

Reds Against Plan to Quit Austria Soon

VINIA, March 14 (AP) — Your correspondent has come from a highly interesting but informal conversation with Gen. Mark W. Clark, American commander in chief in Austria, with the distinct impression that he would like to see all the allied forces of the United States, British, French and American withdrawn from this country by the end of the month. The withdrawal turned out to be the Austrian government.

As a matter of fact, I understand that there is before the allied council a proposal to withdraw the American forces from Austria. However, one suspects that if I've interpreted the general's feelings correctly, he is indicating in a wish rather than any strong expectation that such a withdrawal may take place.

Reds Opposed
While the British, French and American might be prepared to pull out under a four-power agreement, I've found no indication that the Russians would subscribe to any such procedure as an early move. The signs have been that the Russians desire a long period of control in Austria to be necessary. Certainly there will be no withdrawal unless all four participate. I found Clark stressing the Austrian position from a European standpoint based on a wide knowledge of the whole European problem. We covered a lot of territory in our conversation and his vision reaches far beyond the borders of his personal command. It's my hope, too, that more than a little of the humanitarianism is involved in his calculations.

Informal Chat
We had our chat in his private office at the American headquarters and he graciously obliged it of opportunity by coming out from behind his big desk to shake hands in a friendly fashion and then leading me across the room to some of his chairs. I've met a lot of the silent military chief, but never had the pleasure of seeing Clark before. And my visit was in passing, so to speak. He told me that he had a "good time" and was the "strongest personality" in the world. Clark is a four-star commander. The picture wouldn't be complete if I didn't record that the general's companion, his chief of staff, Col. Donald Hanner, was of the party by jumping to his master's knees to be petted. Clark grinned and chuckled. "That was the remark that the last letter into me asked if I'd" he said, looking at his feet.

Hanner agreed that Mrs. Clark was coming to Austria. I asked when she was arriving and the general's grin broadened as he replied she would be among the first contingent of soldiers' wives to arrive in the next few months. It was clear to me as pleased as punch.

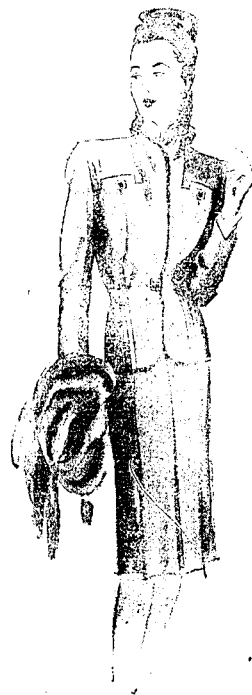

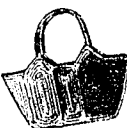



New York Cop Plans Change For Japanese

By C. R. CUNNINGHAM
TOKYO, March 14 (UP)—The Japanese policeman is going to become a "cop" whether he likes it or not and he is going to become the "worst thing possible to a New York cop."

New York City Police Commissioner Lewis J. Valentine made that statement today as he began a study of the police force at the invitation of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

"I know pretty well what the MacArthur wants," Valentine said with regard to his assigned task of reorganizing Tokyo's "force."

"I'm going to make them as near to the New York police as possible and New York people go to the police—they don't run from them. I'm also going to teach them patience and tact."

In this connection he said his principle objective will be to demonstrate to the Japanese police force, make every officer a "public friend" number one rather than public enemy number one, wipe out cruelties and brutalities on the part of police and remove from the people their inherent fear of the Japanese policeman.

He said that if Japanese men are found to be reluctant to join the force, he would recommend that salaries be increased and attractive uniforms provided.

Nazis Had Two Complete Spy Groups Organized in Sweden

STOCKHOLM, March 14 (UPA)—The Nazis had two complete espionage outfits, which acted independently of each other and frequently at cross purposes, one was operated by the Gestapo, the other by the "Abwehr" or military intelligence section of the high command.

This is disclosed in the documentary expose of Nazi espionage in Sweden as it obtained by NEA from a former code teleprinter attached to the German legation in Stockholm.

The Gestapo, or rather its foreign intelligence branch, S. D. (Sicherheitsdienst) or security service, had its headquarters in a drab, three-story office building at Nybrogatan 21, Stockholm.

Bureau Wagner
To the Germans, the place was known as "Bureau Wagner," so called after Col. Fritz Wagner of the Gestapo, a burly, fiftyish man with gloomy eyes, heavy jaw, and an unassuming smile.

The colonel was attached to the legation under the conveniently vague designation of "Wehrmacht (military) (economic defense officer)." He and Frau Wagner were frequently seen in society, always jovial, eager to make friends, and discreetly inquisitive. But as often the colonel would vanish on extended "business trips," invariably returning with a bulky brief case in hand.

In the Nazis' secret correspondence, Wagner is usually referred to as "Herr Doktor." Among his Swedish acquaintances, too, he took care not to display his military rank, still less his connection with the Gestapo. He was a "senior" connected with the German Scientific Institute and the German Academy in Sweden.

Principal Aides
Two of the colonel's principal aides were an S. D. man called August, Pake (head of "Bureau Pake") and a Captain Herrmann.

—formerly of the "Abwehr"—also had two principal aides, one called Karl, a principal thoroughfare in the same city district, Oskarsholmen.

At Karlavagnen 59, in a second floor office suite with windows on both the street and the back yard, there was the so-called "Radio bureau." Here, S. D. was employed in the code and teleprinter room.

Chiefly connected with the Radio bureau was an S. D. man called Karlavagnen 59. Housed in a spacious attic suite, the "Lufa" (subversive) office, as it was called, was the private apartment of Art. Attraction Maj. Heinrich Oehring and his assistant, Maj. Heinrich Weitzel and Capt. Johann Tuenemann.

Actually, the "Lufa" was the nerve-center of German military espionage in Sweden, and the "Radio bureau" was the principal agency of transmission.

Managed, with the "Lufa," but of its actual importance, was the "Mila," or bureau of the military attaché, a Gen. von Ulmshausen, and of his aide, von Watzdorf.

The three chief offices, and several other adjacent agencies, lay of course with the head of the German legation, Minister Hans Thomsen himself.

Fair Were Taps
"Top dogs" at the Radio bureau were "Pander" and "Hasso," the rank and paymaster of the far-flung network of spies. One of the important consequences of the non de facto "division" being used by one of the most dangerous Nazi spies in Sweden, even as the Swedish actress Signe Hasso was playing a similar role in the "House on 92nd Street."

Neither of these two men, however, put in more than an occasional appearance at Karlavagnen 59. Most of their time was at the "Radio bureau," a pleasant residence on the far left side of the city, where they made out instructions and paid off the local agents.

Spies Identified

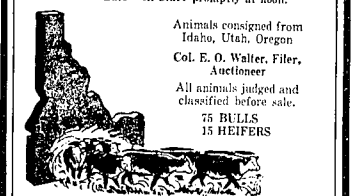
