
The returned veteran, who served a total of three and one-half years, formerly operated a refrigerator business in Burley before entering the air corps.

BOISE, Jan. 19.—Sen. Charles C. Gossett today said that Idaho potato growers had been assured that 225 refrigerated cars daily for movement of the potato crop.

He said the figure was arrived at after conferences with potato dealers. "Commissioner William E. Lee of the Interstate Commerce commission says the 225 figure equates an Idaho fair share and he has been assured that he will maintain it," Gossett said in a telegram to the governor.

"Lee reports Idaho refrigerator pool now out up to 1,000 cars and he says sufficient maintain daily loadings that level. Reports period Jan. 11-15 indicate loadings ranged from 225-285 cars."

He added that he decided to come to Twin Falls "because it didn't run across any city that showed as promising as Twin Falls in the way of general business, climate and recreation possibilities."

Folsom Voted Recreational Head for '46

William H. (Bill) Folsom will be recommended to the city council Monday night for appointment as city recreation director for the 1946 summer program.

The appointment will be submitted by Parks Commissioner O. H. Coleman following action of the Twin Falls city recreation board Friday night in naming Folsom director of the summer recreation program.

Folsom, former state Brain trust and Washington State college varsity basketball player, is a four-year veteran of the navy and saw several years of Pacific service. He will resume his schooling at University of Idaho following the summer recreation program.

Recreation board was given a resolution inviting all city veterans and church organizations to help coordinate the summer recreation activities through the recreation board. A second resolution instructed the board secretary to write all such organizations with the request that each appoint a recreation committee member to assist in the recreation program.

James J. Miller, vice-chairman of the board, was elected chairman of the board. Other members are John D. Platt, Charles E. Sinner and Chic Cavender. All are appointed by the city council last Monday on recommendation of Coleman, whose departmental budget includes recreation.
