

Piccards Plan Balloon Trip To New Level

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 9 (UP)—Prof. and Mrs. John Piccard said they were planning a balloon ascent 19 miles above the earth, about 25,000 feet higher than any previous flight.

The Piccards, now at the University of Minnesota, said a special balloon already has been ordered for the flight.

"We plan to use a cluster of 100 balloons each of 10,000 cubic feet capacity," Mrs. Piccard said. "You may have an idea of the size when you consider that the normal balloons used in the Glendon Bennett trophy race average about 80,000 cubic feet."

She said they plan to start the flight in Minnesota.

"We want a large flat area so that the balloon will be at a maximum," she said. "From 100,000 feet we estimate we should be able to see about 400 miles in all directions—Chicago to the east, all of the Dakotas to the west, Missouri to the south and far into Canada on the north."

Piccard said the ascent would be for the purpose of studying wind pressure, temperature and other factors in the atmosphere.

New Birth Data Plans to Be Used

BOISE, Jan. 9.—A new program planned to eliminate errors in birth certificates has been undertaken by Idaho by the state health department.

The program, approved and sponsored by the U. S. bureau in all the states, is for the purpose of studying and correcting errors in birth certificates by the use of a new birth certificate form.

Known as a universal birth questionnaire, a form is mailed with a photostatic copy of the original certificate to the parents who are required to check and confirm all of the information asked on the birth certificate.

Once this has been done by the parents, the form is returned to the state division of vital statistics, and any necessary correction is made, and the original is placed in the permanent file.

If copies of the original certificate are desired, the health department makes an official copy for a fee of 50 cents.

Breckenridge Named Officer Of Sheep Men

BOISE, Jan. 9 (UP)—T. H. Gooding, Breckenridge, was selected president of the J. H. Breckenridge Twin Falls, elected vice-president at the 33rd annual convention of Idaho Wool-growers association today.

Importation of Haque headmen from Spain to work on Idaho ranches was advocated. David Little, chairman of the general operations committee, told delegates that "if the individual grower, or group, as the case may be, were allowed to import in Spain competent men, the labor situation would be much more satisfactory."

Little, speaking on the subject of labor shortage in the sheep industry in Idaho said, "the importation of men from Mexico, a few of whom were tried in Idaho, did not work out."

In November, 1942, a group of growers in Nevada sent a representative to Spain to select men and returned with a group on a temporary permit by the state department. At present the Basques are still in the country on a temporary basis, their papers having been extended over six months period.

Telegrams of Love Sent by Ardent Flier

RENO, Nev., Jan. 9 (AP)—Mrs. Lucy Malcomson's attorney today displayed a series of telegrams he said she received as she traveled west from New York to obtain a divorce here preparatory to marrying Lieut.-Col. Gregory ("Pappy") Hopington, famed marine flier formerly of St. Maria, Ida.

"Can hardly wait. Love you so darn much," one of the wires read. Hopington in San Diego yesterday said he does not plan to marry Mrs. Malcomson, who was to have appeared in court to obtain a divorce from Stewart Malcomson, General Motors production manager in Astoria.

Nears Collapse
"My client is on the verge of complete collapse and is unable to appear in court today," Attorney Joseph P. Haller told an Associated Press reporter. "In all fairness to her, and so you can see she did have some reason to think Col. Hopington had intentions of marrying her. I'd like to show you some wires she received on her way here."

The telegrams were all signed "Pappy." Haller said the first was sent from Los Angeles to Jameson, N. Y. Nov. 8. It read: "I love you. Hurry up and get out here. Miss you terribly. All my love."

Another one read: "The next was sent the same day. It read: 'Nice work darling. Counting days. Good luck. Love you.'"

"Doing fine baby darling. Keep it up. Worry about the time you're under the wire. Can hardly wait. Love you so darn much."

To Omaha, Nov. 11: "After arriving Omaha, distance will go faster. Practically nuts now as you and time are closer. Thanks for the sweet letter. Love you darling."

A telegram sent to Reno Nov. 20 read: "Did not realize you were hurt, darling. Will fly over Wednesday afternoon and back Friday morning. Very anxious to see you. Love you apple duck." It like the others was signed "Pappy."

Mrs. Malcomson, who said yesterday she was "stunned" by Hopington's announcement, said she plans to remain in Reno.

"I have nothing to be ashamed of," she told reporters. "I would like to settle down here and get a job. . . . Also an apartment."

The attractive 30-year-old brunette said she met the marine flying hero in India in 1942 when he was returning to the United States after having served with the Flying Tigers.
