Plastic Skull Developed for Head Injuries

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Dr. Irving Austin Goldman, false teeth manufacturer from Alexandria, Va., claimed today that he has patented an adaptable plastic skull which will vastly improve treatment of "vertical" head cases.

Goldman said he is making his plastic skull for six-year-old Norman Turner, son of a registered nurse, Mrs. Laura Turner, of Arlington, Va.

"The boy has a very unusual skull formation," Goldman said. "He has only a thin layer of flesh and hair between his brain and the open air. You can see the brain pulsations."

Unable to play "Naturally, his mother has been unable to allow him outside to play with other children," Goldman said. "The slightest pressure on the exposed brain would be fatal."

"His mother took him to many doctors, but no one would attempt making an artificial skull. To do this, they would have to make an impression of the head and brain, and they were afraid it would prove fatal."

"They told me that I had one chance in 3,000,000, but I decided to give it a try."

Took Impression
Goldman, who has pictures to illustrate his work, said that he used a solution of collodion and water, forming an elastic gelatin mass, to get an impression of the child's brain and head.

He is now working on the plastic skull in his Alexandria laboratory. It will be fast-colored, with black hair painted on it. It will have a flexible lining to allow for growth.

"In winter it will be lined with eucalyptus or lamb's wool," he said. "In summer, we will have one with ventilation holes punched in it."

"For the first time in his life, the child will be able to get out and play."

Artificial Limbs
Goldman, a prosthodontist, said he also developed an electric artificial arm, or leg, which reacts to temperatures and operates on its own power.

Goldman, who used to make false teeth in Brooklyn, is director of a new Virginia firm which will manufacture his products.

He has also invented an air compression pistol which inflates an automobile tire when you pull the trigger.

Europe Faces Frigid Winter, Writer Finds

PARIS, Jan. 3.—This is being written in one of the very few Paris hotel rooms with any heat at all, although winter has fastened its icy grip on the French capital with the millions of inhabitants.

Across the street the French tricolor and the stars and stripes are hanging at their standard side by side—a grand sight but an uncomfortable reminder that the wind which is whipping them about is penetrating every nook and cranny of this great city with the sub-zero temperature. That means wholesale suffering, especially among the poor devils whom we euphemistically call the under-privileged.

Death Exams
It means hardship and death not only in Paris but far beyond. For we are sitting here on the edge of a continent that is largely without coal or any other fuel. Europe is struggling with the most dangerous winter it has experienced in modern times.

Offices, hotels and homes in Paris and other cities are only partially heated at best, and many have no heat at all. If you have an apartment, for instance, you are lucky to be able to have a fire in the stove in one room going for a short time each day of extreme cold. Fortunately there is gas enough for moderate cooking purposes. Electricity for lighting is cut off for certain hours each day.

"Black Diamonds"
Lumps of coal are in such black diamonds, for the rationing is harsh. A person living alone is allowed only 330 pounds for the whole winter. A married couple gets double that amount, but there is a restriction per person for larger families. People in the rural districts are allowed to use wood, but they can't sell it in the city. If you are the owner of a country estate you may bring wood into the city for your own use—provided you give the same amount to charity.

One of the most serious aspects of this fuel shortage crisis is the fact that the people have been undeterred throughout the years of war as a result, their resistance to disease has been lowered, and this winter weather is exploiting every static everywhere through illness.

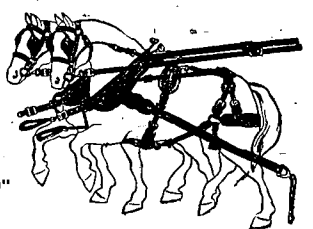

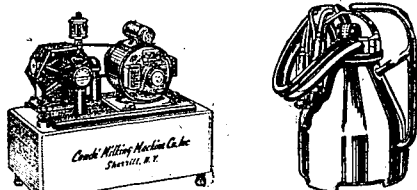

Gov. Williams Asks Economy For Expenses

BOISE, Jan. 8 (AP)—Gov. Arnold Williams told a meeting of the Idaho tax commission and county assessors today that Idaho should economize in its state administration expenses during the period that we have an enormous federal debt that we must pay.

Williams made the assertion in a welcome address to the tax officials at the state capital.

The governor declared that the newly created tax commission is an

advancement in our tax administration in Idaho because it permits men of varied business experience to sit together as a board and pass upon the many tax questions with their collective knowledge.

Williams added that "in my mind this is a step in the right direction in the administration of our tax laws and a great improvement over the former constitutional method of administration by the elective officials."

He suggested to the assessors that tax levies in Idaho should be as light as possible "because of the heavy federal tax burden. Williams said the state is in a good financial condition and we expect to keep it on a sound cash business basis."

After the governor's address, state tax commission members presented figures showing the tax valuation of Idaho lands had declined continuously since 1922. The information was presented without comment but was intended to show that different tax valuation methods were necessary.

Outlines Oregon Plan
Floyd Nade, Twin Falls member of the tax commission, outlined the Oregon system of valuation. Under that scheme all lands are mapped and the valuation is fixed after a careful study of the property by county officials and field officers of the Oregon state tax commission.

The joint meeting of the tax commission and assessors was called in an effort to work out a uniform method of assessing property in Idaho counties. The commission began functioning last May 8 after creation by a 1944 constitutional amendment.

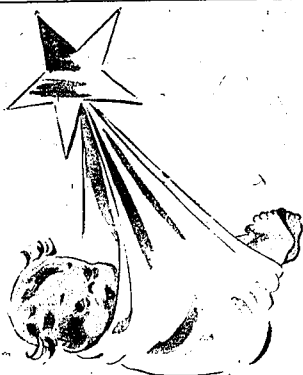
