NEW YORK, Dec. 11 (AP)—The United States conference of mayors today adopted unanimously a resolution urging congressional action of \$100,000,000 for 100 temporary family units to ease the national housing shortage.

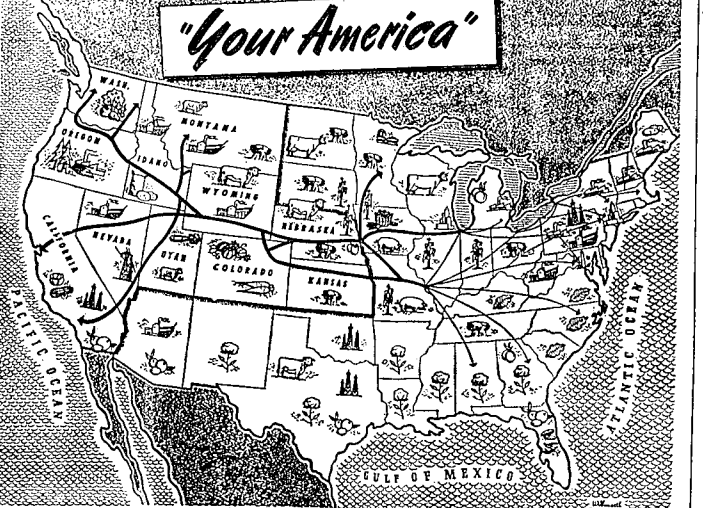

Lawyers See Joint Estate Law Changes

Berrett M. Swelley, county prosecutor, informed of the supreme court ruling that federal and state taxes must be paid on the estate of the spouse who dies first in connection with "community held property," stated that "a profound change will come in Idaho state laws which pertained to the community property."

"As I understand this supreme court ruling, the division of property for taxing purposes has been outlawed," he said.

Harry Denoit, Twin Falls attorney, stated late yesterday that "the survivor of a couple formerly holding community property will find that he or she will probably be compelled to pay a lot more federal and state inheritance tax than they even imagined."

"For example, on an estate that would originally be assessed \$20,000 federal and state tax, under the old Idaho laws, payments now necessary would run as high as \$30,000 because of the higher brackets created by the supreme court ruling for the sole estate because that of the first deceased and cannot be considered as community held property," Denoit pointed out.

"To go a step further," he said, "on an estate of between \$25,000 to \$250,000, federal and state taxes would amount to an increase of about \$30,000 instead of the individual which would have accrued in community held property."
