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Friday Limit for Tax Return—and On Estimates too

Twin Falls taxpayers Wednesday were reminded that they have only until Friday midnight to file their 1945 federal income tax returns for the calendar year 1945 and estimated 1946 income tax returns.

Either Twin Falls residents are filing out their own returns without assistance, remarked Cecil Ploot, deputy collector of internal revenue, or else they're waiting until the last minute. There have been surprisingly few people asking assistance.

The internal revenue office upstairs in the Burklehoff building has three regular employees and one temporary aid to assist taxpayers in making out returns. Ploot said he urged taxpayers to avoid waiting until the last minute to file out returns which would jam his office and also cause the taxpayer to wait.

Postmaster M. A. Strunk said that for the letter to the internal revenue office to be postmarked by midnight of March 15, it would be necessary to have it in the postoffice by 8 p. m. Strunk stressed the point that the return should be dropped in the letter slot in the postoffice building and not in the mailbox outside, as is so often practiced in time.

Everyone who has made a gross income of over \$500 in 1945 must file a 1945 federal tax return, whether or not he would be required to pay any tax, Ploot said. An estimated tax return on 1946 income will be required if over \$500, of which over \$100 is not subject to withholding for 1946.

Anyone receiving two-thirds or more of his income from farming is not required to file an estimated return until January, 1947, Ploot explained.

Hoover Urges Americans to Feed Starving

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Ask an inviolable guest to dinner. An earnest man with broad eyes made this request in America.

"Imagine," said President Herbert Hoover slowly, "that some starving person is, in fact, sitting at your dinner table."

He was looking at 35 reporters, crowded into the hotel room, but he was talking to them alone. He read food figures from a sheet of notes but it was the people behind the figures in Europe and Africa—who troubled him.

Hoover Weary
The nation's only living ex-President slumped wearily in the cushions of the blue sofa. But he told the reporters he was living Sunday in vast countries that are asking for food.

Hoover seemed preoccupied. As he talked he scratched the back of his head thoughtfully. A moment of silence followed the news conference when photographers asked him "Can you contribute for a picture?"

"I could repeat the alphabet," he offered helpfully. "I don't know anything. But I don't want to stand up. That would lead me into an argument and I don't like arguments."

He went back to the subject. "If we could only remember," he said, "that in saving food to feed other people, we are fighting in the same cause, the cause of Christ's unity."

Reporters, Japs too?
A reporter wondered if Hoover thought Germans and Japanese should come at the bottom of the food list.

"I am looking at this job from the principle of human life," was the answer. "That to the only fixed principle on which the American people can proceed."

Going down in the elevator with seven reporters, Hoover took his familiar, crumpled hat. A bulky figure in his brown tweed overcoat, he was guided by a side door.

He looked like a man with many people on his mind.

No End Seen for Dearth of Sugar

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Sugar will remain scarce the rest of this year and perhaps into 1947, says the agriculture department.

It stressed this despite some prospective ration increases, announced by the OPA yesterday. These apply to such uses as bakeries and hotels and restaurants and not to household use.

Here's the sugar ration situation: Home canning — Spare sugar nine in ration book four and in new year books became valid yesterday for five pounds. OPA expects to validate another home canning coupon in June or July for perhaps another five pounds.

Recycle household allotment — Sugar stamp 30 in book four is good for five pounds through April 30. OPA says it has no plans at this time to hike the current ration — five pounds a person every four months.

Individual — Such users as bakers, pharmaceutical producers and canners of fruits and vegetables will get a 10 per cent increase for the April-June period.

Institutional — Hotels and restaurants may get an increase in May, says OPA.
