Greek Voting Test Appears Sure Failure

Another test of "democracy" in southeastern Europe appears doomed to failure in the Greek elections scheduled for next Sunday.

Despite the supervision of 200 troops of British, French and American observers, indications are that the balloting will not be accepted as a fair expression of the popular will.

Lists Padded

The EAM political coalition, which is strongly leftist and includes the communist bloc, has charged that the voting lists have been shamelessly padded, and has urged all to abstain from the polls.

Strikes have been in progress to emphasize the protest.

If the elections are held under the circumstances, the British said, they would be a mockery of the democratic process.

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Matter Scheduled

The matter was scheduled to be still under consideration and may be raised again by Russia at the next meeting of the council in New York.

Russia is deeply interested because Greece has severed its ties with the political, economic and military affiliation with Great Britain, France and the country of southeastern Europe to resist falling into the Soviet grip.

A "Triple Alliance" of Greece, Turkey and Iran is being formed as part of the Russian-oriental plan for security along its borders and in the Balkans.

Inside Greece, a state of internal rivalry, something almost to be expected, has been deepened by the presence of British troops. London is accused of interfering in the election results and unsatisfactorily, as expected, the troops will be kept in the country.

The British have been accused of being unable to evoke further protest from Russia.

Rep. Dworshak Asks Boost in Bean Ceilings to Aid Farmers

An Associated Press dispatch Tuesday that Rep. Henry C. Dworshak, Idaho Republican, was asking the war food administration to review its figures on recent bean ceilings and support prices brought hopes to southern Idaho bean dealers that their prices may be raised so farmers will be able to make larger profit on the crop and won't be obliged to shift their acreage to other products.

"We hope that Congressmen Dworshak can do something before farmers plant their acreage into other crops," Otell Robinson, president of the Western Bean Dealers' association, said Tuesday. "It is nearly time to plant sugar beans and although sugar is a vital crop, the government also is requiring an increased bean crop."

Southern Idaho bean dealers have urged Congressmen in Washington to raise the recent 100,000 CFA department of agriculture and department of military and support prices for beans. Bean dealers claimed that the ceiling increase was not sufficient and feared farmers would plant their acreage in wheat, sugar beets and other crops.

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GI Gets New Thumb Out of Finger Stump

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP).—Sgt. Louis Di Cola, member of the Purple Heart, gets a kick out of hearing clumsy people say their "fingers are all thumbs."

The sergeant has a "thumb" that is all finger—a thumb made out of a transplanted finger—and he makes out all right.

Di Cola, 26, of North Providence, R. I., lost his entire right forearm and the thumb and most of the index finger of his left hand in a bloody steel explosion on Iwo Jima.

Next Operation

Surgeons at the army's Walter Reed general hospital fitted him with an artificial right forearm readily enough. But the job of making a useful extremity out of what remained of his left hand called for one of the most delicate surgical operations of the war.

The doctors, actually transplanted the remains of the left index finger and fixed it to the stump of the shattered thumb.

Our thumbs are our most important digits," said Lt. Col. D. B. Shuman, chief of the amputation section of Walter Reed, who performed the operation.

Without the thumb we lose the ability to pinch and grasp objects.

Does Amazing Things

Using his repaired left hand with his artificial right forearm, Di Cola can do amazing things.

He can wind his wristwatch, manipulate keys, "although I have a hard time with very small keys," lace his shoes, button his clothing, drive an automobile, screw nuts and bolts, and even pick up coins from the floor.

"It would be a big help if I had a finger nail on my thumb," he said. "I have a tough time putting the nail on a toothpaste tube."

Di Cola was operated on last July. He now awaits discharge from the army, in which he has served since March, 1941.

Sgt. Glen Terry Saves Man From Burning Grocery

By Sgt. Glen Terry, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Terry, was an heroic deed which saved a man from death in a burning grocery store in North Coeur d'Alene the weekend of March 16, his parents revealed Wednesday. They recently received a letter from Sergeant Terry explaining the incident, which he himself didn't stress as anything along "heroic" lines.

Sergeant Terry, who is stationed at the aviation corps station base, Cherry Point, N. C., wrote his parents that he was riding in a taxi when they passed a small grocery store that was burning furiously to the ground.

He explained that the cab driver halted for the burning telephone to turn to the alarm, while he continued himself with watching for the burning car stopped and the driver and Sergeant Terry descended there might be someone asleep in the back of the store.

"I heard someone," Sergeant Terry wrote, "and he didn't sound as if he were able to get out himself. I finally broke down the back door and found an old invalid man unconscious and a four-inch coil in his head and a handful of smoke. We had him out and into a nearby house before anyone else got there."

Sergeant Terry administered first aid to the injured man and he is recovering, the letter said. The aviation corps officer said that he believed that the man injured his head while trying to flee from the burning building.

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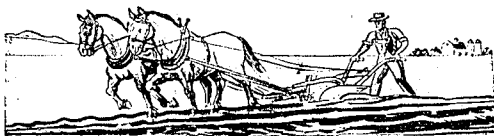

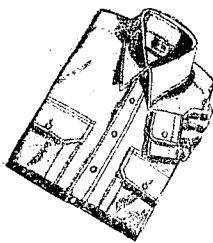

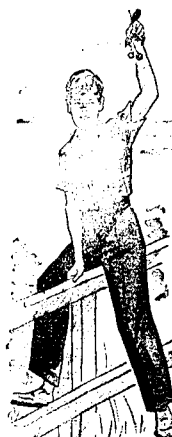
