WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The job of demobilizing America's huge second world war army of 8,300,000 is expected to be half-way complete by mid-December, soon after another drop in discharge points becomes effective.

Russians May Compete With Car Business

The British were reported to have captured the city of Soerabaja, a major port on the island of Java, after a week-long battle.

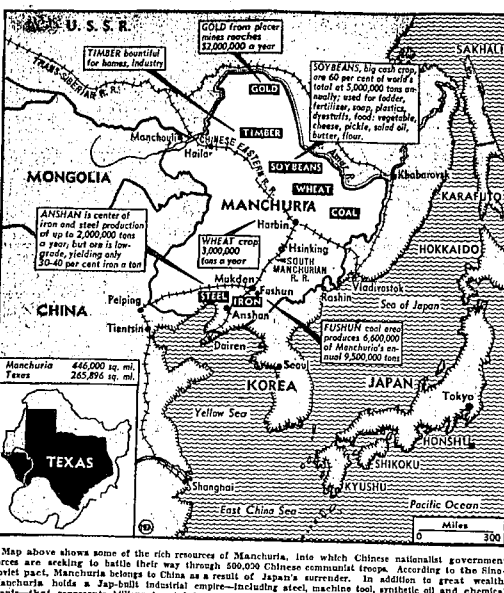

### "Hot Lumber" Edict Not to Be Enforced

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 24 (AP)—An order for teachers in Oregon to stop handling "hot" lumber is not contemplated, the International Brotherhood of Teachers told a newspaper here.

Dave Beck, Seattle, said he would steer away from anything that might "complicate solution" of the AFE labor strike.

In a telephone conversation with the Oregonian, he minimized a prediction by an official of the union that all western teachers might stop handling northwest lumber.

"The only orders of that nature have come from our councils in Oregon," Beck said. "I have nothing of that kind in mind at this time."

The AFE Brotherhood of Teachers and Joiners, however, pledged 100 per cent "financial and moral" support to the strikers.

First general vice president of the union, here to confer with the strike committee, declared the union "is in a sound financial condition and prepared to carry on the battle until the operators meet the demands."

He asserted that "the operators could end the strike today, if they so desired. We would like the strike to end."

Meanwhile, some CIO lumber was reported moving here despite the "hot lumber ban" of the labor council of drivers, with 55,000 members in the Columbia river area.

In Lewiston, Ida., CIO leaders negotiated another 12 1/2 cent wage increase retroactive to Nov. 22.

Operations included are at Lewiston—site of the world's largest white pine mill—Coeur d'Alene, Pocatello, Elk, Bowll and Pierce.

### Revision of French Army Is Proposed

PARIS, Nov. 24 (AP)—President Charles DeGaulle has asked the constituent assembly for a complete reorganization of France's armed forces—a step he repeatedly urged in his speeches without success in his years of service as a French army officer.

French newspapers said today that the general program would permit a thorough shakeup of the country's tradition-ridden army and the introduction of new ideas and methods made necessary by the advent of the atomic bomb.

After France's collapse in 1940, DeGaulle urged greater mechanization of the army. His ideas largely were ignored by his own country but were studied closely by the Germans.

Observers interpreted the announcement of a widespread demobilization for the classes of 1938 through 1942 in the medical and sanitation corps as a possible indication that the new army might be fashioned after the closely-knit elite force so often proposed by DeGaulle.

DeGaulle's cabinet has been so organized that he heads the single national defense ministry. He is assisted by a minister of armies in charge of personnel and a minister of armament for supplies.

Calcutta Riot May Send Off India Blowup

By LOUIS F. KEEMLE United Press Staff Correspondent The rioting in Calcutta has explosive possibilities which may extend to other centers and result in a general conflagration in India.

While begun as a minor student demonstration against the trial of officers of the Japanese-sponsored Indian national army, four days has touched off considerable anti-British hatred and resulted in grave mass outbreaks.

Most Took Part Calcutta adaptations indicate that some of the major Indian factors took part, including the mutually-hated Hindus and Moslems. A government official in Calcutta expressed the view that Hindu-Muslim communal rioting might be renewed, but at the start, at least five of the Hindu Congress party members were reported flying side by side.

The New Delhi trial of former national army officers are the excuse rather than the underlying cause of the disturbance. Actually, the manifestations are motivated by Indian demands for self-determination as part of the broad unrest being manifested by the Indian people.

The fact that Americans have been killed and injured in the rioting does not signify that there is any particular anti-American feeling. Most Indian leaders look to the United States as the only democracy in the East.

Fear Brasties Action Nationalist leaders evidently fear that the situation will develop out of hand and result in ruthless suppression by British authorities. They are of the opinion that "we haven't the strength to stand up to the British at any time during the war—nor like some places."

Ration End Is Seen As Help To Lamb Sale

(AP Special to Times-News) WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—O. N. Winder of Craig, Colo., president of the National Wool Growers' association, said today he believes suspension of meat rationing will result soon in putting distribution of lamb back to normal.

Winder told a reporter rationing had disturbed the normal distribution of lamb. In normal times, he explained, the majority of it goes to the western and eastern seaboard.

During rationing, the middle section of the country absorbed more than usual. "People who use a lot of lamb in the past should soon be able to get it again," Winder said.

Winder said that in many cases a government inspector stamp the grade of the wool. "That means that the buyer was out of profit and the slaughterer was compelled to add up the bill in the freezer slaughtering was reached this past week."

### Hike Seen in Construction Of Buildings

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (AP)—Residential construction since lifting of government restraints is up sharply over last year. Total such contracts set in 31 states east of the Rockies from Oct. 16 to 21 was reported by the Dodge corporation, at \$121,000,000 compared with \$112,600,000 in the same period of 1944.

This is merely a drop in the bucket, however, compared with current housing demands and the amount of such building already planned.

High expectations of the industry for a fast start on an anticipated decade of high-volume construction have faded in sections. Builders' confidence in the government's policy is a factor, the writer's informant said.

George W. Warnicke, New York building financier, said many of the nation's 40,000 builders of homes are not going ahead with planned construction because of the present situation they have no assurance of a reasonable profit.

Reluctance to start new projects he attributed to three factors. First, Warnicke said, is the government's stand as to governmental restraints because of the availability of materials in the field; and third, labor unrest and wage demands present an approximate estimate of the cost of a job.

All builders have to be gamblers, Warnicke said, and he expressed the belief that if continuity of materials supply is assured, the construction men would willingly take the gamble on labor costs.

Three months ago Warnicke estimated the industry would build 450,000 homes in the first part of 1946 and provide employment for 1,000,000 men. Just recently, a survey trip covering the north-west section of the country, he revised this estimate to 1,000,000 with a corresponding drop in employment.

Estimating that costs of home construction are up 30 to 35 per cent over 1944, the New Yorker who company finances builders said there currently is no semblance of a buyers' strike, but he expects one unless these costs are greatly exceeded.

If the industry could build 450,000 homes a year, Warnicke said, costs would be held down and when higher volume is reached there may be expected to recede somewhat.

### British Red "Alarmed" at Atom Policy

LONDON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Harry Pollitt, general secretary of the communist party in Great Britain, said today that "the Soviet union will never be blackmailed by the atomic bomb or anything else" and that "what the Chamberlains and the Hitlers failed to do no Anglo-American imperialist bloc will ever accomplish."

Addressing the party's 16th national conference, Pollitt, expressed alarm at Britain's foreign policy and said Britain's future depended upon relations with the Soviet union more than on any other single factor in the international situation.

"Such relations are not improved by decisions indicating lack of trust in the Soviet union or by words upon the table talk," he said.

"Mr. Attlee would do well to note that only one nation possesses the atom bomb secret and that nation is not Britain," Pollitt said. "No country would suffer more than Britain if ever this deadly weapon were used."

The "Daily Worker," communist newspaper, charged that Britain had said in an "imperialist conspiracy" against the Soviet union.

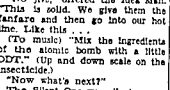

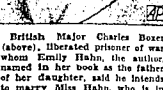

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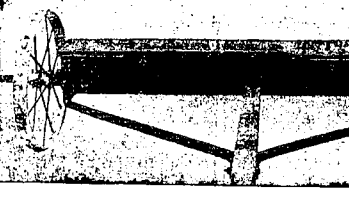
