House Survey Finds Millions Of Vacancies

NEW YORK, March 15 (AP)—You won't believe that if you're been out house hunting, but a survey completed today shows that there are still 5,000,000 places vacant in the United States where a couple could live.

It may not be your house, or the house next door, but the survey boys think that the space is there— if you know where to look.

Pennsylvania Best
If you're really anxious, you can tell you right now that the worst hunting is in Pennsylvania, while the best was reported in Arizona.

Harrison Young, director of the Institute for Housing, which conducted the survey, explained that his people don't go looking for stucco shrouded houses or vacant apartments, or houses. They searched out possible extra rooms, many located in an attic or over a garage, which might be converted into living quarters.

Some people thought their questionnaires were clear and said so, but Young, after reading them over, admitted that they did have some sense. He was looking around that might be used.

Top States Listed
Institute investigators talked to more than 10,000 home owners, and found out that the 10 top states were: Pennsylvania, California, New Jersey, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, Connecticut and Iowa.

The two highest, from the standpoint of housing, were Montana and Arizona.

"They were at the bottom of the list chiefly because towns in these two states are extremely few," Young explained, "and they simply didn't have very much housing of any type."

Owners Quoted
To the question "Have you any space which could be used by a person and his family?" 21 per cent of the 10,000 home owners said "yes," 55 per cent replied "no," and 24 per cent didn't know.

This was answered "yes," said that the space was in their attic, room over a garage, or in an unused room in their house, a playroom in their basement, or storage space in the house or in an outside building.

Only 11 per cent said that their space could be put to use immediately, while 68 per cent answered that it would take time for them to take before any tenants could move in.
