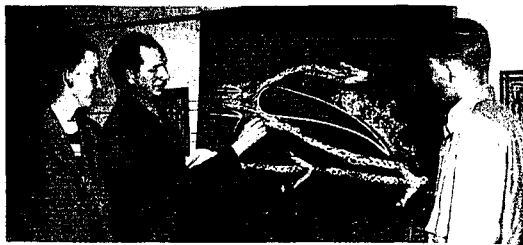
Churches Observe Beginning of Lent

Strike Cites Need of U. S. For Research

Science and research to produce new products and supply the solution to our economic dilemma, C. J. Strick, president and general manager of the U. S. Chemical company, told Twin Falls Kiwanis Club members and their former guests at the annual Farmers' banquet at the Park hotel Thursday night.

Strick rapped the American people for looking their economic woes on the doorstep of government and urged the development of new industry along research lines to offset the high national income caused by war production.

He deplored the fact that many young men during war times had become adjusted to incomes beyond their capacity to earn in a peace time economy and asserted that "we need another Pearl Harbor to jar us out of our complacency to stimulate production again."

Strick asserted that the OPA "in which the American people put more faith than in God" has stifled production by disrupting our traditional democratic way of life and imposed too many economic controls on the people.

"We have to get our government policy decided one way or the other," he said. "It traditionally has been for capital and freedom of enterprise to foster the increase in production. The OPA is checking this freedom and making idle dollars. The businessman's way of investing because he's wary of government policy."

The power official declared that America wanted the OPA because we didn't find a substitute for war production and expressed hope that we could waste our next five or six years in the same way.

"Chemistry and a full planning program is needed in Idaho to introduce new agricultural crops that will be more profitable and to replant the crops that are declining in profit," Strick said.

Paul Hensrud spoke briefly on the Red Cross drive. W. O. Smith, chairman of the Twin Falls Red Cross committee, was moderator for the banquet and Kiwanis president John Pratt presided.

A horseshoe quartet composed of C. J. Strick, J. C. Anderson, Charles Allen and J. C. Brown sang and a quartet consisting of J. C. A. Fuller, Red Cross members and Frank Warren played two numbers. Mrs. C. J. Pratt accompanied the musical numbers and the Red Cross presented two humorous readings.




