declined to comment immediately but indicated possibility over the legislative prospects for the plan.

There was approval, even among the opponents of his proposal, for some aspects of his plan.

For instance, Sen. Edwin C. Johnson, D. Colo., acting chairman of the Senate subcommittee on military affairs, told reporters he regarded the proposal as "nothing less than conscription," which he is opposed to.

Sen. Johnson was pleased that the President had made the most appropriate military should not be subject to selective service on the order of conscription.

Sen. Arthur W. Clegg, D. Va., "I think the President's proposal is a step toward the goal of universal military training."

Sen. Walter G. Andrew of New York, the ranking Republican on the house military committee, "I am recommending a universal training program to congress to go to."

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Urges Training

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—President Truman today recommended a year's military training for young men between the ages of 17 and 20.

Mr. Truman told a joint session of congress that the United States must maintain militarily strong. He urged that a small professional army be maintained, supplemented with a reserve of trained young men.

The atomic bomb is of little value without an adequate army, air and navy, the President said.

"For that kind of force is necessary to protect our shores, to overcome any attack and to enable us to move forward and direct the best against the enemy's own territory."

Specifically, he stated that male citizens enter the year's training at the age of 18 or at the age of 17 if they are in school, whichever is later. In any event, he said, the training should begin before the young man is 20.

Seventeen-year-olds who had completed their high school education would be eligible to start their training at that age if their parents consented.

"I urge that the congress pass this legislation promptly—while the danger is still fresh in our minds—while we still remember how close we have come to destruction four years ago—while we can vividly recall the horrors of invasion which our allies have suffered physically and mentally all the ravages and ruin of war."

The Bonetti company was coming from Durban, and mother and son went to work in Cape Town preparing publicity, repertoire, and so on, and as usual, found some theatrical hall or restaurant office to another, without getting a chance to look at the sea air and the rest of the voyage had done wonders for mother's voice, and when the journey got under way she sang better than she had ever heard her sing before. Australians Say America Is Madhouse

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 25 (AP)—America may be the promised land to some folk, but it's strictly a madhouse to one group of Australian girls who went there to join their husbands and then couldn't wait to get home.

"They can have it," four of the girls said when reporters interviewed them on their return from the United States today, asked for an opinion on America and Americans. Then they got down to specific cases with a few pointed comments that they suggested be passed on to the United States for consideration and rebuttal.

Mrs. Betty Schultz, of Sydney, who said she was speaking for all the Australian girls who returned on the ship with her:

"I feel like an outcast all the time I was in America. The women rejected us and were always making remarks about how we pinched their noses."

"Now I'm back in Australia and I'm hoping I won't be regarded as an outsider here."

"We're really enough to admit we made a mistake and we want to forget it," Mrs. Schultz added when asked why she went to the United States in the first place.

"For the rest of our lives we want to be just ordinary Australians," Mrs. Margaret MacDonald, also of Sydney, lived in America for two years and said she found the country likable, but the people—"dreadful."
