## New Critical Problem Goes To Un Group

LONDON, Feb. 5 (AP)—Syria and Lebanon headed the United Nations security council a new explosive issue today, asking withdrawal of all British and French troops from the Levant, while the council sought to unravel the tactical results from a Russian attempt to use the veto power in the Soviet-British disagreement over Greece.

The veto was raised for the first time before the council, blockading action on the Greek question. It also required the council to decide whether Britain and Russia could all the time question the right of British troops in Greece were endangering world peace, as charged by Moscow. The British have demanded complete evacuation of their troops in Greece.

CHUNGKING, Feb. 5 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek said today that he was ready to sign the Sino-Soviet treaty, but that the Chinese people will be finished when the Soviet government has been established.

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Continuance of the coalition, he said, will depend upon the national assembly's action in establishing constitutional government.

## Uruguay Asks Clemency for Nazi Leaders

LONDON, Feb. 5 (AP)—Uruguay asked the United Nations today to take the death penalty for Hermann Goering and other Nazi war lords on trial at Nuremberg and to give them punishment to life imprisonment.

The Uruguayan delegation proposed that the United Nations' constitution recommend amendment of the war crimes charter to outlaw the death penalty for the leaders.

The surprise move threatened to end a farious debate in the UN general assembly.

It was the second resolution presented on orders from the Montevideo government, said public relations officers here.

It was a statement accompanying the resolution that the Uruguayan delegates pointed out that Uruguay had suffered the death penalty 40 years ago.

## Vet Chief at Boise Blamed By VFW Head

Robert L. Sumnerfield, Twin Falls, VFW department chief of staff, stated here late yesterday that C. H. Hudson, Boise, manager of the regional office of the veterans administration, "could do much to clear up the situation" of having the veterans problems in this area dominated by one official in New York.

Sumnerfield's statement followed release of a story from Washington, D. C., that Gen. Omar B. Bradley, veterans administrator, had defended Hudson against VFW charges of allowing favoritism toward the American Legion.

Planes Bradley  
Sumnerfield said, "I think Gen. Omar Bradley is doing a fine job, but that the recent attack upon him by John Steff, commander of the American Legion, is purely unwarranted."

"As a member of the two largest national veterans' organizations I realize that in every organization there exist a few individuals who, for purely personal and selfish reasons, would sacrifice the fair, impartial and competent administration of veterans affairs."

In Idaho the veterans administration has been dominated by one organization. Such a situation does not lend itself to the efficient and impartial handling of veterans affairs. The veterans administration in Idaho should do much to correct this situation.

Sumnerfield added that, "at a council meeting of the Legions held in Boise early in January, Mr. Hudson was appointed state chairman of the Legion membership committee."

"He did not refuse to serve in that office at the time of his appointment," Sumnerfield pointed out.

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
