

Nationwide Railroad Strike Stated May 18 by 2 Unions

(CLEVELAND, April 25 (AP)—A nationwide railroad strike to start May 18 was ordered today by officials of two large brotherhoods, the trainmen and locomotive engineers. General chairman of the two brotherhoods reached the strike decision after a two-day conference in which they rejected recommendations made by a fact-finding board in the brotherhoods' dispute with carriers over wages and working rules changes.

In view of today's action, government seizure of railroads was the only way to prevent cancellation of the strike.

Chairmen approved the walkout by acclamation after President A. F. Whitney of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen told the conference:

"Now is the psychological time to press down on these railroads and get on rule changes through."

The government calls us to Washington, we'll go, but the strike order won't be called off until a satisfactory settlement is reached."

Alvaney Johnston, grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, likewise told the conference the strike would continue "until a satisfactory settlement was reached."

Representatives of the two brotherhoods met with the carriers Monday at Chicago to attempt to negotiate differences.

China Moving Capital Site During Crisis

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—In the midst of a civil political crisis, the Nationalist government is moving the capital back to Chungking.

The Chinese Central News agency says the government is expected to proclaim the transfer on May 1 from the war-torn town of Chungking.

President T. V. Soong and other high executives have flown to Nanking and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek is expected to arrive after the week-end.

The Chinese estimate that probably half a million government workers and traders will leave Chungking. Some already have made the 100-mile trip down the Yangtze, others will follow on 50 river boats and others on motor trucks to the north.

Chungking will remain one of two "temporary capitals," the other being Nanking.

The return to Nanking takes Chungking's national government back to the traditional center of Chinese political influence, and is a symbolic move for thousands of members of the middle-class and democratic groups who have fled from the city since the Nationalist government moved to Peiping in the north in order to deal with the Japanese occupation problem and relations with Soviet Russia.

Meanwhile, Chiang Kai-shek has given in to demands of both the communists and the League to postpone the national assembly, which was scheduled to meet in Nanking May 5 to adopt a new national constitution.

Other questions are the nature of the national government, and de facto control of Manchuria over which Nationalist and communist troops have been fighting.

While the communists have made things more difficult by taking military action in the field, the Nationalist government has not been able to do its unification program.

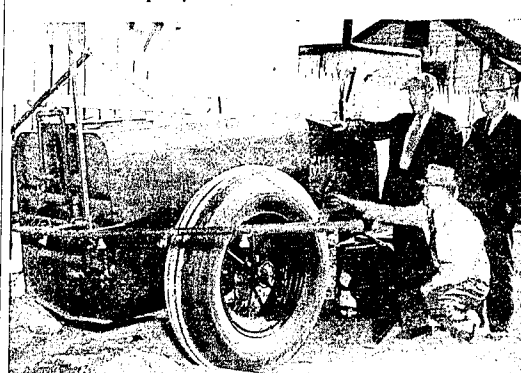

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Any stuffed shirts in State department corps, eventually may have their stiff collars knocked out by foreign diplomats.

This opinion comes to you through the courtesy of Edward C. Achenson. He has studied the stuffed shirt and its cause and its cure.

Achenson announced today that starting July 1, 1946, Washington university will have a two-month course for veterans who want to be diplomats. These students will have their expenses paid by the government under the GI bill of rights.

As director of this school, Achenson has interviewed some of the men who plan to enroll.

His verdict: A new diplomatic day is dawning.

"You can tell the difference just by talking to them," Achenson told a reporter.

"Before the war we helped a private school here to take fielding diplomats. Many of these came from awfully eastern schools.
