Cameras Will Record Atom Bomb Trials

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Cameras on top of 100-foot steel towers, strung in a ring around the warships in Bikini atoll, will photograph the navy's atomic bomb tests this summer.

The cameras will be automatic, operated by remote control, by radio or electric ship. Other cameras will take pictures from airplanes at various distances. In addition, several planes operated by remote control, like the famous "Enola Gay," will carry cameras to take pictures from the immediate vicinity.

The towers, which will be in batteries, set over several islands surrounding the atoll, will be watered. The instruments will be housed in small rooms, each shielded against X-rays and other active hazards of an atomic bomb explosion. However, the towers will require periodic shielding from the sun, because the cameras are very sensitive to fading by even a slight excess of radioactive rays.

The cameras will be taken to prevent the heat of the explosive flash from burning the film. This heat will be dissipated by a fan. Although the cameras on the top of towers will be from five to ten miles distant from the explosion, the sensitive film must be protected from the heat of the flash.

Each camera will be in a frame of photographs taken in New York. The first photo, that showed the flash just developing as a small fire, had a large black spot in the center, the result of burning. The second frame, showing the explosive in a little larger, had several black spots. The protection against heat will be furnished by filters that screen out the hot rays.

Lumber Firms Ready; Await Good Weather

SEATTLE, Jan. 30.—The west coast's giant lumber industry, with unified orders in its books earlier this month for more than 700,000,000 board feet of lumber, appears to be ready to swing into high tempo as soon as weather permits.

The current outlook for this area's major industry, as seen by the U. S. employment service, is that sufficient manpower is now available. The paralytic lumber strike has ended, except for a few holdouts. Demand is heavy. But heavy snow has hampered the industry's ability to move lumber to market.
