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Jap Supplies May Be Added To Reparation

TOKYO, Nov. 16 (AP)—Machinery and equipment from Japan's war industries may make up the greater part of the Japanese reparations to the United Nations, Edwin Paulley, U. S. representative on the allied reparations commission, said today. Paulley also indicated that General Hirth's vast personal fortune may be used to pay reparations. Part of the job of his current mission, Paulley said, is to determine whether the emperor's assets should be seized.

Pointing out that the imperial collection of curios alone is valued at \$200,000,000—about \$100,000,000 at official exchange rates—Paulley said: "That is a Japanese asset that must be dealt with accordingly. If there is something we think should go to cover the cost of occupation or reparations, we'll take it. Paulley, President Truman's personal representative on the commission, emphasized, however, that it would not be United States policy to take objects which have a cultural value to the Japanese. "I don't believe Japan can ever pay for the cost of occupation let alone big reparations," Paulley said. He declared that his "former been optimistic" about the Japanese ability to pay a large sum and "after seeing the ruins of Tokyo and Yokohama, I'm even less optimistic."

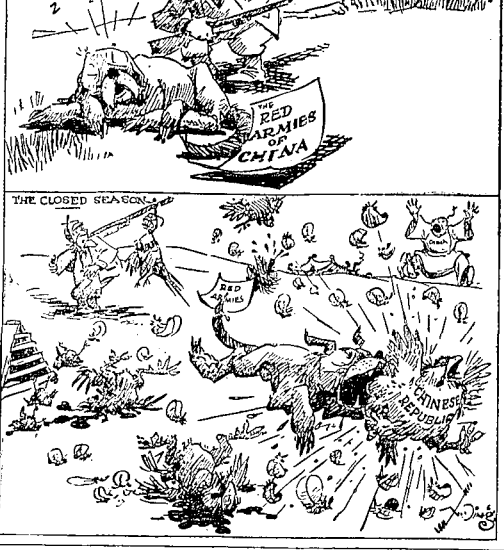

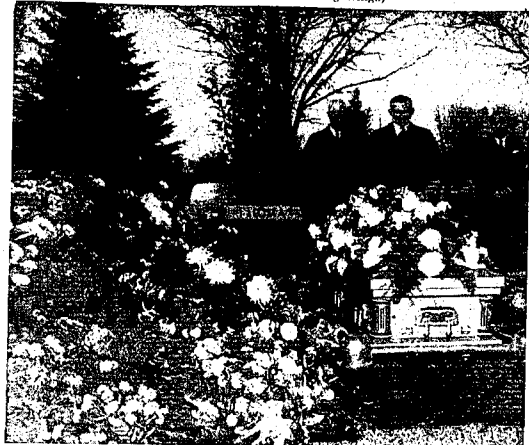

Ranchers, Lawmakers Join in Officer Tells Sun Valley's Resort Plans

GOODING, Nov. 16 — Booted ranchers and ruddy-faced potato growers mingled with senators, government officials and dressed business men yesterday as the west paid tribute to one of its greatest champions — United States Sen. John Thomas — and laid him to rest in picturesque Elmwood cemetery.

This final tribute by his friends from both high and low places in life was a fitting climax to the career of the 71-year-old ranch-bred son of a Kansas homesteader who came to this fertile Magic Valley 46 years ago as a settler and banker and became one of Idaho's outstanding public figures.

More than 600 people jammed in to the chapel of the Thompson funeral home here this afternoon to pay their last respects and a parade of automobiles nearly two miles long followed the hearse to the cemetery where the senator was buried alongside his wife, who preceded him in death.

Throughout the morning leaders of the state gathered at the service began, as it had before, the sun broke through the clouds immediately after the completion of the services at the grave the day became overcast again.

The keynote of the tribute to Idaho's senior senator came from Senator C. Wayland Brooks, R., II, who spoke for the congressional committee appointed by the president to investigate the case of the body here.

"It was sad to see a monument to John Thomas look around this," Senator Brooks declared. "He was a man in his own right to do, in his friendships, in idealism, in his courage, and the mark he has left on the educational, agricultural, commercial and financial institutions of Idaho will carry on through all time as a living monument to a great man."

"We merely came to bring his earthly remains to his old home town and to present and participate in his burial as he would want it to be, among friends he loved so dearly, and to bid him a final adieu — the friends and soil of Idaho."

"In honoring him, we of congress truly honor ourselves, in the building of the rugged and fruitful west, in its glorious story studied by bright lights of achievement of men of sterling character and iron courage, none will shine brighter than the life and accomplishments of John Thomas, who literally died in the active service of the people of Idaho."

The Rev. J. Wesley Miller, retired Methodist minister of Gooding and intimate friend of the senator, was in charge of the service, assisted by the Rev. Irvin S. Mota, pastor of the Gooding Methodist church.

"Approximately the idea," "He was reliable beyond all question and as a public servant he approximated the ideal," the Rev. Mr. Miller declared. "We shall not soon forget the characteristics, his vigor, the persistence, and the tenacity which marked his efforts on behalf of the farmer, the stockman and the furthurbance of reclamation throughout Idaho. He never seemed to be discouraged and nothing seemed to daunt him."

"He was loyal to his friends, liberal in his views, independent in his opinion, courageous in his convictions, an aggressive fighter, an eloquent advocate, an earnest worker, wise legislator."

"He was the embodiment of all the elements essential to the highest type of American citizenship, and the bright example of his life and work must well serve as a guide star for those of us he left behind."

Danger signals for Reich are mounting as winter closes in with its stark hunger and cold conditions which hold their threat of revolt.

This crisis finds allied administration falling short of full efficiency, due largely to France's inability to agree with numerous measures.

It is a strange feeling to move unlearned along the wobbly conquerors of the world. A few months ago they would have attacked you as an enemy.

"From many of the young element I hear and see, I get the impression that to look a step further, as though you had robbed them of their lives, they would prefer that we have knocked the bottom out of their lives."

"The young group is naturally the most indoctrinated with Nazi ideas. Trouble is expected from them this winter."

"In some cases attacks on U. S. personnel have occurred, focusing around 'fraternization.' Refused prisoners of war in their workshirts clothes lead to hand round with young civilians at street corners.

"Nearly half the young men and three-quarters of the young women think the best thing for Germany would be a strong ruler."

"Germany is pouring out her best love of domination. Yet it is clear if her people have not sufficient education in fair play and governing themselves."

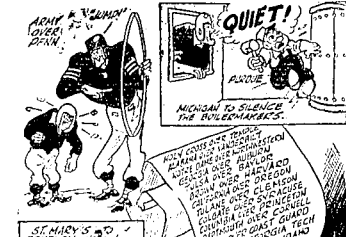

 Among my old Russian acquaintances in Paris had been the Countess and a very intelligent young woman, Madame Louzy. They were making quite a good thing out of the Mademoiselle Marie formula, which they had come by through his widow. A letter arrived from my Russian friends saying they were leaving for Switzerland and had an opportunity to see the formula for themselves. There was Madame Louzy near, a great opportunity to make money in America now that the European perfume market was rapidly becoming a thing of the past.

I promptly took advice on the subject and such a venture from perfumes experts and essential oil houses and found the information of the Monsieur de la Vigne, of Maison Parfums et Cie of France, of the great assistance in developing the first steps necessary to the formation of the formula. Through his personal assistance and kind interest, I was able to obtain a reserve of necessary oils and fragrances required for the formula when they arrived. Chemists and expert blenders went through long, laborious and expensive tests, more enthusiastic after translating some of the old formulae with modern ingredients into the more modern liquid preparations.

With these few choice oils of the more exquisite fragrances and tastefully blended them on the New York market. Their success was astonishing, especially since at that time, 1940, French agents were still procurable, many of them being persons who made the initial mistakes, having no idea how to start a business, plunging into too many perfumes and too many expensive packages at the same time—but we learned, and a year later were off our way making a good thing of a delightful and absorbing business. I have just another branch of the perfume, advertising promotion, and all the usual scene indispensable to presenting them.

The success of my happiest perfume titles of recent months have been through during 1948, I have spent during for the American Women's Voluntary Services' Motor Transport Corps, a group of volunteer women who give their time and care to the services of the Armed Forces.
