



## "Boy's Town" Planned for Medford, Ore.

MEDFORD, Ore., June 6 (AP)—Plans for a boy's community modeled in part on famed Boystown, Neb., were revealed here today by Gordon Green, wealthy orchardist.

The community will be developed on his "Slagcoach" ranch near here and will be in operation by 1948, he said.

Details of selection of candidates for the community have not been worked out, he said, but tentatively they are based on good academic record and need of financial help. Green said he planned to interest six nationally prominent men, three in the east and three in the west, to make the selections.

Counters will direct the boys' schooling through the equivalent of one year of high school and then their formative period, as Green expressed it—and aid them in constructive work. Although Green plans to undertake financing the venture, he said the community would have several activities to make it partly self-sustaining. One will be a dairy consisting of a 30-acre pear orchard on the ranch and development of holiday cottages and the building of a major business in this southern Oregon fruit district. Another planned is cattle raising.

## Million More Acres Could Be Reclaimed

BOISE, June 6 (AP)—Another million acres of southern Idaho could be irrigated in addition to the million now under irrigation if the projects on the bureau of reclamation's long range plan were completed, George Carter, Boise, district engineer for the bureau, said today.

Carter, who addressed approximately 50 delegates at a meeting of the Columbia basin inter-agency committee, listed major projects as:

Mountain Home, 570,000 acres; Bruneau, 320,000 acres; Boise and Payette rivers 80,000 acres; Weiser area, 25,000 acres; Owyhee area, 30,000 acres.

R. J. Newell, regional director for the bureau, declared that a proposed reclamation bureau appropriation cut by the house "will cause difficulty" in completing the Anderson ranch dam near Boise.

The cut is extremely harmful to projects in this area, Newell said. He added that Morrison-Knudsen Contracting company, Boise, now have men and equipment at the Cascade dam project and are ready to start work.

## APPROVAL TO BE ASKED

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—The senate will be asked to approve appropriations which will complete all reclamation projects where war veterans will have preference as settlers.

These are the public land projects, approximately 20 in number and scattered through most of the western states.

## Egg Ceilings Will Be Hiked In Area Today

Egg price ceilings are hiked effective today, Carl N. Anderson, Twin Falls OPA representative, announced. Retailers now will be able to pay the producer 34 1/2 cents a dozen for eggs and group 2 retailers may sell eggs from 30 1/2 cents to 40 1/2 cents a dozen.

Most Twin Falls retailers fall in group 2. Up to today the price ceiling for producers was 33 1/4 cents a dozen. The price will be 34 1/2 to July 18 when it will be increased to 35 1/4.

On succeeding Thursdays the price will go up to 36 1/4 cents, 36 3/4 cents and 37 1/4 cents. Retail ceilings for grade A eggs in slugs in group 2 is 40 1/2 cents; B grade, 40 1/2; C grade 40, and ungraded 39 1/2 cents. For group 3 stores, of which the two largest chain store markets are included, the ceiling is 40 1/2 cents for grade A, Grade B ceiling is 40 1/2; grade C, 42 1/2 cents and ungraded, 39 1/2 cents. A few Twin Falls small markets

are in group 3 and their retail ceilings are grade A, 40 1/2 cents; grade B, 42 1/2 cents; grade C, 42 1/2 cents and ungraded, 40 1/2 cents.

**Boss With 900  
Picks What's  
Top Secretary**

CHICAGO, June 8.—A boss who has 900 secretaries, S. I. Workman, decided today at long last, what makes a good secretary. Above all, he revealed, she must resemble the three monkeys who represent the adage: "See no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil."  
"A secretary is in a position to know everything good and everything bad about a business," Workman, president of a Chicago secretarial firm, said.  
"Any person in the management has to be guided by the information getting out," he said.  
"For example, if the boss is considering a bonus for his employees, the whole thing might fall through if the secretary carries a girl friend and twitters: 'Oh, Mabel! We're going to get a bonus!'"

**Secretary's Rules**  
While attending a convention of the National Office Management Association, Workman said every good secretary will abide by the following rules:

1. Protect your boss but don't coddle him. "Any man who deserves to be called an executive doesn't want to be coddled. He appreciates constructive criticism. He can learn as much from my secretary as from one of my vice-presidents."
2. Think for yourself and express your opinion. "If the boss does not encourage his employees to think for themselves, how can he get the best of their brains? And that's all business is—a combination of brains."
3. Dress Conservatively  
4. Dress smartly but conservatively. "Girls who overdo in an office are too distracting in more ways than one. Besides, over-dressing creates a feeling of rivalry among fellow workers. We provide plenty of mirrors in our office. We encourage girls to keep themselves in prime in our work."
4. No tears. "The boss has his good days and bad days like anyone else. His secretary is the one who relieves on confides in. If he has to worry about what he says to her when the going gets tough, she loses her value to him."
5. Don't fall in love with the boss. "If there's too much danger of this, the boss-secretary relationship is like a marriage. In a sense, she sees him at his worst. Generally, when the working day is done she's only too glad to get away from him and meet her fellow at the corner."
6. Don't walk too fast. "Don't breeze out of the boss' office and slap some work down on someone's desk. This creates resentment. Be graceful and easy-going and ask—don't demand—that some job get attention. Don't feel superior just because you are the boss' secretary."

**\$12,218 Awarded  
Widow at Death  
Of Her Husband**

An award of \$12,218 damages for the widow of a truck driver who died in a collision at a water main grade crossing was the verdict rendered Wednesday night by a district court jury here, following five and one-half hours deliberation.  
The jury retired at 4:35 p. m., after having heard testimony from nine jurors, at 10:05 p. m. The nine found for the plaintiff and assessed the damages of the plaintiff in the sum of \$12,218.  
The action was brought by Mrs. J. O. White, mother of three children, against the Union Pacific Railroad company. She had sought \$25,000 on a charge of negligence.  
The crash occurred June 4, 1945, in Jerome county, and the victim was J. O. White.  
A majority of jurors was necessary to return the verdict. Juror signing it were James Wisnagar, former Harry E. Mangrove, Harry G. Dietrich, Frank R. Gentry, Robert McBride, E. D. Thier, John Von Linder, Mrs. Helen Hyde and Walter Miller.  
Jurors were ordered to report at 10 a. m. Monday.

**Young Workers to  
Need Proof of Age**

School-age youths over 14 years of age who plan to work in the beet fields this year may obtain proof-of-age cards at the office of Doris Stratley, county superintendent of public instruction, it was announced Wednesday.  
These cards will protect growers from unintentionally employing children under 14, the minimum age set by the sugar act. Mrs. Stratley was notified by the children's bureau of the U. S. department of labor.  
An applicant for a card should bring a birth certificate if available, or a certificate of baptism, baptismal certificate, Bible record, passport or insurance policy at least one year old.  
"Because of food shortages, it may be necessary as the sugar beet season progresses to employ in the fields young people who do not ordinarily help in this work," the county superintendent was advised.  
If growers are to be eligible to receive full benefit payments under the sugar act, no children under 14 may be employed in the beet fields, and children between 14 and 16 may work no more than eight hours a day.  
With the exception of those children in the immediate family of a grower who owns at least 60 percent of the sugar beet crop, these provisions apply to all children permitted to work in the production, cultivation or harvesting of sugar beets.


