ABOUT TWO FEET SNAKES

It was December and bitterly cold too. I wanted to go and get the poor snake into some kind of shelter before it died. Finally I persuaded one of the more daring spirits in the group of porters to help me get the crate on a hand truck and out to the hall.

We drove to the back entrance of the garden, for I knew the concrete was not so easy to deal with once he found out what the crate contained. Finally we got everything safely into the house and into a still unopened crate. I was so excited as I helped me open the crate. We beheld one of the finest diamond-backed box constrictors I have ever seen—a splendid specimen, measured about five feet from tip to tail, and for too big for an apartment. I named him "Esme."

When the show opened, I came back some other time. She was innocently about being "just two words" that I began to think might have a message from mother and so I let her know having even the courtesy to wait till I received her in the main and let loose a torrent of conversation about the snake and her personal troubles. Finally, I got him off her and could see his body was limp—thus he could not coil. I took him into the bathroom, putting him on the smooth the floor, where he dragged himself under the bathtub to his favorite hiding place. A little crack in the woodwork that he had found.
