Arab Plea to Soviet Shows Red Interests

Arab appeals to Generalissimo Stalin to intervene in the explosive Palestine question focus attention on Soviet interest in the whole middle eastern region.

This fact has been no indication that Russia proposes to intervene in the Palestine affair. However, it might be expected that Russia would take the opportunity to cultivate Arab good will at a moment when Arab resentment against Britain is at a high point.

Interest widespread.

Although headline news dispatches concerning Soviet interest in the middle east have largely been confined to treat there have been repeated indications of expanding Soviet interest in all the middle eastern countries.

Nearly three years ago Russia launched a program of diplomatic expansion in the region, opening a series of embassies and consulates as the middle eastern countries joined in the general war-time procession of opening diplomatic contacts with Moscow.

Russian specialists in the Soviet diplomatic staff has been built up by many specialists in Arabic and Moslem questions, trained in the languages and culture of the region through long service in the Soviet own Moslem regions.

Additionally, Russia has buttressed her position through the promotion of religious ties and contacts. Embassies of the Russian Orthodox church have circulated through the near east, furthering contacts with dissident branches of the Orthodox faith and strengthening the long dormant links between the Moscow church and its near eastern cousin.

Shipping Lack Delays Indies Raw Material

BATAVIA, Java, May 10 (AP)—Delays in the shipping of raw materials from the Netherlands East Indies are so unsatisfactory that the world may have to wait a year before obtaining vital raw materials produced on them, according to a report by Leonard A. Weston of Springfield, Mass., who is conducting a survey for the U. S. state department, the reconstruction finance corporation and the war production board.

He said thousands of tons of urgently needed commodities are available in the Indies but are being held by the Dutch for their own use. "No one will get a single ton of Netherlands East Indies products until road and air transport are provided in quantity and such items as medicine, clothing, food, tools, building materials, fuel and other summer incentive goods are distributed."

Weston has been assigned to the task of determining war damage in the Netherlands East Indies, rehabilitation relief funds, which priorities for the delivery of American goods will be based, whether Japanese stock piles are usable, and whether surplus American arms and navy supplies in the south Pacific may be substituted for items needed by the Dutch in the United States.

The key to the whole difficult situation, Weston said, is transport by land and sea.

Weston said inter-land shipping would be available if the NRP government's import-export organization would consent to use small Chinese-owned craft.

The reason given for this craft is not better use of the cargo, but that the Dutch feel they can't trust the Chinese to use small Chinese-owned craft.

However, Weston said he had been told the Dutch are not interested in the NRP steamship line is blocking any projected encroachment on its present inter-land monopoly.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—Two important strings are attached to the British offer, government officials here said today.

"I find it impossible to believe that the British really intend to abandon control of the eastern Mediterranean," he says, expressing fear that it would have a "disintegrating effect" on the empire.

In London, British air force quarters are reported also to view with mingling this proposal which might throw control of the British empire's most vital crossroads into considerable doubt.
