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Mediator for War in China Hits Factions

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21 (AP)—General Marshall finally has let both sides have it in China.

Saying publicly what he must be telling the Chinese privately, Marshall condemns both sides for wrongheaded campaigning which fan the flames of civil war.

As a mediator, Marshall has been put in a difficult personal position by a pre-government Nanking newspaper, the Central Daily news. This paper has tried to represent him as telling the communists they had to give up the Manchurian capital of Changchun to government troops. Possession of this city is a point of pride and strategy to both sides.

Source close to Marshall last week said he merely relayed to the communists the information that Chiang Kai-shek still demanded that they leave Changchun before he would talk politics with them.

This same Nanking newspaper took opportunity over the weekend to say that it wanted to hear no more bargaining offers from the communists.

His attitude may have been affected by the recent disclosure in Washington that Marshall holds personal veto power over a half-billion dollar American loan to Nanking which reportedly was being made conditional upon Chinese internal peace.

Price Ceilings Ending Asked By Cattlemen

They also favored more funds for the U. S. grading service, which has suffered a 75 per cent cut.

They wired Clinton Anderson, secretary of agriculture, and the Idaho senators and representatives, recommending the removal of price ceilings, subsidies and quotas on beef.

"According to agricultural statistics, we have a surplus of cattle numbers, and we believe that slaughter quotas and price ceilings prevent legitimate chances from handling meat in competition to the black market," said the message.

Buhl Budget Hearing Set For May 28th

Buhl, May 21—A public hearing on the city budget estimate for the coming year will be held Tuesday May 28, at 8 p.m. in the city hall.

A vote of the citizens present will be taken on the approval or rejection of the proposed budget, or its modification.

The city budget has been increased by about \$25,000 to meet the additional demands of a growing town. The amount to 26 mills increase in tax levy.

Allocation to the general fund has been set at \$11,000, with \$11,200 set aside for a special street fund.

An increase of eight mills has been made in the street fund, but several levies have been decreased so that an overall increase of only 26 mills is necessary. Other fund estimates are the cemetery fund, which goes from \$2,800 to \$3,200. The city's assessed valuation has increased the past year from \$1,344,612 to \$1,206,172.

Revenue increases estimated for the fiscal year are state liquor revenue from \$2,000 to \$4,000; water rentals from \$16,000 to \$18,500.

Two new cash reserve funds, \$2,900 in a real estate fund and \$11,000 in a water fund, have been established.

2 Hurt at Rupert In Highway Crash




