3. American officials' best estimate of the possibilities at the moment is that the Russians may try either to break Quavara's resistance or to pull off a coup d'etat to put a new government in power. The immediate British objective would be to get official Iranian authority for the presence of red army troops in Iran.

4. The tenor of American-Russian relations has not improved by Secretary of State Byrnes with his assurance on the one hand that the American government does not intend to enter into a military alliance with Britain and its insistence on the other that the United States must continue to maintain and strengthen its armed forces. To do this he called for extending the draft law beyond its May 15 expiration and the enactment of peace-time military training.

Byrnes' statements were made in a New York speech. He said this country has no intention of joining a military alliance with Russia against Russia. But he did hammer home the point that the United States must continue to maintain and strengthen its armed forces.

15 New Ways To Get Taxes Being Studied

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Fifteen ways by which states or their subdivisions can tax on certain compensating revenue from federal-owned property are being studied by the House Finance Committee.

More than half of the proposals represent views of congressmen, the remainder are the ideas of various interested, quasi-official organizations and public officials.

Printed in booklet, all have been printed in a booklet for easy study by committee members who will be called on shortly by Chairman Peterson, D. Fla., to write a law.

The situation is complicated, Peterson points out, by the diversified character of the federal properties. They fall into many classifications and Peterson thinks a special section must be written for each.

There are, for instance, (1) court houses, post offices, customs houses, military, industrial, educational, penal, legislative, reformatories, jails and national cemeteries.

Proposals differ. Generally, proposals for compensation in form of taxes would exempt these from payments but "some would subject them to local government taxes of other districts based on their value to local taxing units."

(2) Manufacturing plants or other commercially-valuable sites. This is the class of property that caused most protest from taxing units when the government acquired the properties and took them from local tax rolls. Bills introduced would, without exception, provide either for taxation or for payments in lieu of taxes even where the government holds title under a conditional bill of sale or lease agreement.

(3) Forest and grazing lands, flood control projects, lands acquired under the farm rental act, Indian reservations, lands, acquired for military use, national parks and monuments, and alien property.

Argument seen. There is some difference of opinion regarding the treatment of some of these tracts. Forests and grazing districts now return some of their income to the state and even though there is argument for their return and financing and provide a poor basis for planning.

Representative Colmer, D. Miss., who would tax such lands at 10 per cent of their value, would exclude coal, oil, gas or other mineral or subsurface resources. The government would contribute to the counties 27 1/2 per cent of its gross income from these sources.

(4) Public housing. The Municipal Finance Officers' association wants federal housing projects to pay a full share of taxes and taxes, there should be no limit on what the housing project can pay if the earnings warrant such payments.

(5) Such government units as the Tennessee valley authority while the Municipal Finance Officer, a association suggests, would have to arrive at a settlement scheme by negotiation.

HERFORD, March 18 (AP)—The black market is so cleverly organized in Germany now that a gang was able to steal an entire train load of coal in the Ruhr, transport it 200 miles to Aachen near the North sea and swap it for potatoes.

This fraudulent case was disclosed by a British military government officer whose position forbids his quotation by name.

The officer said the remarkable theft of hundreds of tons of coal was only one example of "business" behind the black market. "Obviously these gangs are reaching into high railroad circles," he said. "They must have connections with Germans who have been returned to run the railroads."
