

Famine Board Has 39 Ways To Save Food

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The 39 ways suggested by President Truman's famine emergency committee by which Americans can save food for the hungry abroad included:

1. For hotels, restaurants, dining cars, institutions and other public feeding places:
 - a. Discontinue the use of meat as a garnish with meat, poultry, egg and other entrees.
 - b. Discontinue the practice of placing baskets of rolls and bread on dining room tables. A single roll or slice of bread should be served with the entree, and later collected.
 - c. Eliminate the custom of trimming meat and other food.
 - d. Substitute open saucers for fully plated or two-bread plate service.
 - e. Use potatoes in place of certain wheat and rice garnishes.
 - f. Use rice and rice or corn in place of two-crust pie whenever possible.
 - g. Serve corn and buckwheat cakes in place of wheat cakes where possible.
 - h. Serve oatmeal bread, cake and cookies as alternates for products made from wheat.
 - i. The size of rolls and the thickness of toast and other breads should be reduced so that the bread can be reduced by not filling the pans as deeply as at present.
 - j. Substitute fruits and other desserts for puddings and cakes wherever practicable.
 - k. Limit the number of crackers in individual packages or served with soups, chowders, or other dishes.
 - l. Eliminate three-layer cakes.
 - m. Wherever possible, use of meat by customers to order what they like.
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 - o. Use bottled dressings instead of all dressings on salads wherever possible.

Recommendations to consumers:

1. Prevent waste of bread. It is estimated that five per cent of the slice out of every loaf baked every day goes into the garbage.
2. Use less bread at each meal. Use potatoes for example as alternates for bread. One small serving of potatoes replaces a slice of bread.
3. Use less bread in food value. The fruits and other desserts for puddings and cakes wherever practicable.
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Successful ways for saving fats and oils at home included:

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Recommendations for the baking industry:

1. Reduce by at least 10 per cent the weight of bread and bakery products.
2. Wherever practicable, bakers should feature smaller loaves and size loaves.
3. Bread should be sliced thinner to provide more slices per loaf.
4. Partial loaves or bread should be offered for sale as a waste preventing measure.
5. Save flour and fats and oils by avoiding spillage and waste.
6. For Distributors:
 - a. Recommendations for food distributors and manufacturers:
 - i. Promote the use of alternate and more plentiful foods in the diet, such as—canned tomatoes, fish, eggs, poultry, citrus fruits, and seasonal vegetables.
 - ii. Assist customers by providing recipes using the more plentiful foods.
 - iii. Adopt measures for greater conservation and prevention of waste in food distribution channels.
 - iv. Encourage customers to conserve what prevent waste of food and to use food fats and oils wherever possible.
 - v. In the manufacture of food items use alternate ingredients wherever possible in lieu of ingredients.

Reds Indicate Pressure May Be Effective

By JAMES D. WHITE
SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—The quiet way Russia pulled her troops out of Manchuria right after the American and British note on Manchuria suggests, that Moscow may be sensitive to such pressure.

But whether by design or not, this Manchurian situation to remain all concerned that any such sudden move—even a seeming threat—can upset the delicate balance of the internal force in China.

The moment the first army left Manchuria, there were reports of serious fighting between the estimated 300,000 Chinese communist troops around the city and the 14,000 well-armed central government forces the Russian had allowed to come in.

Agreement Obtained






Three Improvements Aid City Airport



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Airport Gets Improvements To Aid Pilots

Expansions in commercial and private flights at Twin Falls airport have resulted in three improvements to Aid Empire Airlines and owners of nearly 40 private planes at the field.

A new wind tee, painted bright orange and made of 12 feet long, was constructed by members of Twin Falls civil air patrol under direction of Commander George Penon.

The tee, visible from extreme heights, will aid pilots in determining wind directions, and also can be anchored to point in any particular runway to guide pilots.

On Sunday afternoon, Penon said, so many as 10 planes take off from the airport, necessitating a wind tee to direct the planes to use particular runways and avoid possible accidents.

Materials for the tee were donated by Self Manufacturing company, Western Oil company and Freighter Oil company. Members of the CAP designed and assembled the finished project.

Flight lines, on either side of the main hangars, also have been improved. The lines donated by the Chamber of Commerce, the lines will enable many of the private plane owners to "anchor" their ships in line of hangar space.

Flight improvement at the airport is the remodeling of an old dam, formerly building into a modern hangar, drinking water, chromatic furnishings and office space CAP project. Work is being done by CAP members, who are constructing the building to adjoin the present building.

Penon said other improvements and traffic controls also are being considered for the near future. The work, he said, was sparked by the CAP with cooperation of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and Junior Chamber of Commerce.



Methodists Raise \$35,000 in Region For Europe Needy

Methodist churches in the south-eastern Idaho district have raised about \$35,000 for the relief of needy war-torn Europe, the Rev. George G. Hensley, district superintendent, announced yesterday.

The local church has collected \$7,100, he said. Methodists nationally have rolled up 25 million dollars. The plan is national and cooperating with drives of their own are several other Protestant denominations, including the Presbyterians, Quakers, Presbyterians and Church of the Brethren, Methodists. They work through the World Council of churches.

Although general relief work is done in most ravaged lands, operations in Germany, Austria and Japan are restricted by the government to adding church members only, he said. In Germany, little work has been permitted since the American zone of occupation.

"Three million dollars has already been spent by the Methodist church," he said. "For example, in France, we paid \$150,000 for surplus American government blankets and gave them to needy Europeans. Twenty-five thousand dollars went to buy food for Greek children."

He pointed out that President Truman had said that 1,200 calories daily were enough for the German people. But this diet must be supplemented if malnutrition and deficiency diseases are to be avoided. Heighening the need for church aid is the fact that UNRRA is not efficient, he said.
