FDR and War Cabinet Agreed to Fight 10 Days Before Jap Attack

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his war cabinet agreed 10 days before Pearl Harbor that the United States should fight if Japan attacked South Asia, it was revealed today.

The decision was reached at a White House meeting Nov. 28, 1941, and is described in a document by former Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson with Congress.

On Nov. 21, the war cabinet decided that responsibility for the attack on Pearl Harbor should be placed on the Japanese, Stimson said. It was a matter of how Japan could be maneuvered into firing the first shot without unduly endangering the United States.

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Long Smelter Strike Hurts 3 Utah Towns

SALT LAKE CITY, March 21 (AP)—Three Utah communities whose life blood is the low grade ore taken from the mountains which form their backdrop have been hit hard by the two-month-old smelter strike. This is now one of the longest-lived strikes in the country. However, the morale of the strikers seems high. Clusters of men on the streets of Brigham Canyon, Magna and Garfield, scattered pickets at the entrances to the operating smelters and communities in the local headquarters of the CIO Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers union—all tell you the same story.

"It's tough but we're all solid behind it,"

Supplied With Food
Daily the miners and smelter workers who are demanding an approximate 20 per cent wage boost, are supplied with foodstuffs for their families from the leaders of the union welfare committee.

Each non-striking member of the union in district two, Utah and Idaho, contributes \$1 daily to the welfare fund for the striking locals, Charles R. Brooks, publicity chairman, explained.

Utah Copper company and American Smelting and Refining, as well as the United States Refining company whose plant is in Murray, a suburb of Salt Lake City, contend the workers have received substantial raises during the year.

The operators have proposed that the wartime 40-hour work week be extended until the contract expiration date in June, arguing this would keep take-home pay at levels prevailing prior to the strike.

They described as "strike window dressing" changes on mine safety machines favored by the union and fully detailed such accusations.

The pickets will not permit the entrance of the mine and mills, are usually necessary. No attempt has been made to cross their lines. One picket at the Magna smelter commented: "The company doesn't bother us and the public is treating us fine."

At the entrance to the Garfield plant a foreman stopped his car, passed the line of men with their pickets, then drove on to the smelter to check manufacturing operations, according to the strike.

No stores have closed in Magna but a man at the combination deputy-sheriff's office and fire department furnished his best at the mention of the strike's effect on the merchants.

"It's bound to have an effect," he declared. "After all it's the difference between an income of \$100,000 a week and nothing."

Of the approximately 4,000 workers involved in the walkout, 300 of their families are receiving union welfare support and from 200 to 300 are on strike relief. Brooks estimated. In addition about 400 strikers are supporting their families through part-time work.

Idaho Bullet Plant Hit by Heavy Orders

LEWISTOWN, March 21 (AP)—The basement of a house here is the site of a bullet factory which its owner, Vernon D. Speer, says has produced ammunition for bombers in every big game state of the union since its founding in 1944.

Speer says he would just as soon keep his plant's existence a secret for a while because he can't keep up with demand.

He explains by saying he called to turn down recently an order from San Francisco for 10,000 .30-caliber bullets. He told the buyer he would not deliver before July at the earliest. The buyer said he would wait his turn.

Wide Territory
Last week, Speer says, orders came from dealers in central Nebraska, Salt Lake City and Albuquerque and Clatskanie, N. M., for 300,000 rounds.

"My bullets killed animals in every state in the union where they were big game hunting last year," Speer says. "My small factory could be located at any point in the United States, but I chose Lewistown because I liked it from the first."

Until 1939, a foreman at the tool and die department of a tractor company at Waterloo, Iowa, Speer came to Lewistown in 1944. During 1945, his little factory turned out more than 412,000 bullets of various types.

Only Four Months
And that was done in only four months because the rest of the time Speer was turning out die sets and other tools.

The Speer plant employs only one man outside the family, Mrs. Speer and their daughter, Virginia, also assist. But Speer says he is formulating plans to expand his factory. He expects a toolmaker from Omaha, Neb., to join his little staff soon.

Speer makes .22, .25, .27 and .30 caliber bullets and also fuses, out eight millimeter, 170-grain, .308 and .300 Remington-Union Army bullet for the use in German army rifle, automatic, machine and mortar by American soldiers.

CARBON, Ind., March 21.—President John B. Marshall of the Carbon State bank announced today that he was going out of business July 1.

"Let somebody else bank be the most frequently robbed financial institution in Indiana," Marshall said.

Marshall, 71, is role employee of the bank. He said the voluntary liquidation would not prevent the Carbon banking industry but also the holdup and burglary industry.

Actually, however, locking the bank doors for good will be only a temporary measure. Marshall has conducted his business with the doors locked since 1940.

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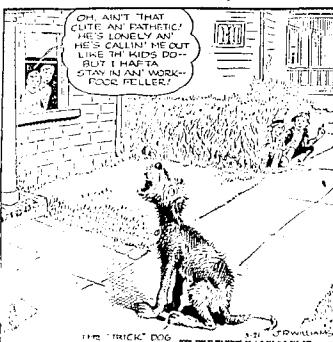

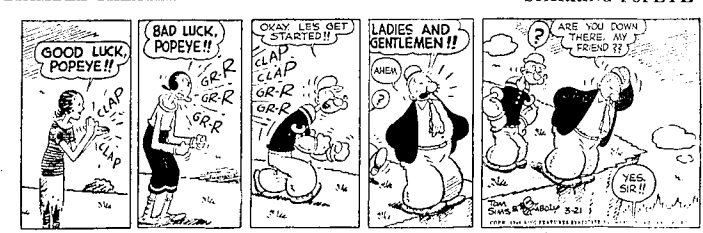

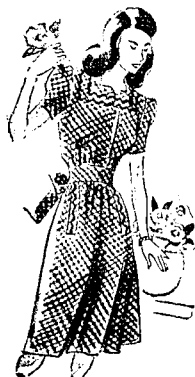
