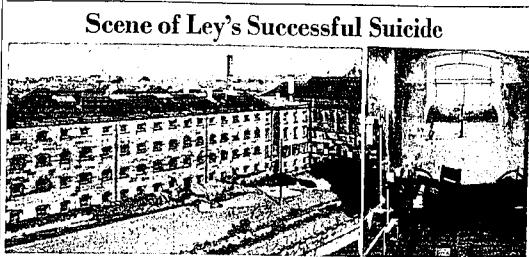

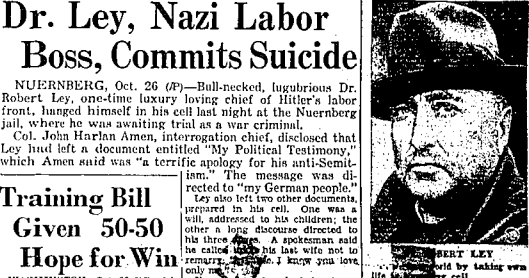

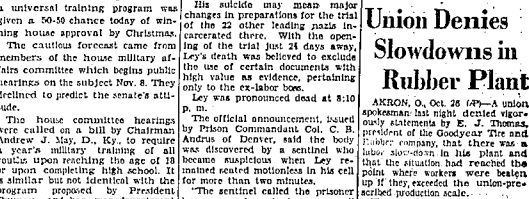

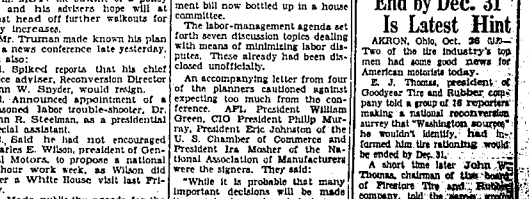

### Nips Off Beam On Attempt to Control Atom

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26 (AP)—The Japanese had stopped all work on an atomic bomb long before the war ended. It was reported Thursday, however, that the Japanese had not ended to believe the idea was workable. They did, however, re-veal "deadly" means of using enough to kill rabbits at 20 paces.

Dr. Karl T. Compton, president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, reported on the state of Japanese war research to a senate subcommittee studying bills to set up a national science foundation. Dr. Compton recently made an investigation of scientific progress in Japan.

Compton testified that while Japanese scientists "talked" of making an atomic bomb, they were working only on the amount of energy that would be released and so stopped their investigations.

Instead, they began to work on atomic energy as a substitute for coal. But Superintendents wrecked their laboratories, leaving them without any means of developing the atomic energy as war's end.

Compton said that the use of atomic energy in this country, "its development at first for peacetime uses will come slowly and for only limited objectives."

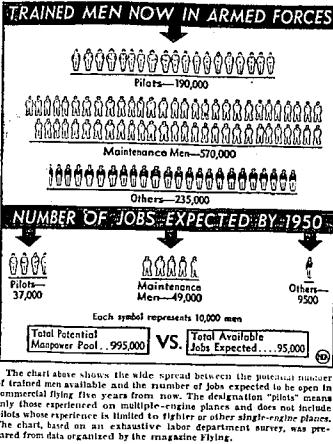

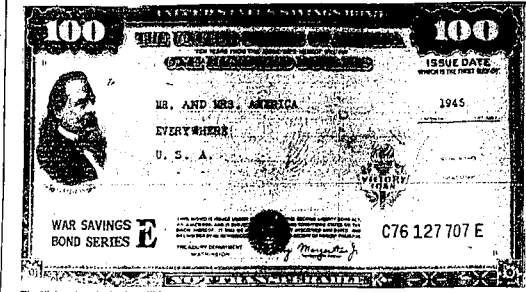

### Hunt Camp, Now Deserted, Had Colorful War History

HUNT, Oct. 25.—Departure of the last American-Japanese resident from Idaho's exclusive community has left the Minidoka relocation center a quiet town. William E. Rawlins, project director announced today.

Second of nine relocation centers to close under a staggered closure program was Minidoka. Rec center employees appealed to the war relocation authority for the help of the American-Japanese as the only labor source in the entire region.

Earlier plans had been to hold the displaced centers within the camp for the duration of the war, after arrangements were completed for the centers to leave the center for work in the sugar beet industry, demand continued for winter labor, and acceptance of the American-Japanese was so good that a program of permanent relocation eventually followed.

Not long after the first seasonal leaves for about 200 workers, fall rains and severe frosts impeded the 1942 potato harvest in the Pocatello, Aberdeen-Idaho Falls region. Farmers presented a mass appeal for labor. Nearly 200 workers from Minidoka were rushed to farms by train, bus and truck. They succeeded in increasing the potato crop.

Workers on seasonal leave from the project during the past three years helped keep in operation such Idaho war industries as the Aberdeen cann, the Halsted-Howard Lumber

company in Cascade and the Moss orchards. About 1,000 Minidoka also worked in Ogden, Utah canneries producing food for the war effort. Chinese workers also were instrumental in helping avert a strike in railroad labor in the region during the war.

Many Jobs Handled  
Seasonal workers from Minidoka numbered 1,750 in 1942, 3,223 during 1943, and 2,013 in 1944, doing various farm-connected jobs in an area ranging from eastern Washington and Oregon and southern Idaho to northern Utah and western Nevada.

Workers were the first to clear Hunt's raw land of cacti, brush, and to plant and cultivate the 1,166 acres of the project on which they produced much of the food for center consumption during the war years.

The acreage on which irrigation has been extended already has been leased to private farm operators by the reconstruction service.

Center farmers raised 6,628,450 pounds of vegetables and grains for livestock feed, at basic market prices valued at \$170,000. The 363,630 pounds of dressed meat and 304,315 dozen eggs produced at Minidoka had a basic market value of \$157,123. Poultry products at the center in excess of presently needed were shipped to other WRA relocation centers.

13,000 Total  
More than 12,000 persons have been inducted into and relocated from the Hunt project since August, 1942, when the center was first opened to accept the first group of Japanese community in Idaho.

Following the army western department's withdrawal of the Japanese American citizens and allies of Japanese ancestry from the war camp, the war relocation authority was created to administer Minidoka and other camps. It is a temporary care of the displaced California, Oregon and Washington evacuees. WRA operates under the department of the interior.

The majority of the 7,443 Minidokans still residing at the center when the army lifted its west coast ban last January have returned to former homes in Washington, Oregon, with a smaller number to other parts of the country.

1281 West Idaho Service  
Not including Japanese-American inductees into the United States army after their relocation from Hunt, the center has contributed 1,281 men to the American armed forces, many of them volunteers. Of these, 82 have been reported casualties, 70 of them killed in action.

Most of the 1,281 GIs from Minidoka have been members of the 442nd Central Postal Directory, a composite unit of which is the 10th Infantry Battalion, known as "the most decorated unit in United States military history." Hunt soldiers also were among the first to be attached to intelligence units to every army outfit operating in the Pacific and east theaters during the war.

The story of their highly secret work is only now being revealed by the war department.

Originally public land in the custody of the U. S. Reclamation service, most of the 33,000 acres have been returned to that agency by WRA. Only the 1,200 acres on which buildings and facilities are located are now being retained.

WRA will relinquish this property as soon as arrangements are completed for the distribution of these assets and movable property. The property will not be the responsibility of WRA, but will be permanent property disposal channels, such as the reconstruction finance corporation and the surplus property board of the department of commerce.

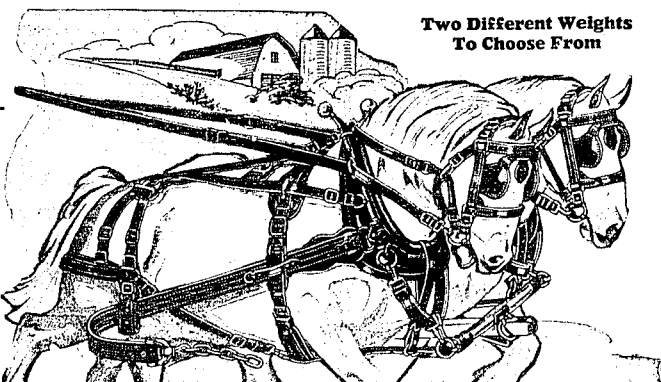

The western beet sugar industry, during the war's most critical labor shortage in 1942, operated the



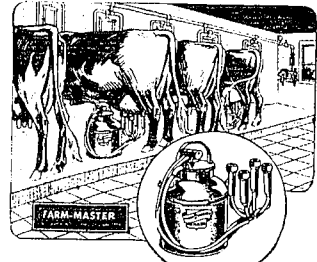

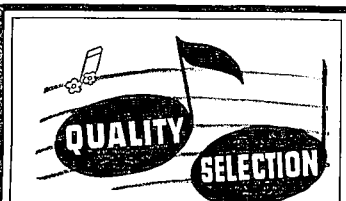
