

Funds Sought For Hospital Building, Pay

BOISE, Feb. 9 (AP)—Funds for immediate activation of a state tuberculosis hospital, for construction of additional buildings at the state mental institutions and for salary increases in the public schools, were demanded today by the Idaho state planning board.

The board recommended that an expected special session of the state legislature appropriate funds to carry out the suggestions.

Needs at the state mental institutions, the board said, "necessitate any economic consideration." These appropriations were suggested:

Blackfoot—\$401,324 to construct a disturbed-patients building, utility building, superintendent's and physicians' residences.

Orlando—\$748,476 to construct a 200-bed dormitory, central heating plant and utility building.

Hailey—\$222,138 to construct a nurses home and several minor units.

Conditions Not Good

In a statement the board said it "realized fully that the labor market and the market for all needed materials is not one conducive to economical construction."

But it added that "there are certain functions of a humanitarian nature which the state is obligated to do, among which are the custody and treatment of afflicted persons."

The board suggested appropriation of \$600,000 to activate a state tuberculosis hospital. It recommended that the suggestion of an Idaho medical society committee be followed. That proposal called for abandonment of partly-completed hospital facilities at Gooding in favor of a new building at Boise.

Urges Positive Action

But if that plan does not prove feasible, the board said, it urged that "because of the urgency of the situation, some positive action be taken."

Also recommended was appropriation of funds "for the immediate establishment of a vocational training school at Weiser, utilizing existing and available facilities to help in handling veteran training."

Pay Boosts Desired

Declining the school problem, the board said financial assistance to permit increased teacher salaries was desirable. It mentioned no specific figure, however.

The board said, also, that the "inequality of school districts in their teachers of accepted standards" was a result of "inadequate property valuation."

Assessed valuation of property in Idaho in 1926, the board said, was \$50,325,303. On Jan. 31, it was \$42,991,154.

"It is obvious," the board commented, "that the total of the present assessed valuation reflects none of the growth and increased investment which has been made in Idaho in the past 24 years."

Jap Character "False Front" For Inferiority, Says Colonel

There is nothing mysterious about the Japanese character—it is merely a false front for inferiority, said Lieut.-Col. Gwynn U. Porter, son of District Judge and Mrs. James W. Porter, Friday at the home of his parents here.

A captive of the Japs for nearly three and one-half years after he had been taken on Correllador, the officer is spending part of his leave with his parents. His wife, the former Mayne Coleman, daughter of Councilman O. H. Coleman, is at Riverdale, Calif., with their two young daughters who are attending school.

Colonel Porter, a lean, mid-mannered man, is still 10 to 15 pounds under his usual weight.

They're inferior.

"There's no question about it—the Japanese are an inferior race," the officer said. "There's a duality in their character. Everything about them is false front, paper-mache."

"They fear the white man and a lot of their queer customs and actions are used to hide this inferiority. They're very worried about the impression they make on others—even on their prisoners. Why, all the cruelty and starvation they inflicted on us was done to maintain a certain impression in us."

A West Pointer, class of 1933, in the officer's life for the Philippines late in 1941, arriving 10 days before the Japs struck at Pearl Harbor. He was a regimental staff captain in the coast artillery anti-aircraft and was stationed on Correllador.

Before he left the States, Colonel Porter received 45 from E. L. Raybro, Jr., Raybro, then stationed on Luzon, P. I. The uncle told the officer to give the money to his nephew. But the men never met.

"I'm going down and give back the money," said Colonel Porter, laughing.

The officer was promoted to major before his capture in May, 1942. He departed for Japan in November, 1942 and was imprisoned in Osaka, Henshu Island, Zentsu, Chikoku, and Fukui province, Honshu. He was liberated Sept. 8, 1945 and was promoted to lieutenant-colonel when he returned to Manila.

Endures Mac's Policy

He heartily endorses General MacArthur's occupational policy in Japan, which procedure uses the prisoner as an instrument.

"MacArthur went into Japan with one division when there were two to three million armed Jap troops in the home islands," he said. "If he had been 'We're going to cut off the emperor's head,' three millions of men might have risen against him."

Colonel Porter disapproved of the manner in which American troops expressed the desire to come home. Their behavior was unattractive, he said. Although every soldier has the right to wish to come home, such a

desire should not be expressed by condemnation of their commanding officers.

The officer expects to remain here about two or three weeks. Then he will return to his family. In April he reports to Ft. Sam Houston, Tex., for reassignment and hopes to attend the command and general staff school at Leavenworth, Kan., then be assigned to Europe.

As for making devout folks of the Japs, the officer said it would take 200 to 300 years.

Two places of business in Rupert were closed last week by state health authorities who said that operators of the firms had failed to meet sanitary requirements. Dr. O. T. Parkison announced Saturday.

Places closed were Ray's club and Larry Dean's ice cream parlor. A sign reading "Closed by order of the state health department" was placed in the window of the pool hall and beer parlor club to enforce demands by the health department that the place either clean up or close up.

Closed Voluntarily
As for the ice cream parlor, the management closed the place voluntarily until requirements set out by the state health department could be met. They have been closed a week and will likely be closed several days next week until their present cleanup campaign is completed.

As for the club operated by Ray's club, it was closed of noon Wednesday, but reopened Saturday after meeting certain requirements set out by the health department.

Dr. Parkison, district health officer, said that he had H. S. Parkison, a health officer, on the north side of Snake river, served notice on a beer hall operator at Eden and another at Paul to comply with the state sanitary code or close up.

Have Been Insured
"We have been insured in our inspections and produce in our warnings to the operators of place serving food and drink to the public," declared Dr. Parkison.

"We are now working with warnings. When we go into a place that is violating the rules of sanitation, we're going to close them up."

FIRMS HERE WARNED
Closing of several beer parlors in Twin Falls may become necessary in the near future because the operators have been refused to adhere to sanitation regulations despite repeated warnings, Fred Haldridge, Twin Falls sanitarian, warned Saturday.

A survey conducted during the past week revealed only two beer parlors, out of 15, washing their glasses in warm, soapy water, and during rush hours even these two places used only the system of dipping the glasses in chlorinated water.

The report of the state game commission, as appearing in the Jan. 27 issue of an Idaho daily newspaper, for the Idaho Daily Statesman, is the attention of Idaho sportsmen to the extent of selecting a location for trout, and the anticipated results to be obtained by restricting catch limits of fish.

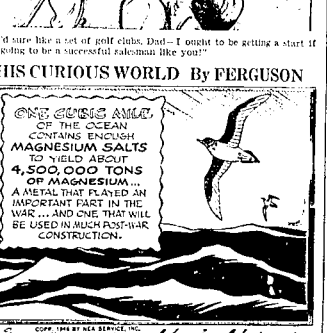


Promising

Editor, Times-News:
In spite of an occasional letter in the Forum disparaging the Times-News plan future, its prospect was never more promising than this February, 1946. We are very glad to be able to tell you the following:
At Washington, three new congressional committees have been organized to study and report on the effect of the war on the home and small independent business men and on farmers, and advocate federal protection for the latter. The Times-News organization proposes full coverage for the entire group.
Tentative legislation pending in congress also calls for national insurance for all citizens 60 years of age or older who rely on gainful employment. The program would be financed by three per cent gross income tax with certain exemptions in the case of individuals.
