UN Hearing Set In Interference Of Reds, British

LONDON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The United Nations security council voted unanimously today to put the Russian, Greek and Indian situation on its agenda and consider them next Monday and Wednesday.

The action does not necessarily insure an investigation of the Iranian complaint to which Russia has vigorous objection.

The Soviet delegate agreed that the matters be placed on the agenda with the reservation that the security council at the next session will consider only whether it shall have a hearing on the merits of the Iranian charges.

Soviet delegate Andrei G. Vinsky emphasized that he would accept any detailed discussion of the merits of the Iranian case.

The council vote came after Vinsky formally had opposed taking up the Iranian matter and had offered instead that Russia and Iran should discuss their differences in the near future.

British Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin said he would support the council's decision to take up the Iranian case.

Bevin said he thought that in all these cases the complaints should be referred to the Security Council.

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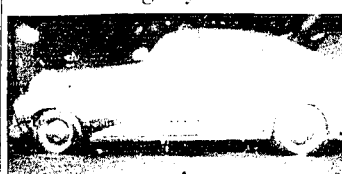
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And Nightly It Snows

County '46 Tentative Budget Set \$556,740

Tentative county budget of \$556,740 from Jan. 1, 1946 to Jan. 1, 1947 has been approved by the board of commissioners, County Auditor C. A. Bulles announced.

The tentative or preliminary budget is \$11,150 lower than last year's tentative figure of \$567,890. It is \$10,000 above the 1945 final budget and the difference is entirely accounted for by an \$11,000 estimate for election expenses this year. No election cost was needed in 1945.

Of last year's budget, which was trimmed and approved at \$546,646, the total actually spent was \$417,526.21, Bulles said.

A public hearing will be conducted in the county commissioners' office, Feb. 1, at 10 a. m., for the hearing of the county commissioners' budget, revised if it necessary.

Revisions, however, may be made only on items of the tentative budget amounting to \$108.20, as estimated current expenses, \$20,200, salaries, \$24,400, sheriff, \$2,200, auditor, \$17,400, treasurer, \$12,500, supervisor of public instruction, \$7,000, precinct attorney, \$3,700, grants, \$12,200, collector, \$1,000, assessor, \$10,000, jailer, \$9,000, county agent, \$15,750 and miscellaneous, \$68,900.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 25 (AP)—AFL President William Green today announced the reformation of John L. Lewis and his 50,000 United Mine Workers with the American Federation of Labor.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 25 (AP)—A source close to John L. Lewis reported today that Lewis had decided to join the 50,000 United Mine Workers back into the American Federation of Labor next week.

The informant, who asked that his name be withheld, said Lewis is on his way from Springfield, Ill., to Miami to formally bury his differences with his old-time colleagues on the AFL executive council next meeting at Miami, having some unforeseen developments.

Lewis left the American Federation of Labor in 1926 to form the U. M. W. and later left that organization for his United Mine Workers.

William Green, president of the AFL, has been in frequent contact with Lewis but would not confirm today that the U. M. W. chief had submitted an application for readmission.

Lewis has been drifting with the federation since he left the CIO in 1932. Once he said his old capital has for years to the AFL but he did not like the terms the executive council imposed on him and asked for return of the check for approximately \$400,000.

This time, however, the council appeared ready to comply with Lewis' condition a seat on the policy-making 15-man executive council.

Other members said privately that Lewis could have the seat created by Harry W. Brown, president of the Automobile, if he wants it. The machinations left the AFL in October last year.

Lewis planned to be in Miami Sunday on Monday, his associates said.

Lewis and AFL President Green worked in Miami, Saturday during the November 1945 election campaign in Washington, and all signs of past bitterness had apparently disappeared.

Local Oratory Contest to Be Held March 31

The 14th annual high school oratorical contest under the sponsorship of the American Legion will be held locally March 31. The district contest will be March 15 and the state contest will be March 31.

The contest at Twin Falls high school will be in charge of the English department which includes these teachers: Garth Reid, Myrtle de Paul, Edna Lindgren, Janet Felt and coordinator of English, Mrs. Rose M. North.

Purpose of the event is the development of an informed and loyal citizenry and development of leadership. This is a curricular activity and all senior students are to participate and any other interested student.

English teachers are to direct the writing of the compositions, and to help in preparation for extemporaneous talks. Kentucky Ball will assist in securing factual information and Ruth Street, high school librarian, will arrange a special card of books for reference work.

A written examination—10 to 15 minutes in reading length—will be required and best papers will be selected for oral reading. Oral reading of papers will be judged on pronunciation, voice, emotional appeal, direction of writer, personality and final elimination on basis of oratorical ability.

Competitions will be on the topic: "The Constitution—Guardian of the People's Rights." Extemporaneous orations will be from 4 to 5 minutes in length and will deal with some phase of the Constitution of the United States.

National contest awards are first prize, a \$4,000 scholarship to the candidate's choice of college or university; second prize, \$500 scholarship; third prize, \$250 scholarship; and fourth prize, \$250 scholarship. State contest awards are first prize, a gold medal, second prize, a silver medal, third prize, a bronze medal.

Local American Legion post will be the judge in the Twin Falls contest and will be in charge of Mr. H. W. Terry, post commander, and Mr. W. W. Thomas, local chairman of the oratorical contest. Local awards will be gold trophies for first and second places.



WOE FOR CITIES — "If atomic bombs are used in the next war, it seems certain that all the principal cities of the world, including those of the United States, will be utterly destroyed and their inhabitants killed." — Harold C. Urey (discoverer of heavy hydrogen and head of the University of Chicago Institute of Nuclear Physics), quoted in *The Nashville Tennessean*, October 22, 1945.

"We can direct rockets to targets by electronic devices and new instruments which guide them accurately to sources of heat, light, and magnetism. Drawn by their own fuses such rockets will streak unerringly to the heart of big factories, attracted by the heat of the furnaces. They are so sensitive that in the space of a large room they aim themselves toward a man who enters, in reaction to the heat of his body. All of these weapons (the rockets and others previously mentioned) and their possible combinations make the air approaches of a country the points of extreme danger. Many Americans do not yet understand the full implication of the formless rubble of Berlin and the cities of Japan. With the continued development of weapons and techniques now known to us, the cities of New York, Pittsburgh, Detroit, Chicago, or San Francisco may be subject to annihilation from other continents in a matter of hours." — General George C. Marshall, in his 70,000-word report on the war as published in *The New York Times*, October 10, 1945.
