## NAM Official Raps Federal Labor Policy

**SALT LAKE CITY, May 18 (AP).**—The federal government was accused of "selling out to labor" today by Robert R. Wason of New York, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, in an address before an intermountain industrialists conference here.

Denying what he called the administration's "partisan labor policy," the production-preventing controls of OPA and "deficit financing," Wason said President Truman's government finds it easier to push the public around than John L. Lewis.

Labor, OPA and financing, Wason said, are "road blocks" in the path of recovery.

He predicted that the supreme court would "throw out legislation making a mine royalty class illegal," should it be adopted by congress, and said new regulation boards or other groups attempting to settle the coal strike would be "coerced" by Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers.

Wason asked for a "long term labor policy" in which management would have equal rights with labor, and said the present price in coal negotiations resulted because "the government had given the federal government too much revenue from union dues." He said the OPA was a "dangerous inflationary" force, "impractical and irresponsible" and said it held back production.

Black markets, he said, can be avoided only by "overheating production of necessary goods without scarcity or abundance has caused inflation."

**MIAMI BEACH, Fla., May 18 (AP).**—Miami Beach's one-woman army of occupation still held the fort in the "battle of apartment 16" today after the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars stood reinforcements to the scene.

The row began yesterday when WAC Cpl. Esther Levy returned on a furlough from her station at Greenhouse, N. C., and found her apartment occupied, she said, by a stranger.

# Traffic Safety Drive Started; Care Advised

First week-end during which the current traffic safety check program in force, brought an acknowledgment from the law enforcement agencies urging drivers to exercise special caution in connection with Sunday traffic.

The campaign, inaugurated on a national scale, is being conducted in Twin Falls county by Sheriff J. W. Lowery and in the city by Police Chief Howard G. Little. These officers last night advised motorists to be especially cautious during Sunday driving at congested highways and the relaxed attitude many drivers is conducive to accidents.

**Inserted Into Paper**

Times-News is cooperating in the effort to make the public more traffic safety conscious by inserting booklets provided by the state to the local officers in copies of the newspaper circulated in the city and within Twin Falls county.

In a joint statement addressed to all motorists, Sheriff Little and Sheriff Lowery pointed out that the purpose of the campaign is to appeal to motorists as citizens to follow the simple rules of the road, which are for their own protection and the safety of the general public. If drivers do not respond to this approach, it will be necessary to use other methods to enforce this request.

**Now on hand are 15,000 pamphlets titled, "Check Your Driving, Check Your Car, Check Accidents."**

Through various means, many will be placed in the hands of as many motorists as possible, so that ultimately the county will be blanketed with the informative booklet. A supply of these booklets has also been received.

It must be noted that there are few worthwhile causes, the officials aver, that all civic, service, religious, school and business groups do not cooperate in making the driving public a safety-conscious as possible.

**Safety Lanes**

Before close of the campaign, which continues until July 7, traffic lanes will be conducted at various points in the county. These include, brakes, windshield wipers and other mechanical devices. Although mechanical condition is important, the officers emphasized that the most accidents is the human element that is at fault, so drivers should check themselves just as carefully as they check their machines.

# Vets Get Chance For School Tests

Service men who didn't finish high school will be able to take the general GED tests at the University of Idaho southern branch office in June. John D. Pratt, Twin Falls high school principal, said Saturday.

The tests provide three alternatives for youths who left high school to enter the services. They are:

Any former serviceman who passed these tests, and who has an accumulation of six credits in English or allied fields, and two credits in U. S. history, is eligible for a high school diploma.

To boys who have less than three years of high school, if they pass the GED tests successfully, as much as 10 credits toward graduation may be allowed.

If a youth has had only a little high school work, but passed the tests, he may go to the state department of education at Boise and receive an equivalency diploma. This would permit him to enter almost any state school in Idaho, and many in other states on a trial basis.

Pratt said he would announce the specific date of the tests as soon as Dean John R. Nichols of UISS advises him of the day selected.
