An Explanation to Readers and Advertisers

Beginning today and continuing until the acute nationwide shortage of newsprint is relieved, it will be necessary to make a drastic reduction in the size of the Times-News.

The Times-News has notified newspapers generally that deliveries of newsprint must be reduced at least 17 per cent until the first of the year. Beyond that time the mills are making no commitments.

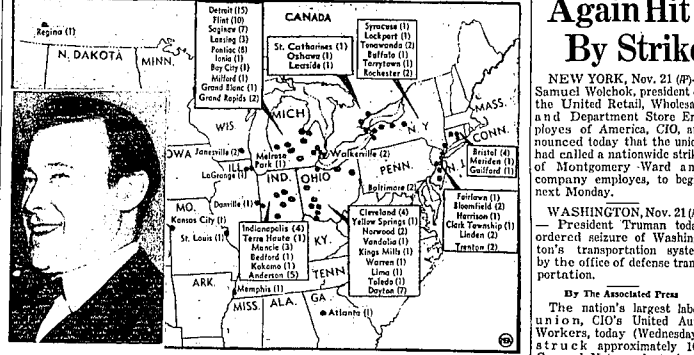

### Rapid Rise in Land Values; 'Boom' Feared

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—The federal reserve system said today that it signs that the rapid rise in farm land values and its effect on the potential methods of preventing a "straw fire" and "boom" are of great concern.

4. A special capital gains tax, the extension of the holding period required before capital gains could be taxable at less than ordinary income rates, and an increased transfer tax.

Mrs. Nease lighted a gas heater and by noon until the children awakened, usually about 10 o'clock. When she suddenly was awakened by a noise, she found the house afire, and wrapping Dicky Jean in a blanket, rushed to the window. Only she and the child escaped, and the child died about two hours later. Mrs. Nease suffered burns on head, back and hands, but attended the funeral of her three children, accompanied by a nurse.

Mrs. Nease is a daughter of Mrs. Alma Bellman (Goodie) Hunt, a piece of Jack Bellman, and attended school in the Magic Valley. Private Nease was notified in Gallup, Nov. 21.

### Judges Unable to Pick Winner, So 3 Given Pencils

CRITICS at the Troutmasters meeting held Tuesday night in the Park Hotel met as usual to decide which address was best, so all three speakers, Russell Jensen, John Fankhauser and Garth Smith, were given blue pencils. The topic for the evening was compulsory military training and Lenin blue was troutmaster.

The speakers in general voiced disapproval of a compulsory military system, suggesting as an alternative free education by the government.

Ensign M. W. Hunt and Donnie Shippy spoke extemporaneously on the lack of international understanding, pointing out that individual understanding was necessary before cooperation could be carried out on a national or international plane.

FRANKFURT, Germany, Nov. 21 (AP)—Eva Braun wrote in her diary that she "rather enjoyed" Hitler and the world's greatest man, and threatened to kill her when Hitler found a "fat-legged" substitute for her.

She confided to the diary that Hitler was rather crude in love-making and that she sometimes gave him an envelope with money without saying a word.

Evita's diary, which she kept in the Eva-treasure chest, covered the four-month period from February to June, and was translated by U. S. intelligence officers. They gave the first intimate details of Hitler, the lover.

"Upon learning of the 'fat-legged' woman, a friend told her she was a substitute for her, Eva wrote that it means of him not to tell me."

Braun's name written in red ink in the diary, she wrote that she was "worried" because she was afraid that she would have to tell the world that she had been "loving" Hitler.

Named "Walter" for Hitler, another woman in the diary was named "Ondra," she was identified as "Ondra."

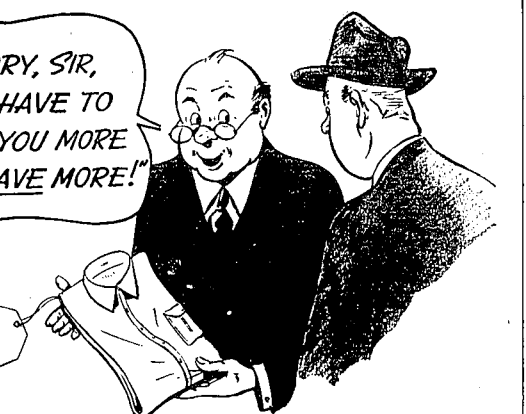

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Sponsors of the so-called "full employment" bill hailed with delight today the approval by a House expenditure subcommittee on a substitute for their measure.

They took this optimistic view despite indications that the substitute is not at all what they wanted—probably not even a "full employment" bill.

Their reasoning was summed up by Representative Patman, D. Tex., author of the measure. "The subcommittee measure which has been passed for two months in the expenditure committee despite opposition by President Truman for action. Other action is contrived.

"A full-time district health unit is an organization of well-trained health workers devoting their whole time to the job of protecting the health of the area they serve."

"Through formation of a district health unit, a board of health composed of local residents would be selected and whose responsibility would be policy making and general administrative guidance." Dr. Parkinson said.

"A full-time health district does not engage in the practice of medicine. It makes no attempt whatsoever to compete with or replace a practicing physician. The unit would act as the contact between district members and the health profession. Interpreting to the people the services available from the unit."

Objectives of the proposed unit, he added, would be: Effective control of communicable disease; improvement in the sanitation of the home and community; special protection of the health of mothers and children; the provision of antitoxic laboratory service; distribution of immunizing sera; and control of vital statistics for the determination of health conditions and interpretation of health information to the public.

# Report On the War

By General George C. Marshall

Biennial Report of the Chief of Staff of the U. S. Army

This is the fourth of 42 installments of material selected from General Marshall's report on the winning of World War II.

**THE ATOMIC ERA**

On 8 August, the entire world learned from President Truman's announcement that man had entered into a new era—that atomic power had been harnessed.

This discovery of American scientists can be man's greatest benefit. And it can destroy him. It is about the latter terrible possibility that this nation must prepare or perish. Atomic power will be the peaceful life of every individual on earth. And it will at the same time affect every instrument of scientific civilization. But the atomic bomb is not so simple a scientific achievement. It makes the possibilities of the future so terrifying. The development of aircraft and electronics has become equally incredible. In order to prevent any possible misuse of the terrific possibilities of the future, I asked the commanding general of our air forces to prepare an estimate of the capabilities of other modern weapons. This report is confined to the certainty but, as is obvious from the atomic bomb, the developments of the war have been so incredible that subtle imagination will not reach so far from the target in estimating the future. Much of the information has until now properly been classified highly secret in our defense research laboratories, at our testing establishments, or in the hands of our military leaders. It is now so important that the people be advised that the possibilities of the future, that I here quote from General Arnold's report:

The start of this war saw bombers capable of 200 miles per hour with a combat radius of 400 miles, effective operations ceiling of 20,000 feet, and bomb load capacity of 10,000 pounds. Today our development of this type air craft has given us bombers capable of carrying 20,000 pounds of bombs to targets 1,500 miles away at speeds of 300 miles an hour and altitudes of over 40,000 feet. Rocket has improved our bombing technique so that we can attack a target effectively even though it be obscured by weather or darkness. We will produce within the next few years jet-propelled bombers capable of flying 800 to 600 miles an hour to targets 1,400 miles away at altitudes of over 40,000 feet. Development of even greater bombers capable of operating at stratospheric altitudes and speeds faster than sound and carrying bomb loads of more than 100,000 pounds already is a certainty. These aircraft will have sufficient range to attack any spot on the earth and return to a friendly base.

Also it expects Unlimited developments in our jet fighters may well produce craft capable of the speed of sound and altitudes of over 50,000 feet. When the barrier of compressibility has been hurdled, as it surely will be, there is no practicable limit to the speed of piloted aircraft.

Fungus growth, feeding on celestial navigation and ocean modified maps, armed radio sets employed by the armed forces in south Pacific battle areas and fire-resistant varnish was perfected for the insulation.

DRAWN BY THEIR OWN FORCE SUCH NEW ROCKETS WILL STRIKE UNERRINGLY TO THE HEART OF THE FACILITY, EITHER BY THE HEAT OF THE FURNACE. THEY ARE SO SENSITIVE THAT IN THE SPACE OF A FEW FEET THEY SENSE THEMSELVES TOWARD A MAN WHO ENTERS, IN REACTION TO THE HEAT OF HIS BODY.

Approach of the atomic bomb has brought attention of extreme danger. Many Americans do not yet understand the implications of the formless rubble of Berlin and the cities of Japan. The techniques now known to us, the cities of New York, Detroit, Chicago, or San Francisco may be subject to annihilation from either continent in a matter of hours.

The navy, now the strongest in the world, will protect our shores against attack from any amphibious enemy who might challenge through the sea approaches, but we must also now be prepared to oppose strategic operations with the techniques and weapons discussed above. It is clear that the only defense against this kind of warfare is the ability to attack. We must secure our nation by careful development and maintaining these weapons, troops, and techniques required to win a vigorous and decisive war against us.

American cities may be brought to an understanding of the needs of future security than the operations by which they were executed. The press and radio have given the American people a thorough day-by-day account of the progress of the war within the limitations of necessary security; never before have the details of military campaigns been so quickly, so accurately, and so completely reported. Yet because of the very bulk of the information plus the blank spots of essential secrecy it has been difficult for the public to place the developments in their proper perspective. It now becomes possible to examine them in retrospect with an emphasis more nearly approaching that which history is likely to give them.
