

Marine Husband of Girl Here Killed in Worst Air Crackup

The husband of a Twin Falls girl—and father of a six-months-old daughter—died among the 27 victims of an American Airlines transport plane crash east of San Diego, it was revealed here this afternoon. The crash is termed the worst in commercial airlines' history.

He was Sgt. Lawrence A. Criswell, about 25, who served overseas twice as a marine corps bomber gunner.

He was the husband of the former Marjorie Webster, who served as a private first class.

Mrs. Criswell and the baby were to have boarded a North-west Airlines plane at Pocatello to fly to Salt Lake City, where they had reservations on United Airlines to fly to


