Greed Endangers World, Truman Says in Bid for Church Support

COLUMBUS, O., March 6 (AP)—President Truman today asked church support for his budgeting legislative program, emphasizing that persons "greedy for gold" threaten the future of the nation and the world.

He called for a "national renewal of religious faith" as the only solution to problems of the atomic age.

Mr. Truman spoke to a special session of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in America, an organization of most of the Protestant denominations in this country. His address was broadcast over the radio.

The President said that mankind is on the threshold either of destruction or the greatest age in history because of the atomic power which man has acquired through atomic energy.

"Only a high moral code can master this new power of the universe and develop it for the common good," he said. "When the greed and the covetousness, the selfishness and the materialism have all exhausted their stinging of atomic energy, only one solution will remain—the substitution of decency and reason and brotherhood for the rule of force in the government of man."

"There is no problem on this earth too tough to withstand the flame of a genuine renewal of religious faith."

Along with his appeal for a re-

surgence of religious belief, Mr. Truman sharply criticized those who oppose his legislative program before Congress.

Confronting one of the most sharply worded speeches he has made since entering the White House, the President said:

"A truly religious fervor among our people would go a long way toward obtaining a national health program, a national education program, a national education program, an extended and improved social security program."

Legislators May adjourn Tomorrow; Senate Passes Measure Raising Pensions

BOISE, March 6 (AP)—The senate passed unanimously today a bill to appropriate \$832,217 for increased public assistance as the special session of the Idaho legislature stalled on its ninth day—the day leaders aimed for adjournment. There was every indication it would extend into tomorrow for a second special session.

The public assistance measure, which goes to the house for action, would increase the average old age pension from the present \$32.40 monthly to \$37.88. The aid to dependent children grant would be raised from the present \$12.17 to \$25.23. In January there were 9,727 old age pensioners and 3,437 receiving dependent children benefits.
