John L. Lewis, bituminous coal operators today offered that working "peace" or "war" over his demand for better working conditions in the nation's mines.

Lewis again addressed the operators in Washington, recalling their reply to his nine general demands for 100,000 members of the United Mine Workers. He repeated what he called an "indictment" in which he accused the management and stockholders of having "made dead" 28,000 mine workers in 14 years and injuring another 100,000.

C. of C. Chief Approves Big Britain Loan

Trouble Seen As Nazis Get Food Supply

HANNOVER, March 19 (AP) — A senior military government officer says bluntly that British occupation authorities expect trouble from young, militant Germans in about a year or two—when they are well fed. This high-placed officer, asking not to be quoted by name, told a reporter this is not a possibility but a decided probability.

"The new recruits are dead now," he said in an interview. "That is because the Germans are busy trying to find food. But it will not always be that way."

Scene to Change

"When Germany is better organized, when enough food is available so that a man doesn't have to spend all his time on that one problem, it will be different."

He said he expected that turn of affairs in maybe a year, two at the most.

Some occupation officers feared there would be trouble over redistributions, which went into effect two weeks ago.

The all-out intensity they catch for food, the officer said, and it will only keep them that much bolder on the one problem. We have set up, of course, safety measures, but I see no organized effort among Germans to cause trouble."

Food Imported
