

Military Control of Japan, Reich may be Transferred To Allied Civilian Setups

By JOHN B. McDERMOTT FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 31 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower reported to Washington today that increasing discontent among German youths and former soldiers shows signs of developing into an organized uprising against American occupation forces.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—President Truman disclosed today he hopes the administration is equipped to deal with the military situation now in Germany—now in military hands—will be turned over to allied civil authorities by next June 1. He added the same action would apply at a later date to Japan.

He also told a news conference he looks for Russia to join in sessions of the allied advisory commission on Japan. The commission met here yesterday but Russia had no representative on hand.

The June 1 goal for shifting the allied government in Germany to a civilian status was set, President Truman told newsmen, upon the recommendation of Gen. Eisenhower, chief of American occupation forces in Germany.

Military occupation by the four allied powers—Great Britain, France, Russia and the U. S.—will continue as long as necessary under the plan, however.

The weekly news conference also developed this information: "I know Atom Bomb is being developed in Great Britain and Canada, which share the secrets of the atomic bomb."

Japs' Fleet Scuttling Is U. S. Demand

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes announced today that Russia, Britain and China would share equally in the United States in a division of the part of the Japanese fleet which is not destroyed.

The vessels to be divided include 38 destroyers and an undetermined number of small coastal defense ships of 600 to 800 tons.

"Those to be destroyed—Byrnes spoke of scuttling them—are a battleship, four aircraft carriers of which three are damaged; five cruisers of which two are damaged; and 51 submarines.

Asked at a news conference whether the method of scuttling effectiveness of atomic bombs on naval units, Byrnes said he did not know the method to be employed. However, naval sources have indicated such an agreement had been made.

Byrnes said that the navy had planned to destroy most of the vessels in the Japanese fleet and put the remainder in the hands of the powers. They agreed to the arrangements for destroying all the major vessels and dividing the destroyers and lesser ships except for submarines.

CHINWANGTAO, North China, Oct. 31 (AP)—Thousands of American-equipped Chinese central government troops massed along the Manchurian border today expected communists forces sworn to resist any penetration of the frontier.

The next 24 hours was expected to decide whether the communists would be attacked or allowed to penetrate Manchung province.

Reds Reject Trade Pacts

LONDON, Oct. 31 (AP)—The Soviet Union has rejected British offers against the new Russian Trade and Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin's common sense.

THE GENOCIDES

The forthcoming trial of the top Nazi war criminals is, like the offenses of which they stand accused, unprecedented in history. It is logical, then, that the legal talent which prepared the United Nations' indictment against these infamous 24 should have found need of these infamous 24 should have found need of a new word to define, briefly and with legal precision, the appalling crimes for which the Nazi leaders are responsible.

The word is genocide and credit for its coinage goes to an American professor, Raphael Lemkin of Duke university. It is formed from the Greek "genes," which means race, and "cide," the Latin suffix, to kill.

The first appearance is in the third count of the indictment, which states the defendants "conducted deliberate and systematic genocide, viz., the extermination of racial and national groups, against the civilian populations of certain occupied territories."

Perhaps genocide may not seem to carry a force appropriate to the monstrous crimes which it describes. To American an English can, homicide, fratricide, regicide and similar Latin derivatives sound calm and impersonal when set beside the strong Anglo-Saxon of murder and slaughter.

Murder and slaughter are strong words because of association as well as sound. They are the common, sudden, instinctive terms for the act of taking life. Homicide is a word that belongs to the police, the lawyers and the judges. It is a word which has the connotation of arrest, accusation and trial has begun to operate.

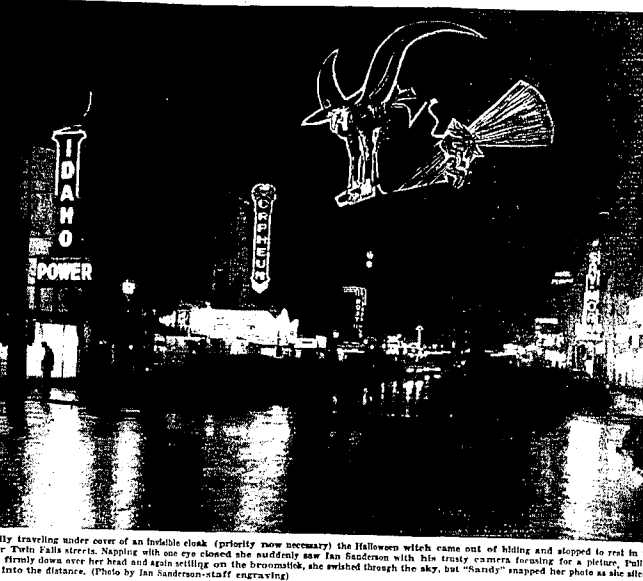

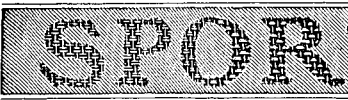
